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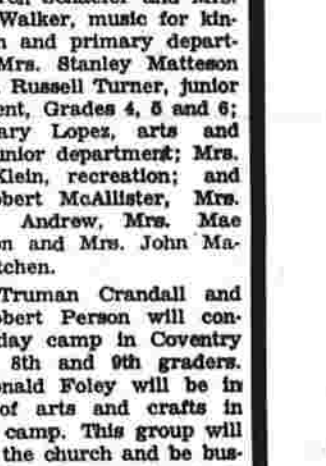

As an experienced player, you are familiar with the principle of transferring dummy's short-ages from one suit to another on tricks that you win in your own hand. Few less familiar is the principle of transferring the shortage on a trick that an opponent wins.

West leads the king of hearts, and East overtakes with the ace of hearts to return his low heart. West wins the second trick with the nine of hearts and then continues with the queen of hearts. This puts you in position to ruff in the dummy, but he makes it foolish to do so. East's dramatic play at the first trick makes it clear that he started with only two hearts and that he expects to overtake the dummy on the third round of the suit.

Nothing good will happen from your point of view, if you ruff the third heart with one of dummy's trumps. East will overtake, and you will eventually be down a diamond as well. Down one.

Don't give up. You don't have to give up so late. When West leads the third heart, discard a diamond from dummy. This transfers dummy's shortage from hearts to diamonds. East will overtake, but it doesn't help him even though he is now in position to overtake dummy on the second round of diamonds.

Sherman Edwards Wins Bet, '1776' a Broadway Success

NEW YORK (AP) — "The greatest gambler aren't those who go to the track and put down their money," said Sherman Edwards. "The real gamblers are those who bet on themselves."

And an eight-year bet on himself by Edwards, composer and lyricist, has paid off with the Broadway musical "1776," based on the American Revolution.

All his life Edwards has been torn between the desire to make music and the desire to teach history.

"But as a kid in the alumni of Manhattan it looked more like I'd wind up a hoodlum," he recalled. "I was running with the wrong gang and getting into trouble."

The starting of piano lessons at the age of 10 in a neighborhood where the hoodlums ruled saved him from the streets.

The piano helped him earn his money through college and he spent a year and half teaching history in high school.

"Then I chickened out," he said. "The glamour of show business drew me."

A man of great versatility, Sherman worked as an actor in productions of "Pins and Needles" and "My Sister Ellen."

He performed as a jazz pianist for bands led by Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey and Louis Armstrong. He became a successful conductor and arranger for such popular singers as Melody Carson and Liza Kirk.

He also composed musical scores for half a dozen Elvis Presley films and wrote some 200 songs, among them such hits as "Wonderful, Wonderful," "Broken-hearted Melody," "See You in September," and "Johnny Got Angry."

Throughout his successful music career, however, Edwards was bothered by guilt pangs. "My conscience bothered me because I had turned my back on history," he said. "So in 1961 I finally made up my mind to do something about it."

"I had always been interested in the American Revolution, so I decided to write an original historical musical about the signing of the Declaration of Independence."

Japanese Swings Into Hi-Fi Boom

TOYO (AP)—The hi-fidelity boom has burst upon Japan and the country that put tiny transistor radios into the hands of millions worldwide has taken a major role in putting high-quality music systems into the world's living rooms.

Sales by three big Japanese companies, which make high-fidelity equipment exclusively, have grown 30 times in the last 10 years and officials are optimistic that the trend continues on the upswing.

"It's just getting popular," says Kazuo Ito of the Pioneer Electronic Corp.

Pioneer, a 21-year-old firm which employs 3,000 persons and makes the whole range of hi-fi equipment, reported sales last year of nearly \$60 million. The combined sales in 1968 of Pioneer, Sansai and Trio Electric were \$117.7 million with more than 60 per cent of it overseas.

Japanese manufacturers estimate that thanks to labor costs lower than in the United States, their prices generally are 10 per cent below those for American-made equipment.

Ex-Air Force Advisor Says Costs Doubled

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Air Force management consultant has told Congress that costs for the nation's primary offensive missiles will run about \$2.7 billion over original estimates.

C. Merton Tyrrell, vice president of Performance Technology Corp., told a joint House-Senate economic subcommittee Tuesday that in 1966 the Air Force had calculated the cost of 600 Minuteman II missiles at \$2.58 billion but that the cost would be about \$7 billion instead.

