

## House Extends Income Surtax

WASHINGTON (AP) — Acting after a last-minute plea from President Nixon and under strong pressure from leaders of both parties, the House has narrowly passed a bill to extend the income surtax.

The bill approved Monday 210-205, now goes to the Senate where leaders predict consideration may take three months.

Technically the 10 per cent surtax expired at midnight, only hours after the House action.

However, Congress already has voted to continue the withholding rates which include the surcharge through July, and the tax itself can later be extended retroactive to July 1. Senate leaders have said a further 60-

**SURCHARGE:** Under a law enacted last year, all individual taxpayers above the lowest brackets and all corporations are charged an extra 10 per cent of their income tax. The surtax officially expired at midnight, but a special act allows collection of withholding revenue under the old rate through July.

**Proposal:** The bill President Nixon wants and approved by the House extends the surtax at 10 per cent through Dec. 31, then at 6 per cent through June 30, 1970. The Treasury says this would yield \$7.6 billion in this fiscal year that started today

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day extension of the withholding rates probably will be sought.

Nixon wants the surtax to continue at a 10 per cent rate through December and then at 5 per cent until the end of next June.

Opposition to the bill has come mainly from congressmen who fear any chance for far-reaching tax reforms will be lost if not included in the surtax extension measure.

Just before the close of House debate Monday night, Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford read a letter from the President aimed at swaying such opponents.

"I want to remove any vestige of doubt as to the commitment of this administration to prompt any meaningful tax reform," Nixon said.

Earlier in the day Nixon met at the White House with 25 Republican congressmen, most of them opponents of the surtax extension. All but 10 of these ended up voting for the bill.

In all, Nixon got 154 House Republican votes while 26 GOP members opposed it.

House Democratic leaders gave strong support to the extension, but only 58 votes for the bill came from that side of the aisle. Opposed were 179 Democrats.

When President Lyndon B. Johnson proposed the Surtax last year, 114 Republicans voted for it.

**California In Crisis** (AP) — SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California began a new fiscal year without a budget today and Gov. Ronald Reagan finally refused to accept an emergency bill to keep the state running for 30 days.

As a result, the nation's most populous state was plunged into unprecedented fiscal chaos. Salaries for state employees were cut off and Reagan asked them to work for free. State officials no longer had authority to pay wages or bills.

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**Ohio Locked In Dispute** (AP) — COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The Ohio Legislature, embroiled in a battle over spending procedure, has not approved Gov. James A. Rhodes' \$4.1 billion appropriations bill, leaving the state without authority to spend money.

The Republican-controlled legislature had met in a marathon session in hopes of approving the bill by midnight Monday—the end of the fiscal year—but adjourned early this morning when a joint Senate-House conference committee could not resolve differences over the measure.

Without the appropriations bill, which covers the next two years, the state cannot meet its payroll or mail welfare checks.

The hitch developed over proposed changes in the state controlling board, which now consists of the state finance director, attorney general, auditor and two legislators. The board determines when and where the money will be spent.

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## Congressmen Try Welfare Budgets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some congressmen, who earn \$42,500 per year, are getting an inkling of what it's like to try to feed their families on a welfare budget.

A half dozen House and Senate members are in the fifth of a six-day program of living on a food allowance averaging 15 cents a day per person for meals.

"I'm hungry," commented Rep. Abner J. Mikva, D-Ill. "You start thinking about eating too much of the time. You're constantly aware of the fact that you're not getting enough to eat."

The congressmen are taking part in a program sponsored by the National Welfare Rights Organization, which is trying to win a guaranteed annual income of \$5,800 a year for a family of four.

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## Free Food Stamps Lose

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supporters of a proposal to give free food stamps to impoverished families have lost a close fight in the Senate Agriculture Committee, but say they will carry the battle to the floor.

The committee rejected the proposal 7-5 Monday.

