WASHINGTON (AP)-The House Ways and Means Committee tentatively agreed today on extension of the income surtax coupled with a special allowance that would take wo million low income families off the tax rolls entirely.

The proposal will be vot-ed on formally Monday, Acting Chairman Hale Boggs, D-Ala., told newsmen. This would permit House action next week.

Bogg's announcement, at the Capitol, followed a White House meeting of House leaders with President Nixon and others.

White House spokesman said Nixon received unanimous suppor; from Democratic and Republican House leaders for his proposed 12-month extension of the 10 per cent surcharge. It said he was given expression of confidence that is

#### The Nixon Peace Strategy

The interpretative writing done in the ake of the Midway Conference by hose correspondents who seem to have stabilished best contact with the new dstration at Washington seems to hink President Nixon has a Vietnam olicy not too difficult to describe.

irst, he wants to buy time, from his own American public, in order to let time, and policy work on the other erties involved in the war. The shownamhip of the Midway Conference, and ennouncement of a token reduction of American force in Vietnam, fits into this aim. It buys time from domestic critics without seriously impairing the actual military capacity we maintain in Vietnam. It is an extra dividend of this time-buying appeasement of domestic latigue with the war that it also constitutes a small piece of propaganda pressure to use on North Vietnam, as in the already frequent repetition of the demand that North Vietnam likewise withdraw troops.

Second, while he buys time from his war critics at home without really elackening our military pressure in Vietnam, the President hopes to be able to keep udging both North Vietnam and South ietnam closer to some political formula by which the transition from war to peace might be accomplished in South Vietnam. Since this war has now long een one in which there is to be victory, not only because no one can win such a thing, but also because no one can afford to concede such a thing the political arrangement to follow i to be a compromise. Specificaly, it has to be a compromise which effects existing political divisions and strengths in South Vietnam, as they would reflect themselves if they could ever get to a ballot box unmolested. In order to bring itself into acceptance of such a prospect, the present Saigon government would have to forego any utomatic guarantee of its own coninuance in power. North Vietnam and the Vietcong would have to be content to accept a proportionate place in the new political structure, as they might win it in free elections, instead of any guaranteed equality of status and powr. But the compromise might involve conceding them sectional political power which would be uncontested, in their special areas.

All this is accompanied by the whoopla of hands clasped in salutes to welcoming demonstrations, but it seems to be a lot more than showmanship which is involved. Rather, what is really going on is a delicate, intricate game of pressures, in which all the knowledge, experience and intelligence the Nixon administration has been able to gather for its Vietnam counseling have devised and are supervising something they have decided is the best strategy toward peace in Vietnam.

This, at least, is what the interpretative writing which seems closest to the Nixon administration seems to think is being tried. It suggests, to us, that time ought to be granted. We would hope that both the White House and our military command would be satisfied to let the actual military situation simmer down, without ordering any more Hamburger Hills.

#### A Peace-Keeping Bargain?

The other day the United Nations security Council voted unanimously to continue for another six months, until Dec. 15, the presence of a United Nations peace-keeping force on the island of Cyprus.

If the UN police force proves as successful in the next six months as it has over the five years it has been maintained in Cyprus, it will be guarding the peace with 3,480 men, while the dollar bill will be for some \$15,000,000. This is the number of police and the number of dollars required to keep a relatively small war from happening The police come from volunteer forces om members of the United Nations.

The dollars come from voluntary contributions from United Nations members. The cost of the war these men and

Meanwhile, the voluntary money for even the peace-keeping operation in Cyprus is running low, so that the United Nations is acting as if there might com a time, after next Dec. 15, when it might be forced, through lack of funds, to step out of the Cyprus situation and leave in open to a resumption of the war which was quieted five years ago. Can anyone imagine any peace-keepin operation which, no matter how many years of service it required from how many men, or no matter what its cost in dollars, would not be an infinite number of times cheaper than the war being prevented

Would it not be an instant bargain, to be instantly accepted, if we could agree to put 100,000 United Nations peace-keeping forces into the Near East and to spend a few billions keeping them there

#### More Hungry Than Smart

Candlestick Park, that modern cave of the winds, is going to be done over. The present sami-circle of concrete stands will be made into a full circle, thus increasing the seating capacity from 42,500 to 55,000 for baseball and 60,000 for football. Even more im portantily, putting a complete circle around the field may make it a little more difficult for the perpetual gales of the locality to find their way down to the playing floor of the stadium. This may benefit the spectators, in helping them keep warm, and the players of all games, in eliminating the wind as a competitor

What is particularly interesting, how ever, is the story of the attendance figures which, more than the wind, have made such improvements for Candlestick Park seem necessary.