An Air Force spokesman later disputed Tyrrell's figures, but acknowledged a cost overrun of about \$1 billion would be likely. The spokesman said the Pentagon put the cost of the Minuteman II at \$2.5 billion.

Tyrrell's firm was hired in 1963 and for 3 1/2 years made studies of four major contractors on the project. Another congressional committee six weeks ago heard testimony that Tyrrell's company had been broken by slow payments from the Air Force, allegedly because the firm was coming up with too many embarrassing findings.

The estimate of the huge Minuteman II cost overrun comes at a time when major contractors are fuming over an estimated \$2 billion boost over original estimates for the CIA super-transport.

Another witness before the joint subcommittee on military spending charged that the Pentagon and defense contractors "play games" to underestimate purposes the cost of proposed weapons systems.

Gordon W. Rule, director of procurement control and clearance in the Navy material division, said this "disingenuous" process is used to lure Congress into long-term procurement of weapons whose true costs will be disclosed only in later years.

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)—Not as long ago as a stout 200-pound Nigerian girl was considered a thing of beauty and a sought-after prize.

But fashion-conscious Nigerian girls may soon be expected to lower their provocative headlines, shed their Western-style hair and bleach their skin an off-white color.

Disputed by the number of young girls trying to imitate their white Western counterparts in a country where tradition regards a woman's hair as well covered, some religious authorities are pressuring military government to ban miniskirts and modern beauty aids.

Some black African countries view the influence of Western fashion and false beauty aids as "unpatriotic and a danger to the national character."

In Zambia and Tanzania, a range of politically minded youths have stripped miniskirts and other items of Western fashion, and some have straightened and scrubbed lipstick and powder from their faces.

"What's wrong with our girls?" questioned one newspaper. "They lighten their skins, cover their heads in ugly wigs and prance around in light colored stockings. Why do they envy the white woman who practices straightening and scrubbed lipstick and powder from their faces?"

Not so many years ago African women would have given anything to increase their skin color. "Somebody must stop these girls and tell them black is beautiful," said "Nigerian girls will be beautiful."

In Desperation, Dr. Mount Prays Mary Will Return

NEW CANAAN, Conn. (AP) — "I am in a desperate father, but I'll never give up hope."

And so Dr. Joseph Mount waits by the telephone for word of his missing 10-year-old daughter Mary.

Mary vanished from a park May 27. The FBI and police have given no indication that they have any solid clues as to her fate.

There is a special telephone in the Mount home in this affluent southern Connecticut community. The family prays that good news will come.

Mount, who holds a doctor of philosophy degree, is an executive with International Business Machines Corp. in White Plains, N.Y.

"I have been to the office once or twice since May 27, but most of the time I have been at home—hoping," he says.

Besides checking telephone calls and letters that have flowed into the police station and the family home, officials are checking the area where Mary was last seen, reported observing a white automobile at the scene shortly before the girl vanished.

Persons who had ever been arrested for molesting a child are being screened, a police spokesman said.

A few other leads have been turned up, except one of Mary's shoes found near a taxi pile in the park.

The girl's 12-year-old brother William had left Mary at the local post office, where she had called her shortly afterward and she was gone.

Police conducted what they called their last massive search on June 3, a week after Mary's disappearance.

Last Saturday, students from a nearby Norwalk Community College searched Kewanee Park and the grounds of a monastery in West Norwalk, just south of the Mount home. Again no clues were found.

A reward of \$15,000 has been offered by friends of the Mounts for information leading to the discovery of Mary's whereabouts. The offer expires July 18.

In addition, a Fairfield newspaper has put up a \$10,000 reward for information on Mary's whereabouts and for clues leading to her disappearance.

Police say they have not given the family any special protection and the family has not asked for any.

"They got there a little after 7 p.m. so people were setting up for the show. It really was not planned as a block dance. The streets were not blocked off and, once the crowd had gathered, there was no room for dancing anyway," she said.

Larry Woods of the Exchange, co-leader of the singers, said the show in order to give block bands a chance to perform. They might have gotten bookings from the show.

The Majestic Showdown, a group of nine high school boys, started playing on a truck platform on the corner of Nelson and Harbour St. about 4 p.m. The crowd grew to over 100 people.

"It was a very quiet crowd," she said.

4. Introducing cultural offerings as creative writing, public speaking, great books, world affairs, music appreciation, and advanced courses in English, mathematics, and science offered by Manchester Community College.

