Pope Issues **Truce Appeal** For Nigeria

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy (AP) - Pope Paul VI appealed today for a truce in the Nigerian civil war, guaranteed if necessary by a neutral African coun-

for Africa to attend a conference of bishops, the Pope also backed a Biafran proposal for a cease-fire to last the duration of his three-day visit to Uganda He said he hoped it would lead to negotiations. The Biafran proposal was dis-

missed by a Nigerian official today as propaganda. The Pope, in his most important speech to date on the bloody Nigerian conflict, said he would continue to work for an end to the war but appeared to admit that his chances for success were not good.

He ruled out a personal visit to the war-torn area in eastern Africa on grounds of logistics and because of "the political interpretations this would raise." His proposal for a prolonged truce with the presence of a third African power was the Pope's most explicit to date regarding efforts to move toward

He said he was doing his utmost to convince the warring sides that such a truce was necessary and that "a compromise. honorable for both sides, does not offend their prestige, does not damage their interests, and can be in accord with their essential, respective and legitimate claims."

Addressing several thousand persons during the weekly general audience at his summer residence here, the 71-year-old pontiff devoted fully two-thirds of his 1,300-word speech to the Nigerian conflict. As for the cease-fire proposed



Its behavior during July has not really been justified by any of the technica reasons advanced by the analysts uncertainty about the surtax, a slight decline in the rate of increase in profits this year, no peace yet in Vietnam. 





The Battalion dispatched a truck and two jeeps containing at least a dozen armed soldiers Can returned to the Battallor mpound with his escort, followed by two American MP jeeps carrying mounted ma-chine guns. The firing at the Ivory Tower had attracted the

two jeeps.
A short time later Can, again under armed escort, went to a military hospital at the Air-borne Divisions Compound at Hoa Hoa Tham on the outskirts of Saigon. Again the American jeeps followed.

Guards at the Compound halt ed the Americans and threat-ened to open fire if they attempted to enter. A short time later American advisers at the ompound told the Americans

to leave. They did.

And, a Cornell spokesman explained, they include new specific prohibitions against conduct as "using anguage or actions likely incite the use of physical force

or violence by others."

building and secured guns tr 'self-defense' against a feard counter-attack by angry The trustees' decision to vest Cornell's President or those he lesignates with responsibility or enforcing the rules and initiating disciplinary action is particularly significant in light of recent history. James A. Perkins, Cornell president who announced his resignation in June after sharp criticism from several quarters for his handling of campus problems including the April crisis, insisted repeatedly that student discipline was primarily in faculty hands. The trustees, Cornell Vice President for Public Affairs Steyen Muller said this week, wanted it clear that henceforth they would hold whomever was
