

"I Will Not Get Frozen In" President Nixon, in his Thursday evening press conference, seemed to be giving the issues of our time the same kind earnest but inconclusive circular chase he has been exhibiting ever since

he assumed the direct responsibilities of The fact that, for all his earnestness, this circular chase remains the surface sum of his achievement, week after week. Hlustrates the tremendous magnitude and the difficulty of the problems confronting any President in these times. No other President would be solving them early, if at all; Lyndon Johnson, to put it bluntly, was not handling them, and actually let them drive him

out of office. When they do not budge, or lie down, for President Nixon, he, like Johnson before him, relies on physical motion, like a journey to the Pacific, to create the impression that his is an administration of movement. Or he holds a press conference, in which he hopes to answer the same old questions from some higher imminence of answer than last time. But the motions he goes through become more and more familiar: he is not reporting anything so much as he is buying time, keeping open the franchise, and looking for the happy insight, or

he unexpected break. There was one moment in the Thursday night press conference when President Nixon was given an opportunity to express himself, not on any particular merry-go-round issue, but on the way he tries to ride his circuit.

"My question to you," went the newsman's question, "is perhaps somewhat philosophicai How do you keep from being locked in on a decision involving something as pressurized as Vietnam? How do you determine once a policy is adopted that it continues to be right?"

President Nixon answered this way: "This is one of my major concerns, and it's one of the reasons why I peraps allow more controversy and frankly even open dissent-as I note from reading all the newspapers-within our Administration than in any recent years. "I believe that a President must constantly re-examine the policies. And I am re-examining our policy on Vietnam every day. I'm examining the military policy. I'm examining the political pol icy; our diplomatic options. And I will not get frozen in."

That one phrase, "I will not get frozen in," is perhaps as good and deep a description as any historian may provide of the Nixon effort during these first few months of office.

There was the great early hope, touchingly innocent in so experienced a politician, that serious application could produce some master formulas which could be applied to various situations with various calculable results. There has been the discovery that everything is too complex for that, and that both analysis and formula resist being shaped into any neat package. There has been the realization that early ideas tentatively put into operation may not work, after all, and may need reinforcement, or change.

Instead, then, of being able to concentrate on strong drive behind a few firmly and clearly defined solution-policles, the new President finds himself deprived of any such satisfying privilege, and confronted instead, with a necessity for keeping "options open," for avoiding getting "frozen in" even on any of his own first high hope formu-

It doesn't seem to have occurred to a single scientist, or layman, that what may be waiting up on the moon may be some priceless elixir which, when mixed into our streams and rivers and lakes and oceans or loosed into our air, will turn them all primeval pure again. Even though we have had ample report on the browncolor of the moon's surface, no one has mentioned the possibility that the moon's surface may conceivably consist of pure gold dust. We human beings, obviously, have grown and lived and suffered our way out of any expectancy that something miraculously wonderful is ever going to happen to us. We think germ, not gold, thoughts.
