Even though the library will be closed, it does not face a dismal future. According to Mrs. Raymond the building will be open for use by all groups but political groups for meetings, and the museum will be continued and expanded as aquisitions are made.

According to Dr. Ann Beck, chairman of the Library Board, closing Wood Memorial will improve "the collection and the services of the central library."



Henceforth, apparently, the inn will refuse anybody at its peril, even though it may call itself a club, and it may soon get to the point where there is no vacation spot at all where Americans can go and be sure of getting away from each

"Inventing Backwards" That American manufacturer who has just invented a washing machine which turns by hand power and which has no chrome or gadgets on it is likely to be surprised by a clamor from customers he doesn't expect. He's making these comfortable, old-

fashioned, hand-powered machines for sale in the backward, undeveloped countries of the world, where such a handoperated churn device will be a step up from the old-fashioned tub, or the neighboring brook. Turning back from America's own technical progress in gadgetry toward a product simple enough and inexpensive enough for sale in a backward country, which may not have universal power distribution, is a process called "inventing backwards." But the manufacturer in question had better watch out, for fear the product he invents backward doesn't develop too much appeal for his own American

housewife here at home. The product which has been invented backwards has fewer things that can go wrong with it. Instead of merely watching it work and hanging around waiting for it to finish, it invites the housewife herself to become part of the process. There are some other things being invented, or reinvented, for sale to backward civilizations, which may have surprising appeal here in this country. Some of the "inventing backwards" items for farm work, like a small hand-operated . thresher, or planting machines that might do just one or two rows at a time, reopen the possibility of trying to operate a small farm-something that has grown quite impossible when all ne equipment obtainable is mechanized for large-scale operations. 

Today's price is \$1.25 per side boned which averages % to one pound. You can buy the whole fish from a market for 39c per pound for a buck, or male, shad. The female, or roe, costs 59-60c per