Emmerling also recommended expanding next year's program to 75 class offerings with the addition of new classes to the six present general areas. In addition to calling on the Shakered Workshop program, he would like to see the institution of a new curriculum in family living and a food service training course for the intellectually retarded adults.

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Many Tourists Face Trouble Over Illegal Charter Flights

WASHINGTON (AP)—Those who desire to see the world are being told that they may have trouble if they attempt to charter a plane to Europe, according to Civil Aeronautics Board officials.

"We have rumors that there might be as many as 300 charters leaving out of California this year to Europe which may have aspects of illegality," said John G. Adams, CAB spokesman.

"We hear rumors that as many as 100,000 persons may be flying on such flights who really ought not to be moving under a true interpretation of charter regulations," he added.

The large scale of questionable charter flight activity was made official for the first time at a CAB meeting last Thursday arranged by the National Air Carriers Association to enable the supplemental-airline members to outline major financial problems of the charter industry.

After listening to their views, Adams addressed the group on "illegal type charters, particularly from California," that are the board's major concern.

"The airlines involved—supplemental operators mostly—on the travel agents organizing the tours may be letting themselves in for civil penalties and suspension," he said.

There may be little recourse outside of court action, for passengers who pay in advance for the tours that are disapproved last Friday the board refused to waive rules to permit two supplemental airlines—American Flyers Airline, Fort Worth, Tex., and Trans International Airline, Oakland, Calif.—to operate 30 California-Europe flights for the International Student Affairs Club, Los Angeles.

Supplemental airlines are permitted to operate flights for charter groups, but may not sell tickets or carry individual members of the public.

The board said the student club charters apparently were made available to the general public by advertising that failed to comply with regulations, and nonmembers had been accepted on the proposed flights.

If the airlines go ahead and operate the flights in spite of the CAB action, they become subject to the board's enforcement measures.

Last March the CAB forced another supplemental airline, Overseas National Airways of New York City, to cancel a round trip trans-Atlantic charter flight from Los Angeles proposed under a contract with the Goodwill Ambassadors Club. The board allowed the airline to operate two other flights for the group because they were scheduled to leave so soon that participants might have been unable to make other travel arrangements.

"Very often the carrier who is a participant comes in at the last moment and asks the board to legalize something which is illegal," Adams said.

If the carrier itself properly polices these things, they should not have to ask the board to do this.

Adams said there have been instances where the board has warned the airline well in advance that its charter program may be improper, and yet the airline has not so advised the charter participants.

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Peking Says USSR Still Crossing Border

TOKYO (AP) — Red Chinese troops, tanks and armored cars crossed the Sino-Soviet border, according to a report from the Chinese Embassy in Peking, carrying out "provocative operations against the Chinese people," the report said.

A woman border guard reported that she had seen a tank and a truck crossing the border.

The official New China News Agency said the Chinese Foreign Ministry had been informed by the Soviet Embassy in Peking that the border crossing was "provocative."

The Chinese suspect that the Russians are interested in the nuclear installations about 800 miles from the border.

Russian-Chinese disagreements over the 4,000-mile border between the two countries, which was signed in 1924, have more than 100 years. But they have intensified since the Peking-Moscow split developed during the latter part of Nikita Khrushchev's tenure at the head of the Soviet regime.

When Chinese border guards approached the soldiers, the latter said, "The Soviet troops, frequently returning to talk to us, were the first to open fire, killing a Chinese borderman as he was returning to his post."

"Drivers beyond the limits of the 'no-fire zone' fired on our troops," the Chinese frontier guards were compelled to fight back in self-defense.

The Soviet troops subsequently sent large numbers of tanks and armored cars to the border to provide still larger armed contingents. With certain very peculiar exceptions, pubs in England and Wales are open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. except on Sundays, when the dry of throat must drink in haste — from noon to 2 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. (It gets worse in Scotland, or better if you belong to the Temperance League.)

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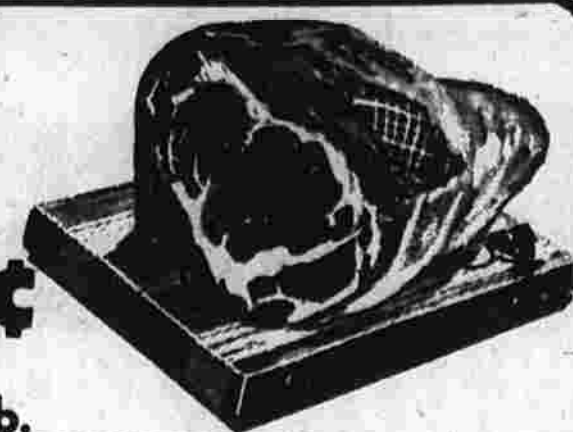

launched into a polar orbit carrying it over the Soviet Union and Red China.

