"It tips over at an alarming rate. "In the fiscal year 1967, the Armyalthough it professes no concern publicly-reported 3,538 accidents involving the M161, in which 104 G.L's were killed and 1,858 injured."

In M151 accidents, 36 per cent were overturns without any collision being involved. The trouble is an independent rear wheel suspension "long recognized by automotive experts as dangerous except to skilled drivers of sports and racing cars."

Officers who can talk this way, which their experience and training have taught them is the best way for an efficient, reliable military machine to be built, want their men to become accustomed to danger, and to face itmaybe even if it is only equipmentrather than seek any easy, rational ection from it. You don't make a fighting machine by making its individual units safety conscious. Their commander assumes what responsibility can be assumed for their safety; he dewhat risk they shall take or not take. But he has to have troops who are callous to risk, who do not question the reason for a dangerous piece of equipment, or for a dangerous war, or for a dangerous specific operation i

These same professional Army officers will argue, perhaps with formidable logic, that the best care they can take of their troops, the best guarantee they can provide of their safety, is to beach them to live cool with danger, even with unreasonable danger, and to follow or ders implicitly. The tougher a soldier is.

Conceding such logic, however, the truth is that the temper of the times has grown out of tolerance and under standing for the technique of making good soldiers by giving them tipsy trucks to drive or useless Hamburger Hills to take. The business of war is that of dy ficers have always known, but some thing our civilization is beginning to resent. The most famous is the Tennesse Valley Authority, which built and operates a series dams on the Tennessee River and its tributaries. It sells electricity to 160 local electric aystems.

The Commodity Credit Corporation finances price support programs, the Export-Import Bank of the United States aids in financing of exports and imports, while the Federal Crop Insurance Cor poration insures crops. The Panama Canal Company and the Saint Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation operate waterways. In addition there are reveral other government corporations, mainly in the financial field. So there