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### No Daffodils

LONDON (AP) — A single daffodil, carefully packed in a cardboard box, arrived at Buckingham Palace Monday night after a 4,500-mile journey from Kenya.

It was 5-year-old Sarah Kathaga Ngiti's contribution toward solving a royal crisis.

Daffodils are the national emblem of Wales. But not one could be found in Britain to decorate the banquet and ball following Prince Charles' investiture as Prince of Wales today.

"Dear Prince Charles," Sarah wrote: "I heard about your troubles, and I am sending a flower for you for Tuesday for Wales."

Sarah found the flower in a Nairobi garden after hearing by radio that the investiture ball was running short of daffodils.

The flowers usually bloom in profusion in Kenya at this time of the year. Thousands had been ordered for the celebrations, but Kenya—like Britain—is having an unusually hot spell. Result: No Daffodils.

## Critic Says Funds Misused for ABM

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration was accused today of illegally spending \$400 million from funds appropriated for the discarded Sentinel missile defense system on the revamped Safeguard program.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., in a prepared statement, said the Pentagon spent the money on Safeguard missiles and radar equipment although Congress has not approved the project and in spite of a Defense Department promise not to use the Sentinel funds.

"The fact is," Nelson said, "Congress has not authorized or appropriated one cent for the new Safeguard system. The administration's decision to spend Sentinel monies on the Safeguard system is a clear violation of the Congress' law-making authority."

Nixon junked the "thin" Sentinel system, which was designed to protect the nation's major cities, last March and asked Congress to approve the Safeguard system, aimed at defending U.S. land-based offensive missiles.

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## NAACP Aide Rejects Idea of Reparation

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — A top official of the nation's largest civil rights organization has rejected a move by black militants to collect reparations from white churches for wrongs done to Negroes.

"In our long crusade, we have never subscribed to the reparations concept," Bishop Stephen G. Spottswood, board chairman of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said in the keynote address Monday night at the church's annual convention.

"It is easy and it is emotionally appealing, but it is not the fairest way for this white generation to redress the wrongs still visited upon this black generation and its children," said Bishop Spottswood, of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C.

Bishop Spottswood described as "glibble" a task force of church leaders who recommended the National Council of Churches raise \$500 million in response to reparations demands by black militant James Forman.

"We believe the best way is that chosen by some denominations who have refused Mr. Forman's idea of a paper organization," he said, "but who have agreed to increase by millions of dollars their work in behalf of equality of opportunity for Negro Americans."

Bishop Spottswood voiced support of "the solid and long-standing legitimate grievances of black students."

He backed demands for more black faculty and creation of black study centers—"providing that all such centers are open to white as well as black students."

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## Church Boosts Blacks' Role

BOSTON (AP) — Prodded by a Negro clergy group, the United Church of Christ embarked today on a broad new course to bolster black influence in the church, and to back large-scale black development projects in America.

"We've come together from poles apart and now are moving ahead with a common consensus," said the Rev. Lawrence L. Durgin, a white New York City minister.

The 700 delegates of the two million-member church's assembly adopted Monday night a wide-ranging series of new programs to augment black decision-making power in the church and to upgrade conditions among black people.

The measures were drawn up in the urging of a mostly Negro faction called Ministers for Racial and Social Justice. The ac-

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## U.S. Armor Smashes North Viet Troops

SAIGON (AP) — Thirty American armored vehicles smashed into North Vietnamese troops manuevering around Tay Ninh City today and raked them for nearly three hours with thousands of rounds of machine gun fire, military spokesmen reported.

The spokesmen said 42 North Vietnamese soldiers were counted dead in the fight, 35 miles northwest of Saigon while American casualties were one killed and one wounded.

The dead enemy were identified as soldiers of the 8th Regiment, 9th Division, elements of which were intercepted only four days ago by U.S. 25th Division infantrymen as they tried to march on Tay Ninh City.

