e-no single, authoritative explanation why there had to be violence the North End of Hartford last i, whether or not it was the deliberate anning of a few extremists, are quesons not likely to get definitive answers. Perhaps, in the place of such answers bout one week's violence, there might be a reiteration of some of the longrange, basic factors in the North End

First, when the present era of raceonsciousness opened, the North End of lartford was probably as terrible on cample of big city backwardness as ould be found anywhere in the world. Second, despite the fact that original onditions might have made this the most explosive ghetto of all, the "worst" has never happened in Hartford.

Third, one explanation of the fact that the worst has not happened in Hartford, in spite of what might have been the worst original conditions, lies in the unusual nature and energy of the effort which has been made to begin improving conditions and life in the North End efore explosion did occur. This effort has involved intelligent leadership within the North End community itself; it has also involved a many-sided, manyfaceted, many-programmed effort on the part of the outside world which might, re suppose, be called "the establi

Hishment's" concern, and evidence of touches of progress for all the efforts of individuals, business organizations and church organizations may hearten and engage middle groups but still disappoint two separate and opposing wings of thought. One such group may be discosed to cause trouble because it beeves the good work being done and the little progress being made is too it comes, is more likely to be triggered by the belief of another group, which selieves it has to disrupt and destroy such gradualistic progress in order to build up the pressure for all-out revolution which will give instant satisfaction to long-pent ambitions and desires smashing down the existing order and establishment, so that some shin-

ing new world may rise from its ashes. Fifth, those who are working in the slow vineyard of gradualistic progress must not allow themselves to be discouraged, or caused to throw up their hands and their interest, because violence seems determined to disrupt their efforts, scorn their interest, and destroy the good they may already have accomplished. There is only one certain way the conscientious gradualistic approach can lose in these battles of the ghetto, and that is for the people involved in 't, inside and outside the ghet-

From what has been going on during the past few years, we do not believe anybody needs to urge the individuals and institutions already involved in the problems of the North End to carry on. now, as if there had been no interruption last week, and to take wnat did happen last week not necessarily as a reproach to the slowness of their progress but perhaps as a kind of savage ompliment proving that this progress, hough slow, has still been good enough to make the extremists feel that Hartford is an opportunity gradually slipping away from them. Last week's vioces were more likely to be testimony that all those involved in trying to help must have been doing something right han evidence that they were not doing enough fast enough, although that, one knows, will also be something that re-
