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

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Nixon administration proposed today a nationwide ban on voter literacy tests and on state residency requirements presidential elections.

The administration also called for enforcement powers that would allow the attorney gener-al to dispatch federal voting examiners and observers anywhere in the nation.

The package, submitted by Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell, would be a major expansion of the 1965 Voting Rights Act, which primarily affected seven Southern states where more than 800 000 Margare than 800,000 Negroes have been added to the voting rolls in the last four years. "We have come to the firm

conclusion that voting rights is no longer a regional issue," Mitchell told a House judiciary subcommittee considering an extension of the 1965 law.

"It is a national concern for every American and must be treated on a nationwide basis,"

Although much wider in scope than the current legislation, the administration proposals amount to a partial concession to the South since that region no longer would be singled for federal attention. Many Southern congressme

and officials say the 1965 act no longer is needed. As Mississippi Atty. Gen. A. F. Summer testified here last week: "If there did exist inequities in the right to vote in Mississippi, they no longer exist." If the law is extended, some

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





That "Home Of Their Own"

The National Association of Home Builders has revised its prediction about he number of new homes it sees being uilt in this country in 1969. The revision is down from an original forecast o 1,700,000 new homes this year, or a 13 cent increase over the figure for down to a new figure three per cent lower than last year's construction This is bad news for those Americans who need new homes this year, and bad news, perhaps, for that section of our economy which ought to be bury building these new homes But then, one feels constrained

ask, what can one expect? There are few houses being built anywhere in the country to sell for less

than 425,000. People who want to buy such houses nay have trouble getting their mortgages, and, in some sections of the country, may have to be willing to saddle themselves with interest rates as high as 9 per cent.

Here is at least one phase of living in which the inflation which nobody really seeks to control-it is such fun swinging ever upward-is operating in reality to reduce drastically the opportunity for Americans to aspire to one of the most fundamental of all satisfactions and rewards in life-that of owning one's own

Meanwhile, the construction money and labor which might be going into homes for sale, if people could still afford to buy homes, goes into a sudden proliferation of apartments, to be rented to the people who can't afford to buy homes, at rates so high they will never be able to save the down payment on a home.

Any trend in the economy which handles the natural aspirations of ordinary people so roughly, which permits itself such ridiculous levels of cost and rates of mortgage interest, has to be considered an insanity. If no sense can prevail, the law of supply and demand vill eventually make itself felt. It can be rough, too, and justly so, on those who make the mistake of assuming that everything can always keep going up, up, up, Unfortunately, in this present era, the guilt, and the possible retribution, seem upon almost all of us, in whatever field we may be, for there is none of us who has ever complained that the golden goose was being squeezed too hard when we thought our name might be on the particular egg that

was on the way. This is really, one begins to think, one inflation nobody can fairly blame on anybody else. Politicians, bankers, industrialists, speculators, management, labor, and consumers have all pooled their effort, their acceptance, their cupidity and their shortsightedness into nourishment of what is now their mutual

When we can get to where we can say that a young fellow starting out in life has a fair chance of getting his family into a home of their own sometime in the first 10 or 15 years of his narriage, then we can proclaim life livable again, and the economy, although less exciting, a little more sane.

Watching The Rhine

Industrialized though its shores may be, the Rhine had, until the other day, succeeded in supporting a fish population. Then it was discovered that millions of fish were dying of some as yet

unidentified chemical cause. It may be, according to one report and theory, that a barge laden with some insecticide that poses little danger to human beinge was, by mistake, or by orime, dumped into the river bed. It may be, according to another theory, that some nerve gas containers dumped into the river at the close of World War II have finally rusted through, releasing their deadly contents into the river water.

Cattleowners have been warned to keep their herds away from the river. Cities which use the Rhine for water supply have been forced to shut it off. The removal of the dead tish is becoming a major public works project. erhaps, despite the natural damage, the potential injury to human beings on be controlled.

We aren't supposed to know what to make of the latest news from Russia. but we do know exactly what to make

It is all part of a story predicted long ago, and predicted on the assumption hat human nature and human instinct is not subject to as many barriers as those who would like to organize everything politically would like.

The Russians, whatever else they are, are primarily people. And, as people, they are more like Americans than any other people on eath.

We invite Manchester parents of high school graduates, who recently were aware of certain events and activities of a social nature, to consider what goes on in Russia at this season of the year

Pravda, the other day, thought that graduation parties were getting a little lush. And it seems it had reasons for its complaint. It seems that graduating classes, in Russia these days, have but fet-dances which last to the small hours of the morning, and that it sometimes costs some families a fortune to ge their teenage daughters the dresses they want for such parties.

After the graduation buffet-dance i over, the young Russian graduates do not go home to bed, as proper young teenagers might. Instead, they set out to watch the dawn come up, not on Rhode Island shore, but in Red Square. Reportedly, they welcome the dawn with considerable jollity, and in the best of spirits, sometimes vodka What time they straggle home from isquamicut, pardon us, from Red Square, the Moscow correspondents don't

tell us, but they do tell us enough to let us know that Russian parents have their anxious moments, Russian teenagers their ability to insist on staying out all night, and Russian society its problem with a younger generation which seems to keep widening the gap.

But if Russians are as much like this extends to these graduation teenagers, most of them get home without having done any of the unspeakable things their parents spend prom night worrying about.

Have To Read To Graduate?

