Not The Weapon, But The Deed There is an Army technical manual description of the effects of its VX nerve gas, which escaped by accident and killed 6,400 sheep out in Utah last year, which was the gas the Army was planning to transport across the country by rail to dump out in the Atlantic, and which was apparently the gas involved in an accident among American troops, non-fatally, over on Okinawa last week. The technical manual's language for the symptoms of nerve gas goes as fol-

"Running nose, tightness of chest, dimness of vision, pinpointing of eye pupils, difficulty in breathing, drooling, excessive sweating, nausea, vomiting, cramps, involuntary defecation and urination, twitching, jerking, staggering, headache, confusion, drowsiness, coma, convulsion, cessation of breathing, death."

There is no indication or allegation, from anybody, that we have ever used such a gas on anybody.

The reported incident in Okiaswa, in which the American soldiers exposed were apparently given such quick treatment that they suffered none of those early symptoms which, as one reads the list, make the final symptom seem a kind of bleasing, is an important incident primarily because it shows us deploying the nerve gas outside our own country, and on soil which we still concede, legally at least, not to be our own Dossession.

The fact that we have gone so far to ward having the nerve gas available for Asian battlefields will raise controversy at home, where members of Congress have already been campaigning against our development of chemical and bacteriological weapons. It is likely to add to our difficulties with Japan, which not only resents the fact that we hold Okinawa, but which, as the victim of American weapons at Hiroshima and Nagasaki, is particularly sensitive about the kind of weapons we stockplie on Japanese soll.

And the widening revelation of the extent to which we have prepared ourselves for chemical warfare, together with publication of the grisly effects of our staple nerve gas, will increase that somewhat illogical sense of horror and outrage among those who react more to the way men may kill one another han to the fact that men do kill.

The concern with weapons, with the possible differences between being kill ed by a club, a knife, a bullet, napalin. radiation, or nerve gas, is not entirely a wasted concern, if, some sweet day, it. uppens to shift itself over to the really basic and fundamental question, which has to concern not the weapon, but the deed, not the armament, but war as an institution of human policy. The current controversy over nerve gas is, in one sense, merely perpetuation of the foolish and fatal illusion that war would be all right If we could only take it back to something humane, like everything in World War Li up to August, 1945.

Run From Every Close Vote? Some members of the Senate now ropose that, since the vote on the antiballistic-missile system is certain to be close, President Nixon should retreat from such an impending display of national division and seek some compromise for which wider Senate support can be gali.ed.

This is normal theory and normal expectation in such a situation.

But that goesn't mean it happens to be tailored to the personal situation, experience, or instincts of the man now in the White House.

Under such a code of behavior, he would have refused the election he gained last November and, instead of taking office, tried to arrange for the election of some unknown character who might have been able to command more than 50 per cent of the support of the Ameri-

can people. President Nixon may have wished that his margin of victory had been greater. But he had no hesitancy about accept ing its result and responsibility.

Furthermore, the Nixon record in politics is one of consistent defiance of very long odds against him. Without such willingness to risk expected defeat, he would not be President today. Why, if he never did shrink from expected defeat, should he be timid about fighting forward to a narrow margin victory It would be our appraisal of President Nixon's instinct and standards that if he can see victory on the missile program by one single Senate vote, he will press forward and take that margin and consider it an authentic victory.

It is nothing new, in a democracy for a great issue to be decided by a narrow voting margin, or for such decisions to be accepted as a legitimate determination of national policy.

On the other hand, an exaggerated desire for a "consensus" kind of cover and support for everything a President does has possibilities always dangerous for democracy. A leadenship too concerned with consensus is under temptation to reach for various devices by which it might be obtained-deceit as to real nime, the application of pressures of political and personal kind, or even the suspension of the democratic process itself in favor of the instrumentalities of totalitarian unity.

It will be no reflection on President Nixon if he fights for and obtains a one vote victory on the ABM, and, for that matter, no disgrace if he loses by a one vote margin either. We see no valid reason why he should shrink from the showdown. And any democratic system which developed the habit of running from its own close decisions would soon be no system at all.

We are reminded that a good many people mins a good many shows on their first time around in the winter schedand welcome the opportunity to outch up on what they missed. We are reminded of the high cost of producing an hour program, which makes showsity. And that, ladies and gentlemen, is why we have to watch the same villains bite the same dust again. Most of us, perhaps, do not really object to the practice, and accept the explanation-alibia the industry offens for it.

There is, however, one summer rerun for which no alibi seems needed. As might have been predicted on the basis of an analysis of what made Laugh In" click in the first place, its ulek pace and its throw-away style (it throws its gags at you without waiting to see whether you get them) have given it an unusual durability and freshness as a repeat.

People who hardly had time to react before have an easy time of it finding themselves surprised by what they halfsaw and half-heard. Every familiar of the "Laugh In" scene, except the two boring principals themselves, seems to gain rather than lose by another look his or her routines. As for those principals, they were never enterining even on a first run basis. Like Ed Sullivan, it seems to be their job to make their own low-keyed performance an effective setting for the other talents they present.



Legitomacy The Contract

Naturally, we deplore the evidence which we have on all sides that organized force seems to accomplish what orderly dissent and demonstration cannot accomplish. And the challenge of the next college generation will be to try to effect some accommodation beween these two extremes. Organized orce and violence are dangerously se active, for once you have discovered heir power, it is very difficult to return to the more time-consuming, less effective, legitimate means. Legitimacy denotes intellectual honesty, but it also has a more practical importance-it is the social contract which enables men o work together. If there is no legitimacy-no basic tenets for dealing with one another then there is scant room for trust, understanding, and compromise to grow. Yet you must not give up acting.
