We can imagine the future ourselves hoping we might be granted the grace living, once again, in an era when there was among us an actual live demand that we honor our own principles, live up to our own values, and banish willing self-decelt and hypocrisy from our tongues and our actions.

The result has not been real competition with products which do cost less and which are not afraid of looking a little different.

strangely, illogically, perversely, American buyers are still going for the small 100,000 a month. It is, quite obviously, no one's loss

out their own. The buying public gets a full choice of wares, from one source or another. Except, of course, for the real transportation bargain that must exist somewhere still unborn in the American potential.