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# Charles of Windsor Is Prince of Wales

CAERNARVON, Wales (AP) — Charles of Windsor, the next king of Britain, was installed as Prince of Wales today amid the rousing cheers of thousands—bombs apparently set off by Welsh extremists demanding independence.

Queen Elizabeth II placed the coronet on her 20-year-old son's head in the court of ancient Caernarvon Castle, handed him the mantle, ring, gold rod, sword and letters patent of his noble rights.

Charles in turn swore allegiance to the crown he some day will wear and pledged fealty, understanding and support for the principality of Wales.

The medieval pageantry of heralds, knights, banners, trumpets, carriages, bands and Druids, choristers, officials and foreign guests was carried out in warm sunshine and gentle breeze.

The precision of the lavish pomp and circumstances carried on despite a series of extremist tries to disrupt the ceremony. Two men died for their efforts.

The royal train stopped three times on its way from London overnight because of bomb scares on railway tracks.

One bomb exploded on the tracks near Caernarvon in front of the spot where the royal train had stopped. This shook the train and tore up a section of the track. Two youths were arrested.

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HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The State Supreme Court ruled Monday that Superior Court has the power to substitute its judgment for that of Probate Court in Probate appeals.

Prior to the unanimous opinion handed down by the high court Monday, Superior Court was limited to reviewing probate decrees only for the purpose of determining if the Probate Court judge acted illegally or abused his discretion.

Chief Justice John H. King said this rule of procedure should be changed because it is "awkward, inadequate and confusing" and "presents virtually insoluble problems in the determination of its applicability."

The landmark opinion came as the Supreme Court ordered a new trial of an appeal from a New London Probate Court order approving the sale of \$1.3 million worth of stock in the Sheffield Company and Sheffield Tube Corporation of New London, which manufacture metal containers for toothpaste and cosmetics.

The stock was owned by Lucius T. Sheffield of New London, who died three years ago. Permission to sell the stock was sought by executors of the estate so \$750,000 in debts against the estate could be paid.

The sale was opposed by two of Sheffield's grandchildren, Stephen F. and Chaney M. Sheffield. When Probate Court approved sale of the stock, the grandchildren appealed.

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## State Court Given Voice In Probate

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Argentina was under a state of siege today in a continuing wave of terrorism and labor unrest that shook the nation during President Juan Carlos Onganía's fact-finding visit for President Nixon.

The government broadcast the state of siege declaration Monday night, two hours before a 24-hour nationwide general strike was scheduled to begin in protest against the New York governor's visit and the policies of President Juan Carlos Onganía's military regime.

Rockefeller flew to Buenos Aires this morning and commuted trains ran late. But most businesses and offices in the capital city of eight million people were open as usual. In the interior of the country, the strike was reported to be more effective.

The general strike was called by the strong anti-government faction of the General Labor Confederation (CGT), headed by printers union President Ramundo Ongaro. Union sources said Ongaro was arrested Monday.

### Nixon's Asia Visit Comes Amid Soviet Push There

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — President Nixon's visit to the Asian subcontinent next month comes at a time of increasing Soviet influence there. In contrast, the American approach has been passive.

In an effort to make friends, Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin has made almost regular trips to the area—visiting four times to India, twice to Pakistan and once to Afghanistan in the past 3 1/2 years.

During the same period, visits by American VIPs have been scant.

Former President Lyndon B. Johnson made a stopover of only a few hours in Karachi, Pakistan, to meet former President Ayub Khan in December 1966.

Dwight D. Eisenhower was the last president to make a thorough tour of the subcontinent, visiting India, Pakistan and Afghanistan in 1959.

More recently, Secretary of State William P. Rogers made a three-day swing through India, Pakistan and Afghanistan in May.

It is known that U.S. embassy officials in New Delhi have pushed hard for a long time to get Washington to send some high-ranking officials to visit India.

An opportunity to do so was apparently missed in May, when Nixon sent Secretary of Housing George Romney to New Delhi to represent the United States at the funeral of President Zaki Husain.

