State Court Given Voice In Probate

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)" The State Supreme Court ruled Monday that Superior Court has the power to substitute its judgment for that of Probate Court

in Probate appeals. Prior to the unantmous opin ton handed down by the high court Monday, Superior Court was limited to reviewing probate decrees only for the purpose of determining if the Probate Court judge acted illegally or abused his discretion.

Chief Justice John H. King said this rule of proce dure should be changed because it is "awkward, inadequate and confusing" and "presents vir-tually insoluble problems in the determination of its applicabil

The landmark opinion cam as the Supreme Court ordered new trial of an appeal from New Lorston Probate Court order approving the sale of \$1.3 million worth of stock in the Sheffield Company and Sheffield Tube Corporation of New London, which manufacture metal comettes

Political Cost Of The Surtax

phisticated comment from Washington, he Nixon Administration has already paid three heavy prices in its effort to guarantee itself extension of that extra 10 per cent income tax upon us all. Even without calculating in these prices, we may say that we would just as soon do without the 10 per cent surtax. It was originally the Johnson, weapon against inflation which was adopted 18 months late to have any chance of doing the job it was supposed to do. It has become, since, one of those mporary taxes we have so much trouble getting rid of, once they get on the books, once the politicians get adjusted to the idea of getting and spending the income from them.

But looking at the prices the Nixon Administration is supposed to be paying to get the votes to extend the income tax surcharge makes the tax seem even less of a bargain.

The Nixon Administration's need for votes to extend the 10 per cent is supposedly responsible for the President's final decision not to let HEW Secretary Finch have Dr. Knowles as his ohief medical assistant.

The same need to keep conservative votes loyal to the surtax reportedly has played a role in the weakening of school lesegregation guide lines in the South and in the drawing up of a new voting rights act which poses as liberal while its rend effect in the South is expected to be reactionary. Even if we liked the surtax, we doubt

that we would consider it worth so heavy a political price. And the biggest part of this political price, we might point out, is likely to be that paid by the Nixon Admirástration itself, in loss of that middle of the road image the new President so obviously wished to set up in his first months in office. The impression is beginning to form that, inevery wrestling match the President has with himself, it is the old Nixon who emerges the victor by some narrow, agonizing, but perhaps inevitable margin in the final moment of the decision.

The President was elected by a narrow margin, his total vote actually a minority of those voting. He obviously set himself, as he embarked spon his new office, a goal of appealing to a much wider section of the American people. He has obviously been rewarded, according to the public opinion polls, by favorable reaction among a much higher percentage of voters than the percentage he received last November. It will be better for him, and for the country too. we think, if he can persist in his broad efforts down the middle roud, and avoid taking those right hand detours every time the main middle route seems to have grown difficult. He runs the danger of creating the belief that these right hand detours are really the only route he knows, and things like the surtax not the real reason, but merely the alibi for doing what he wanted to do all along.

Future Uses For The Moon

The most interesting thing to find on the moon would be some fossil skull, for that would whet the curiosity and future activity of our scientists as nothing else might. The most immediately useful discovery our astronauts' could make on

moon would be that of water. Given water perhaps in form of deep, overed glaciers—the problems of maintaining bases on the moon would be tremendously simplified. Water, and the oxygen and hydrogen into which it could be separated, could provide the basic raw material necessities for a lunar colony, which would set itself up in preabricated aluminum chambers, operate a small nuclear power station, and run itself a hydroponic farm for its vege-

Once we had a lunar colony established, with water source on the moon, we could take our time developing and using certain advantages the moon would offer us. It takes much less power to send a space mission off from the moon than from the earth, and if we could get our hydrogen and oxygen right there be spared the anxiety and hopelessmess all our future space journeying might and frustration of prolonged mental ill-

would be able to see through clearer atmosphere to much greater distances than those on earth; our knowledge and analysis might reach out far enough in the universe to strengthen one of the many theories about the structure and origins of the universe Meanwhile, underfoot, a moon colons

might dig up moon evidence to fill in the historical gap in earth evidencea gap of some three thousand million years between the original formation of what was to become earth and the first appearance of the first sedimentary rocks. Here on earth, continual geologi cal change has long since seemed to decompose that original primordial crust; the moon, conceivably, may have become stabilized at some stage inside our own missing geological gap.

Conceivably, the moon will have cer tain resort possibilities. The cost of the present fare there and back is about 10,000 millions of dollars per passenger, but that will come down. Labor costs on the moon are to be high, calculated at about \$100,000 a man hour, and luggage freight to the moon will have to be, at first, at the rate of \$5,000 a pound. But such rates are likely to be no real eterrent to our inflationary affluent soclety, and one can predict the construction of the first underground Moon-Hilton and the organization of the first Society For the Preservation of The Natural Unspoiled Lunescape to be companion events, about 12 years from now.

Paradox In Mental Health

Admissions to Connecticut's three large state hospitals are up markedly. but the resident population of the institutions is down, the State Department of Mental Health reports, How to explain this seeming paradox? It's easy. Although there are more persons in need of treatment - many of them young people who have been experimenting with drugs - they don't stay hospitalized as long as patients used to. Today's mental therapy involves short-term, intensive treatment which, for many ills and many patients, is effective. New treatment bechniques, new nedication, improved psychotropic drugs, and an increase of the staff-topatient ratio, plus some group therapy. have helped restore patients to health

in shorter time and without the traditional prolonged institutional confine-The Mental Health Department reports that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968 admissions to the three state hospitals totaled 11,913 persons. The resident population on June 30 was 5,991 persons, the lowest patient population since 1933. Connecticut Valley Hospital in Middletown has had a. 44

per cent decrease in patient population since 1960. There are many factors bearing on the incidence of mental illness. The old taboos have largely broken down; mental illness no longer carries the sitgmit that it used to. As a result, patients and their families seek help more freely. On the whole, the sooner a patient gets help, the better are his

chances of recovery. Not only are patients treated earlier and more effectively today, but there is increasing emphasis upon after care and follow-up. Although the rate of readmissions is somewhat heavy, the department would rather have a patient hospitalized for a month and out in the community for three months, then back again, if necessary and out for a longer period, then to keep him continuously

As patients and as families of patients, Meriden area people have an interest in the progress of mental health. And as a community; Meriden has a continning interest in mental health progress; the Mental Health Center at Undercliff plays an important part in the state's program. The new program and facility for patients with drug probbems is a pioneering contribution which will be watched with interest.