How much should a high-school graduate know? Well, come 1972 in California he will have to know as much as an righth-grader, at least in the subjects of

eading and mathematics. That might sound like double talk, but the State Board of Education adopted e new standard only a week ago. Vhat's more, said Max Rafferty, state superintendent of public instruction, California might be one of the first state to adopt such a proficiency standard for high-school graduation, even if it is at e eighth-grade level.

For years, California codes had precribed lists of courses and numbers of hours of instruction needed by a stucent wishing to graduate from high school. But no where in the lists was there anything that said how much a graduate had to know. Theoretically, it would be possible under existing regula ions for a student with only first-grade ability in reading and math to be pasted along from grade to grade and eventualy receive a high-school diploma.

A school can determine whether its prospective graduates can meet the eight-grade standards in several ways. Under existing law, all students must take state-wide tests in reading and mathematics at various stages of the schooling. Any student who scores at the eight-grade level on these tests will have met the state requirement. A student who fails these tests can qualify later by passing locally selected exams based on state - adopted, eighth-grade reading and math books or by "satisfactorily" completing a one-semester diagnostic and remedial course someime during the four years of high school. State officials do not think the new standard is too low. It is a minimum requirement and local school districts can, and most likely will, set much higher standards. Furthermore, said Mrs. Sevmour Mathieren, a member of the state Board of Education. California's eighthgrade textbooks give a quite rigorous course of instruction. "I would hate to

take a test on it," she said. A dissenting view was offered by board member Dorman Commons. "I don't agree it is a great leap forward," he said. "We are giving the appearance of change. What we are doing is what we have done in the past to give a highschool diploma to anyone who finishes four years of high school." The board was required to adopt the standard under a sweeping education-

The teen-agers entered the capsule at exactly 10 a.m. today. They have been working on the capsule, which meafeet long by 10 feet high, since the spring vacation. Mike Peretto said he's wanted to do this since sixth grade, but when he tried to convince his friends, "they always told me I was crazy," he smiled. This year, though, Mike was

successful. Although the cube looks crude from the outside, it's really quite luxurious inside. The boys have running water supplied by a garden hose, electricity, air conditioning, a portable television, a stove, and wall-to-wall carpeting, not to nention many assorted games. books, and a radio for each crew member.

Even though "the cube" measures eight - by - eight by . ten feet on the outside, the interior is considerably more cramped than that. Inside, there are three bunks, on above the other, on one wall. the sink and stove, plus food storage underneath on another wall, and the fourth bunk and a kitchen table are on the other side of the room.

Every nook and cranny of the capsule is crammed with something, and the boys seem to have supplies for any conceiv able emergency. Just in case something unforseen comes up, a buzzer system has been rigged to summon help. In addition to the buzzer, a small light has been installed on the outside of "the cube", which will signal to observers that everything inside is A-OK.







WASHINGTON (AP) - The fiery crash of a Dominican Republic cargo plane in a Miami street this week has called attention to a longtime concern How to assure full foreign aircraft and crew compliance with

U.S. safety regulations. A chief reason for sidestep ping the question is its sensitive plomatic and political nature. Former Civil Aeronautics Board chairman Joseph 'Connell points out that if a U.S. airline is in financial straits, doubts naturally arise as to the safety of its operation. For the same reason, he savs, the airline venture of a new or small country can often be regarded as dubious. Additionally O'Connell says, "It is difficult for the Federal Aviation Administration to police airlines in this

Another disquieting practice to U.S. authorities-and they only talk about it privately-is the relaxed attitude of some foreign government's toward the use of wine and other alcoholic peverages by pilots and other crew members.

However, O'Connell notes that major foreign airlines have outstanding safety records and adhere to standards that my be even more strict than those effective here. And crashes of for eign planes in the United States

are comparatively rare. The United States has bilateral air agreements with many nations that specifically outline safety regulations. Also there is e International Civil Aviation rganization-ICAO-of Montreal, A United Nations-related organization which sets airworhy standards for member na-

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



CREOLE CUISINE is virtually the only original cuisine of distinction in America. It is a fabulous food, combining Spanish, French and American Indian influences and stirred tastefully together by Negro cooks. New Orleans began as a French possession and there were years that the city lived under Spanish rule. The resulting cuisine is called creole. A-Creole is anyone born in the colonies of European ancestry, French or Spanish or both.

Indian wild herbs, particularly file powder, made by the Choctows from the tender young leaves of the sassafras, played an important part in the development of creole cook ing. File is an essential ingredient of gumbo, of course!

The Creoles used shrimp in many dishes, from appetizers to soups. One of the best known of these dishes is shrimp creole served on a bed of piping hot rice.

SHRIMP CREOLE

- 1 pound shrimp, fresh or frozen, or 1 (10 or 12-ounce) bag peeled and deveined shrimp
- 1/4 cup olive or salad oil 2 medium onions, sliced
- 1 green pepper, cut in strips
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano 1 (1-pound) can tomatoes
- 1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce

Clean shrimp, if necessary. Cook shrimp 1 to 3 minutes in boiling salted water, timing cooking after water comes to a boil after shrimp have been added. Drain shrimp and set aside. Heat oil in skillet. Add onion slices and pepper strips and cook until tender. Blend in flour. Add salt, pepper, oregano, toma-toes and tomato sauce. Cover and cook over low heat 15 to 20 minutes. Add shrimp to sauce. Serve over cooked rice. Makes 3 to 4 servings.
