

The United Nations proclaimed 1968 "Human Rights Year," and the KGB, Russia's secret police, began its cele-bration early. In January, two young Democrats, Yuri Galanskov and Alex Ginsburg, were placed on trial. Another young man, Alexel Dobrovolsky, had de-cided after a year in prison to turn state's evidence, and in his testimony disclosed the larger aims of the KGB

and its political sponsors. "I was brought up to worship Stalin," Dobrovolsky suid. "It was the de-Stalinization campaign and the mistakes of Khrushchev that turned me bitter against Soviet power."


Slowly but inexorably over the past four years, Khruushchev's successors (nearly all of whom entered the Central Committee at Stalin's 1952 Party Congress) have sought to restore the "glories" and "security" of the old Stalin days. They have sought to silence the basic questions about the Soviet sys-tem which Khrushchev had, perhaps inadvertently, raised at the 1956 and 1961 Party Congresses. Russia Turns Clock Back Sowing Seeds of Revolution

of Geneva (1955), Camp David (1959) and the Moscow test-ban treaty (1963), left indelible traces on the minds of Russia's educated younger generation. The official effort to turn back the clock has attracted greater attention than the considerable resistance to it, or the signs that each new repression and especially the Czechoslovak tragedy, have made more and more Soviet citizens lose hope of peaceful reform "from above." In short, re-Stalinization like the autocracy, orthodoxy and russification of Alexander III (1881-1895) appears to be sowing seeds of revolu-

Already, the repression has begun to create, as Tsarism did a century ago, a pantheon of heroes and martyrs among revolutionaries - most of whom were loyal critics, at most, of the regime in Khrushchev's day. The major turning point was, surely, the decision five years ago to arrest the writers Ardrei Sinyavsky and Yuli Daniel, who were tried and condemned to long years at forced labor in February, 1966. The criminal prosecution of Sinyavaky and Daniel took p'ace despite protect peti-tions and letters signed by virtually every important intellectual in Moscow - and, according to unimpeachable sources, against the contrary advice of Mikhail Suslov, the Kremlin's veteran ideologist. Sualov argued that the writers should be punished only by political means — such as expulsion from the Writers Union — as Boris Pasternak had been, because of "Doctor Zhivago,"

### Dirksen Can Count 33

New York Times editorial accuses ator Everett Dirksen of all kinds of ischief, and foresees all kinds of dire entialities, because & bas auddenly discovered that 33 of the 34 state ecemary to call a constitutional conention to deal with the apportionment of state legislatures have already acted.

The Times says that we have never seen the like of such a convention since 1787. It offers the hope that some of the calls for such a convention may be ruled availd, because they have been made v legislatures which do not themselves conform to the one man one vote rule aid down by the Supreme Court. And he Times says that "a Constitution that has stood the tests of mearly two cenuriss may need amending from time to time, but it must not be laid open for andom surgery."

To all this we would reply that if there was ever random surgery of the Constitution it was that committed by he Supreme Court in its one man one vote decision when it threw out of the Constitution, as it applied to the states, the very same legislative system of repntation the United States itself had the Constitution for itself.

This nation was founded on the Connecticut Compromise, under which one souse of the legislature was elected to represent geographical political units while the other house was elected to represent population. The Supreme Court's decision, coming nearly two cen turies after this, reached back and took this system away from Connecticut and the other states. But, at the same time, t coyly refused to take the same system away from the federal government, and decree an end to the system by which the United States Senate is elected to represent geographical political units. It also failed the consistency test when it failed to notice that, our system for electing Presidents is likewise outside the one man one vote principle.

Benator Dirksen has obstinately clung to the idea that the Constitution ought to be amended to permit to such states as may choose it a system of electing one of their two legislative houses on the basis of geographical political units. But quite obviously the Senator couldn't be doing it all alone. He has been picking up support, primarily, we think, because of the sordid decline in the quality and performance of so many one man one vote legislatures, in which the harsh political reality has so often seemed to be no vote at all for the interest and concern of the average citi-

### Pompidou

We had better get used to Georges Pompidou, and rid ourselves of the habit of pronouncing the name as if we expected it to end up in some kind of a joke. He is the new President and the new leader of France, by a vote more handsome than any ever received by his predecessor, Charles de Gaulle. And, although he ran better than his predecesor even while posing as an adherent to many of his policies, his performance in office is expected to be quite different from that of de Gaulle,

The tell-tale difference between the two men seems to center in the description of Pompidou as a pragmatist.