When the baseball Giants first player in Candlestick Park, in 1960, they drew 1,795,356 paying customers, and subsequently, through 1967, they averaged 1,400,000 a year. Last year, however, Giant attendance

fell to 837,000. It was also last year that the Kansar City Athletics arrived in nearby Oakland. looking for the same kind of West Coast gold which had originally drawn the Dodgers and Giants.

Last year, in their first year at Oakland, the Athletics drew . 837,000, the attendance as the Giants acros the Bay. That was not good for a first season in a new city; it was, rather the first time in all these modern shift ing of franchises that a new city had failed to buy at least a million admissions in the first season.


Surveying a aituation in which the Giants first moved out into a new ballpark which soon revealed itself to be a monstrosity both for players and spectators, and in which the Athletics came out to settle down close by so that neither the Athletics nor the Giants had a good year at the box office, and in which these two clubs now seem met in a battle for survival more intense than anything they ever had to face in their one-time homes back East surveying such a situation one can conclude that it is sometimes a pity some of our baseball owners aren't as smart as they are hungry.

#### **Power Cost Tag Shifted**

The private power industry in New Eng'and has been the whipping boy of public power proponents for many years, even in the face of evidence that the rates paid by consumers in the region stemmed from factors having nothing to do with the industry's efficiency or financial structure. Only last December the Northeast Power Association's annual Public meeting reheated the old chestnuts about the private industry which, it was said, had been keeping rates high to the disadvantage of individual consumers and major industries alike. because the power interests op-the federal government's proposed Dickey-Lincoln School hydroposed electric project in Northern Maine, "distorted" and "misleading" figures had been used to impair the program's chances of passage. It was true, at the time, that New England electric rates were the highest in the nation - though they had been steadily dropping, as any consumer could tell if he had kept records of his bills. It was also true that fuel transportation costs to New England points and utility taxes in the region verbalanced the industry's gains in ef-

But now the highest-rate label has been removed from New England by ne Federal Power Commission itself. Middle Atlantic states, according to the FPC's 1968 report, have "the highest bills in the 100 kilowatt-hour and 500 kilowatt-hour categories, and will soon surpass New England in the 250 kilowatt-hour bill." In the latter category the average New England bill went down four cents while it went up two cents in the Middle Atlantic re-

gion. Since industry in New England is stressing nuclear genera-tion, there is reason to expect further improvement in efficiency - and the rate structure - since fuel transportation costs will cease to be a major factor.-SPRINGFIELD UNION

**Russia Turns the Clock Back** The Halt Watch the Blind

#### By ANATOL ESHUB The Washington Post

For two years, I have watched Russia's ruler grimly attempt to turn the clock back. In part, I believe, it has been a reversion to Stalinism, sithough there has been no purge of Communist loaders, and the political prisoners number scores of thousands, rather than

millions. In part, it has been a throwback to older tradition - to Russia as the "Gendarms of Europe," the guardian of absolutism and orthodoxy, its armies on permanent maneuvers, polsed to menace democracy and national independence beyond Russia's own frontiers. However, the most striking "return" to past ways has had more tragic dimensions. For, as I left Moscow, many Soviet friends had come to believe that the present Kremlin rulers are leading Russia down the same melancholy path as the Romanov Tsurs a century ago. By all accounts of those who have dealt with them, the men who deposed Nikita Khrushchev in 1964 are cynical, crude, narrow-minded, frightened for their own privileges. They have shown themselves unable and increasingly unwilling to risk the reforms, small or large, required to meet the complex needs and aspirations of an ever more literate, sophisticated Russian society. The present rulers quickly turned their backs on the progressive evolution in

Yugoslavia, which Khrushchev had fitfully sought to emulate. They used. armed force to strangle Czechoslovakia's peaceful democratization, which was pointing Russia herself a way out of the vicious circle of powers, privilege terror and fear created by Leon, Trot sky and Stalin. None of the Russian leaders himself stepped forward as a Soviet Dubcek or Tito.

Instead, the Kremlin bosses - Brenh ney, Susloy and Shelepin in the party machine; Grechko, Yepishev and Yakubovsky in the army; Andropov as well as the faceless professionals of the KGB (security police), Russia's "invisible government" - have turned increasingly to repression and reaction, xenophobis and mystification. They appear to be counting on the fears and prejudices of the "dark people," the traditional mob of Russia's tragic history - and they are plunging the country's finest spirits

Yet their oppressive, anachronistic system cannot produce meat, apartments or happy smilles even for the "dark people." The sense of suffocation and choking among the educated is matched by the sullenness and permanext irritability of the masses. For both, alcohol is often the sole relief. Abortions, ulcers, high blood pressure, psychosomatic illness are the toll exacted on an incalculable scale.






