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College Alumni Show Their Hand In the fiscal year ended July 1, private contributions to American colleges and universities were \$101,500,000 higher than in the previous year.

Alumni giving accounted for \$307,400,-000 of the total, and this represented, for the alumni, an increase of 107 per cent over the previous year.

Harvard University was the leader i receipt of private contributions, including those from alumni, with a total of \$66,000,000 for the year. Yale University, in spite of a President who tolerated

There is in all this something of a sidelight on the nature of American wealth.

It has long since ceased to be fashionable for wealth to be crusty and fiercely conservative, or to carry out the threats some of its more obstinate representatives write to their alumni magazines.

The image shaped by a few Texas millionaires who spend fortunes trying to propagandize their country back to the good old days is false.

Actually, typical American wealth today is soft and shy and just a little ashamed of itself for having what it has and continually eager to prove that its heart is in the right place and that its mind is very broad, and even ready to admit that, for all the success each glob of wealth has had for itself, society as a whole hasn't even begun to solve problems which had better be solved if there isn't a revolution which wipes out all wealth.

Almost inevitably, then, the year in which our colleges and universities were supposedly going to be hurt while their wealthy alumni took it out on them for their year of disorders has proved their banner year for contributions to date. To put it less cynically, and more kindly: Good alumni do not despair of their old alma maters in troubled and confusing times, but try to help them become better institutions.

The Dancers

We suppose Astronauts Armstrong and Aldrin, unable to restrain their own sense of buoyancy up on the moon, set the stage for the chain of terpsichorean moments subsequently in the world news and picture.

Only once was the chain broken, when Mrs. Nixon, at the Clare Boothe Luce party in Hawail where everybody was doing the hula, didn't do the hula, giving the explanation that she was not an "exhibitionist."

We still respect Mrs. Nixon's decision, and praise her determination to be her own self. But it has since become obvious that she is in a minority.

Those who know him most intimately say that actually he is a shy man and no exhibitionist himself, but President Nixon, touring Bucharest, suddenly joined hands in a circle of Rumanian folk dancers, and, by the picture at least, handled his steps niftily.

As for Pope Paul VI, he has generally

been rated a gentleman of pronounced reserve and self control as contrasted with the peasant warmth of his predecessor Pope John, but he found himself so enthusiastic in recounting the welcome he had received in Uganda that he threw his own arms up into the air and did a little skip-dance, in imitation of the way the nuns of Uganda had danced a welcome to him.

Continuing our respect for Mrs. Nixon, we nevertheless find all this resort to the art of the dance very pleasing and reassuring. It reminds us all that next to and after the human smile, a sudden lightness of foot is the most common and reliable indicator that buoyant and lightsome thoughts have taken command of the individual. The symbolism has not always been completely happy, and until the astronauts launched themselves into their ghostly gavotte up on the moon the prime example of public figure dancing in our time was that of Hitler doing his victory jig at Complegne on the occasion of the French surrender. But now the astronauts, President Nixon, and Pope Paul have danced us all, and the dance itself, back toward its primitive, instinctual expression of innocent pleasure, back toward the respectability it had when David danced before the

Random Terror

America has always been violent. The tevolution itself was an act of violence. But never in the worst days of the Will West has the violence opproached what America is now living through. When I first lived in America 25 years ago a man was shot next door within a week of our moving in. On each visit since, the violence around has been worse, as indeed in the rest of the world. But the change since I was there five years ago is no longer one of de-

gree; it is one of kind. Violence is still far from universal. In the quiet little towns of New England, even in quite big towns of the West, it is still no worse than in Britain. Moreover, the existing violence is exaggerated by the sense of guilt Americans feel since the second Kennedy murder.

But in the big cities of the East, in their suburbs above all, the fear of violence is all-pervasive, catching, paranotac. When I set off to cross the park in smart mid-Manhattan, an elderly lady accosted me: "You must be a stranger, take a cab or bus, please, don't cross the park, it's dangerous." It was 5 p.m.; I would have walked on had a young woman who was watching not stopped me. "Bel'eve her, don't go, you might be coshed." My host, a young professor from Columbia University, was emphatic: "They were right. You shouldn't cross the park alone. A colleague, the son-in-law of a British peer, was murdered there before dusk." Slums are not safe even by daylight.

I visited a slum school in Brooklyn. My taxi had to follow Bergen Street, the heart of black squalor. "Lock your doors, lady; close your windows," ordered. "You never know what die schwartze are up to." The beacher inquired whether I had to threaten the taxi with a complaint to the police to crive me: "I often have to, they are so scared of bling bached at traffic lights." People who leave their empty cars unlocked (cars seldom get stolen; everyone has a car) lock the doors auto-

matically when they get in. Unable to find a taxi back from the school, I took the Subway. Waiting on the p'atform, alone with a few bums, I recalled the secretary's warning: "Don't go to Rockaway by Subway, you'll be coshed." I was not coshed but fear is so catching that I welcomed the train and made for the least empty carriage. I was the only white. The way they stared fully justified the banker's laconic remark: "We hate them, and they hate

Violence in Washington is much worse. Going to a party near Dupont Circle, my hosts spent 40 minutes parking because they feared to walk three blocks Friends of theirs share car pools after dark. "They wait until the door is safely. locked before driving on, and two stay in the same place, so the driver doesn't end alone." The young secretaries on Capitol Hill are escorted to their cars by policemen after dusk, and guns are part of their gear like lipstick, though they usually leave their guns at home. In Cambridge and Philadelphia, with far fewer blacks than Washington or St. Louis, people are tense too. "There was a murder and two rapes last month on either side of our house." said an MIT professor. He added: "The awful thing is the husband failed to get help. Even the hotel did not answer his knocks; people are too scared to unlock at night Now we have telephones in the street." "That student of mine was given a college bed-sitter in a house where two girls were raped, one murdered, a few weeks ago. She is staying with me instead," said a Philadelphia professor. And the man who tried to drive my hosts' daughter offthe road was white; so were the Cambridge villains. But much of the violence is between blacks. A girl runs four times as many risks of being raped
