FAA Aide **Asks Change** In Controls

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) -- The nation's air traffic control system is "strained to the utmost" and needs complete revision. Federal Aviation Administrator John H. Shaffer said Tuesday

In an address to the Air Lines Pilots Association's air tafety forum, Shaffer said use of computers on the ground and on board aircraft is the answer. He said the computers would put "navigational control of airplanes back in the cockpit" and cut down on the work of control-

"The pilot will navigate the aircraft and the controller will perform the task he can do most efficiently-namely, monitor the system," Shaffer said.

He acknowledged "it will take a while" to get the new, sophisticated equipment into a signifcant number of aircraft. He said the first step in making more efficient use of air

space is rearranging air routes on the basis of aircraft capability -separating aircraft by aircraft chases. William Flener, the FAA's di-

nector of air traffic safety, told the pilots he agreed that the air traffic control system is "a sick system" which is undermanned, without a backup and uses outmoded equipment in some cases. When you try to operate an old system and at the same time get into a new one, it is difficult," Elener said during a panel discussion.

War Requires Barbarians

The world is now reading, for the inst time, about a certain piece of the action of World War II. It took place 25 years ago, in an Italian illage not far from Rome. The village was occupied by a detachment of Nazi sharpshooters. Italian patriots waylaid and killed one of four of the German

soldiers. In retaliation, the Germans lined up 17 of the village's male residents and machine-gunned them down. What makes this little piece of history particularly shocking is the disclosure

that one of the German officers on the scene, and involved with the order for this mass execution, is now a Bishop in Munich. This is what has given the story signi-

ficance and spice, and given drama to the controvensy of whether or not the individual involved should be tried for the war crime of murder.

We think it would be better, and more monest, if we discarded the fact that the officer in question, who didn't give the fire order himself, but who somewhat squeamishly passed it on to a subordinate officer who actually carried it out. has subsequently been ordained as a nan of the church.

For, in such an incident, it is not that part of any individual which might happen to be a churchman which is on trial, or should be considered to be on trial. It is civilization itself. If we think such a deed is permissible for some tough army professional, that tells us enough about ourselves, and being delioate about having some future man of the cloth do it wins us no credit marks in the little book each of us carries with us to the end of our acting and thinking. We have no particular right to be shocked by the particular identity of the human being who is involved in such a deed. We need to cringe if we find ourselves not minding, too much, such an incident, when it comes to us as the behavior of some paid killer, or as an expected part of the acceptable institution of war.

Just as we have no right to feel special shock because a future clergyman may have been involved in such a deed, so we also have no right to preen ourselves on an assumption that this was, after all, merely a deed of the Nazis, who were special barbarians.

War doesn't permit anybody not to be a barbarian. Only when we reject the institution may we possibly possess the mored right to pass judgment on the individual conduct of those who serve it.

That Lowly \$200 A Week

It no longer seems mandatory to expect logical behavior in the public arena; the chances are, these days, that people and organizations act more from erk compulsions than from clear appraisal of some objective, and that they are just as likely to be found injuring their own real interests as serving them On that assumption, we forego the arduous intellectual task of trying to figure out why a teachers organization over in Waterbury has just expelled 38 of its members on the ground that they betrayed the organization and demeaned their protession by taking temporary summer jobs in the school system for a low salary of only \$200 a week.

By old-fashioned arithmetic, at least, \$200 a week comes out something more than \$10,000 a year. As to why a teachers organization should take a public stand labeling that a "low" salary-well, that's one of the things we don't have to bother to try to figure out once we have conceded that it has now become quite illogical to expect the logical.

Not The Popcorn Odor, Please By far the greater part of the pollution in our air comes from the operation of the combustion motor, and the most noticeable part of this pollution seems to come from the diesel.

It does threaten to throw up such an atmosphere around this earth as to change its climate and make it uninhabitable for figure generations.

We will have to get rid of the motor fumes, gasoline and diesel both,

We all know how it is with popcorn, and how, in other words, we would be lining the highways either waiting for just one more diesel to come along, or hitchhiking our way to the movies.

"Too Publicly, Too Long"