Although Pentagon authorities refused to discuss whether the MOL had a spy mission, NASA sources said "The military project would have conducted some kind of surveillance," probably photographic.

Announcing the MOL cancellation, Deputy Secretary of Defense David Packard indicated that unmanned satellites can do the job as well.

In its official statements, the Defense Department always stressed the objective for MOL of advancing knowledge about man's ability to live and work in space for extended periods.

The Air Force space laboratory would have stayed aloft for 30 days at a time, with two-man crews able to move about in the capsule without assistance.

The NASA project contemplates three men staying for up to 56 days in an orbital workshop which one official said would have the internal space equivalent to a five-room house.

A NASA spokesman said the agency has the funds and approval to work toward a launching in late 1971 or early 1972. Five launches are planned.

As scientists envision it, a space workshop would have a "breathing atmosphere" and would be pressurized to permit working in a shirt-sleeve environment.

The Air Force has been training 14 military astronauts for the MOL, but a NASA spokesman said "We plan to use our own scientific type astronauts."

These may include the first doctor-astronaut and the first astronaut-artist the spokesman said.

In Detroit, the U.S. attorney's office is operating with six assistants—less than half the authorized strength.

Williamian Man Guilty, Kidnap-Rape of Girl, 6

ROCKVILLE, Md. (AP) — Michael Dolbow, 47, of Williamsport, Pa., was convicted of kidnapping and raping a 6-year-old girl.

Dubins was found guilty Tuesday by a Superior Court jury.

The death toll in the war has been estimated at 800,000 to one million. Half a million southerners are believed to have fled to neighboring countries.

Sudan's population of about 12.5 million is 40 per cent Arab and 60 per cent black African. The remainder are Ethiopians, Asians and Europeans.

The Sudan, with an area of 997,500 square miles, is the largest on the African continent.

Nurse Killed In Vietnam

SAIGON (AP) — Lt. Sharon Lane, an Ohio girl who killed the Vietnamese people, was wounded, she is the first U.S. Army nurse to die from hostile fire in the Vietnam war.

The 26-year-old nurse from Canton, Ohio, was shot while working in the Vietnam ward at the 31st Evacuation Hospital at Chu Lai on April 29 and went to work in the Vietnam ward.

She was offered a transfer to another ward a few days ago but turned it down.

"She liked it here and wanted to stay," said Capt. Lawrence W. Motes of Phoenix, Pa. "She liked the Vietnamese, and they appreciated her tenderness and concern for them."

At 8:30 Sunday morning, Lt. Lane was on duty in one of the two general beds that form the 31st's Vietnam ward.

"We were just relaxing before starting to make the patients up at 8 a.m.," said Lt. Patricia B. Carr of Louisville, Ky. "I was sitting behind the desk and Lt. Lane was sitting on an empty bed."

Capt. John D. Meilin Jr. of Greenville, N.C., commander of the hospital detachment from Wiesbaden, said an enemy rocket exploded between the pair and "blasted through through both walls."

Lt. Lane was hit in the throat and died within seconds.

Another nurse, Lt. Sharon Meyer of New Prague, Minn., recalled that Lt. Lane "often said how badly she felt for the Vietnamese people, she even had compassion for wounded VC."

"She would say, 'It's a bad situation for them, too.'"

Twelfth Man Picked Up, Held in Panther Killing

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A man accused in the slaying of a Black Panther member was picked up by New Haven, Conn., police sergeant for an eventual return to the city in which the crime occurred last month.

Lennie McLucas, 23, who faces charges of murder and kidnapping, Tuesday was flown first to Denver, Colo., where two other men were being held in the case.

FBI agents arrested McLucas here Friday and returned him with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. The federal charge was dropped when McLucas was turned over to the New Haven officers. McLucas waived extradition.

Eleven others have been arrested in the torture-slaying of Alex Rackley, 24, in New Haven in mid-May.

New Haven police said Rackley, a Black Panther from New York, was tortured and killed after a kangaroo trial held by the militant organization.