When this is the word applied to him, one wonders whether this poor world can stand any more characters who exercise the position and power of leadership on a basis of practical opportunism rather than of principle. Pragmatism, the only native American philosophy, sometimes wears a shabby aspect, and sometimes gets its practitioners into trouble they might never encountered if they hadn't been so willing to accept shallow maneuvers away from oublesome decisions.

But one must also, when one considers that Pompidou is called a pragmatist, take a look at the prime example of the extreme opposite to pragmatism - the style of operation of de Gaulle himself. De Gaulle himself is out of office be-

are he insisted op going to the people on a minor question of principle, and here is some reason to believe the people rejected him not because they insgreed with him on the specific principle involved, but because they resented his insistence on making a relatively petty question of principle so large and portant a matter.

Because de Gaulle believed in principle, he was able to lead his fight for a freedom of France, and that was a t and tremendous accomplishment But his same willingness to stake very thing on the importance of some abstract intangible led him into controversial leadership of the France he had helped

Pompidou, it is said, would rather have worksday calm than a perilously exciting greatness, would rather adjust to present day historical realities than try to turn the clock back, and tends to be practical rather than passionate about

Scientista at Ohio State University are whistling "Bye, Bye, Blackbird" as they work. But so far their studies-covering everything from hallucinatory drugs o birth control pills - have failed to rid the state of a leading pest. Blackbirds like to dine on young corn, often eating only enough to spoil an ear. They cost Ohio farmers some \$2 million last year. For the entire nation, the annual damage runs to around \$55

A hallucinatory drug, designed to send the birds winging off on LSD-like "trips," has proved effective in some areas. Blackbirds, like many flock ing birds, can be "spooked" by other members of the flock acting abnormally. A contraceptive chemical that would prevent fertilization of the bird's eggs is another humane measure being

Also under study is development o corn varieties with husks too tough for the birds to penetrate. How "humane" it is to get blackbirds hooked on drugs or to grow beakresistant corn is a good question. But when man and bird clash over a corn crop, one has to give. In Ohio, the birds sti'l have the advantage. -SPRING-FIELD UNION

### **Russia Turns the Clock Back**

At the Stalin Shrine in his mountain birthplace at Gori, Soviet Georgia, a venerable guide told me in April 1968, there had been 188,000 visitors the year before, mainly official delegations. However, she announced cheerfully, "we expect many more" in the future.

The official Soviet Press has certainly been doing its best to help business at the late dictator's shrine. From pop weeklies like Ogonyok to elite party manuals like Agitator, the official media have been active - particularly during 1969 - in "restoring Stalin's place as an outstanding military strategist, economic planner and friend of lit. erature. Victims of Stalin's terror formally "rehabilitated" under Khruschev, have been condemned anew, while even supporters of the notorious geneticist, Trofim Lysenko, have again received official encouragement.

The novel is surely destined either for his deak drawer or for that unique Soviet institution, Samizdat" or self-publishing, in which perhaps three carbon typescripts by the original author proliferate, reader by reader, into hundreds of copies passed from friend to friend.

Samizdat has become indispensable t thinking Soviet citizens as the Kremlin rulers have turned increasingly obscurantist and barred access to outside sources of information. They have restricted travel abroad, cut back cultural exchange programs, promoted suspicion of foreign tourists, and, upon invading Czechoslovakia, resumed jamming o foreign broadcasts. Thus, Samizdat, with its crowded

onionskin pages, has come to perform the functions of a free press. In the bast two years, the content of Samizdat pub lications has been shifting radically from cultural to purely political themes from banned literary works to protest manifestoes and translations of foreign anti-Communist classics.