The Russians sent Alexei Kosygin.

The absence of high-ranking American visitors to the subcontinent is viewed by many observers here as a reflection of a passive and ad hoc diplomatic approach to the region.

The continuity of U.S. policy of arms sales to India and Pakistan is an example.

The United States sold arms to both countries until the two neighbors went to war in 1965. Johnson responded by cutting off arms to the two warring nations, hurting the U.S.-armed Pakistani military forces more than the mainly Russian-equipped Indian forces.

Under Pakistani pressure, the policy was relaxed in 1967 to permit the sale of non-lethal equipment and spare parts to both countries, and was further modified later to permit the sale of lethal weapons by North Atlantic Treaty Organization members, with each sale to be considered on a case by case basis.

Now, the Nixon administration says it is reconsidering the whole issue again.

Russia is the largest seller of arms to India and last year agreed to supply weapons to Pakistan, too.

Both Russia and the United States have been generous contributors of economic aid.

But the Russians have made their greatest impact in the area of international diplomacy.

During his recent swing through the subcontinent, Kosygin campaigned hard for greater regional economic cooperation and got a friendly reception.

The Soviet Communist party chief, Leonid Brezhnev, suggested to the recently concluded world Communist conference that the nations of this region should form a collective security pact.

The proposal has been received only lukewarmly, but the Russians have at least been given credit in official quarters for trying to end the neighborhood conflicts that have disrupted the subcontinent since it was partitioned in 1947.

Nixon last visited India and Pakistan in 1967, while on one of his private fact-finding tours.

When he flew into Lahore, he was greeted by a crowd of anti-Nixon and anti-American demonstrators.

This time he is expected to get a friendlier reception.

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — U.S. District Court Judge T. Emmet Clark Monday ordered a seminary student who admitted embezzling some \$74,000 from the Travelers Insurance Co., committed for psychiatric observation.

Joseph P. MacDonald, 27, a student at Pope John XXIII Seminary in Weston, Mass., will undergo a 90-day period of psychiatric and psychological observation by government physicians prior to being sentenced.

Police said MacDonald turned himself in to agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Hartford several months ago and returned about \$25,000 of the money. He also said he was guilty of transporting stolen checks across state lines.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Paul S. Sherbock said the court that MacDonald had endorsed and cashed checks for \$4,000 each and that he had also devised a scheme to have railroad survivors' checks mailed out to non-existent beneficiaries.

Apparently, MacDonald also took a trip around the world in 1967 on funds he allegedly embezzled, Sherbock said.

MacDonald's attorney, James N. Egan, asked the court for leniency, saying his client had not previously run afoul of the law.

Egan said the seminary, which prepares older men for the priesthood, had not barred MacDonald from pursuing his vocation.

### Nation Moves To Cut Costs Of Medicaid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress and the Welfare Department have moved to cut soaring costs of the Medicaid, the state-administered health care program for the poor.

The Senate Monday passed and sent to the House legislation that permits states to control program costs.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare issued new regulations intended to check high fees paid to doctors and dentists.

Sen. Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., said the basic problem is the "unprecedented rise in the cost of medical care. This inflationary trend combined with some abuses and lax administration of federal programs have caused the price of Medicaid to soar far beyond our original estimates."

The new regulations—first federal standard for fees in the program—will take effect in thirty days.

Basically, the regulations say fees must be based on the "70th percentile" or what 70 of every 100 doctors in a given area charged under Medicaid in January 1969.

States leasing their fees on a lower percentile can raise the standard. States where fees are higher must come down with certain exceptions.

Welfare Secretary Robert E. Finch said the increase would be allowed under two conditions:

—If the average percentage increase does not exceed the percentage increase in the all-services component of the consumer price index or an alternative index selected by the secretary.

—If doctors and dentists in a state far beyond an effective review system.

Bishop Spottedwood contended that the Nixon administration is confining on school integration and threatening Negro political gains with the passage of the Voting Rights Act, due to expire in 1970. The 1965 law applies to seven Southern states.

The bishop said: "We consider that we have been rebuffed in our bid to obtain reparations for our President and his advisers and collaborators in Washington.

"The gains made in the decade 1958-1968 are threatened with nullification."

Earlier, in an interview, Clarence Mitchell of the NAACP Washington bureau said the Nixon administration is trying to kill the voting rights law in a bid to strengthen the Republican party in the South.

A message from President Nixon was read to the delegates before the keynote speech.

The message praised the NAACP and said: "We must unite in opposition to the forces that would divide us and in resistance to the forces that would make meaningless the progress we have made."

# Impromptu Show of Hayes Art

David Hayes, sculptor, became curator of his own museum for two days recently when he unearthed from private collections and storage 47 of his metal sculptures and placed them about the lawn at the home of his father-in-law, Matthew Moriarty, 75 Forest St.

The initial purpose of the display was to enable David and friends to make movies of the pieces, and this was done, but the overall effect of the impromptu show was so delightful that word was passed along and a continual stream of friends of all ages wandered through the temporary gallery on the green. Some spent an entire warm June afternoon in the shade of one of the enormous oaks, chatting, watching the play of light and shadow on the sculptures and the grass, and the Hayes children play hide and seek with the young visitors among what to them were obviously familiar toys and not unobtainable works of art.

The sculptor couldn't have picked a better time of season to bring out his assorted work of the past 10 years. The extensive Moriarty gardens were just over the peak of June bloom, heavy and still with the beauty of blossom rather than the later, more practical fullness of fruit.

The sculptures ranged from the number unpaired some what representational figures of David's earlier period to the multi-colored tree and other humorous forms he has been developing more recently, not only in metal but in patinae and ceramic reliefs.

# Barry Praises Assembly Vote On Resolution

Manchester State Sen. David M. Barry today praised a resolution passed by the 1969 General Assembly, saying, "It could mark the beginning of a comprehensive police education program in Connecticut.

Barry predicted that the next legislature will implement the recommendations of the commission, "so that policemen can acquire the skills so necessary for coping with the difficult law enforcement problems of today."

### Coventry Bruce Wilson Opens Race For Seat on Town Council

Bruce Wilson, 28, of Ash Brook Dr. has announced his candidacy for the town council in November's election. Wilson's announcement came in the form of a letter to each member of the Republican Town Committee, which meets tonight, and in the first formal announcement from a candidate to other party.

In November, Coventry will elect its first seven-man town council, which will replace the current Board of Selectmen. The Board of Finance form of Government, following adoption of a Town Charter in October 1967. Both parties will select their slate of candidates in August caucuses, with four candidates from each party able to run. 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### School Spending Rate Released

Manchester's local share of public school costs was 58 per cent of the tax levy for the 1967-68 school year, according to figures released recently by the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council (CPEC).

This was four percentage points above the state average. For that year, the local share of public school costs was 52.00-52.575 against the tax levy of \$56,462,306.

In town terms the percentage was: Andover, 68; Berlin, 67; Colchester, 66; Coventry, 70; Killington, 68; Hebron, 92; South Windsor, 69; Tolland, 82; Vernon, 69.

Among the state's 169 towns, 133 spent 50 per cent or more of the tax levy for education; 28 spent 50 per cent or less; and 15 spent less than 20 per cent.

Most of the latter group were larger towns and urban centers, which spend more for other municipal services, such as police and fire protection, welfare, highway maintenance, parks and recreation.

A new survey meeting committee topped all towns with a 110 per cent expenditure, exceeding its tax levy because of a number of other services and transfer from the regional fund. The town with the lowest local share was Putnam, 36 per cent. Among the largest metropolitan areas, Hartford was lowest, with 28 per cent.
