Rep. Powell Fights to Get \$55,000 Pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Adam Clayton Powell has gone back to court to fight salary and seniority law when he denied his congressional seat for two years.

Lawyers for the New York Democrat asked U.S. District Judge George L. Hart Jr. Monday to order Powell "restored to the rights, privileges and emoluments of the office to which he was duly elected."

Hart set a hearing for Aug. 27. At stake are about \$50,000 in federal and 24 years of seniority, including chairmanship of the Education and Labor Committee to invalidate the \$25,000 fine imposed by the House as a condition of his being allowed to take his seat this year.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled June 16 that the House's action was unconstitutional. Powell had no right to deny Powell his seat in March 1967 on charges of misconduct in office and out.

However, the high court left open the question of whether its ruling entitled Powell to restoration of seniority and salary.

Hart, who heard the case orally in district court and ruled in favor of the House, had asked attorneys for both sides to submit proposed orders for his signature.

Brace Browley, a New York lawyer representing the House, said Powell's case was a simple matter of law and would be decided in a few days.

Powell was re-elected last November, and he has made like any other freshman congressman.

A Glimpse at the Accused: They Stand Tall; Don Berets

LONG BINH, Vietnam (AP) — The U.S. Army let names of Beret officers it is holding under murder charges be made the subject of a public hearing today. The seven officers and a sergeant accused of conspiring to murder a Vietnamese double agent were released from close confinement in the Long Binh Army stockade Monday and confined to regular billets.

As Chairman L. Mendel Rivers of the House Armed Services Committee joined the critics of the secrecy with which the Army has surrounded the case, the U.S. Command gave newsmen their first glimpse of Col. Robert B. Rheault and his subordinate since they were arrested a month ago.

Rheault, of Vinograd Haven, Mass., the former commander of all Special Forces in Vietnam, and Capt. Leland J. Bruner, of Duncan, Okla., stood with their shirts off, talking, listening to the radio and reading news magazines.

Capt. Robert F. Marasco of Bloomfield, N.J., had his shirt on. He talked with the others and laughed a few times.

At noon, all seven officers walked out of their billets and went to a nearby mess hall, their shirts and green berets on their backs straight. They returned to the billets a short while later, led by Rheault pulling on a thin cigar.

The other officers are Maj. David E. Crew of Cedar Rapids, Iowa; Maj. Thomas C. Middleton Jr. of Jefferson, S.C.; Capt. Budge E. Williams of Athens, Ga.; and CWO Edward M. Boyle of New York City.

The enlisted man in the case, Sgt. Alvin L. Smith Jr. of Naples, Fla., was not with the officers. He is under confinement at an enlisted man's billet in Long Binh.

Criticism of the Army's handling of the case mounted in Washington, and it was certain to be a priority item of discussion for Secretary of the Army Stanley R. Resor, who left Washington Monday for a Pacific tour including Saigon.

The Pentagon announced that Resor in the meantime was sending two legal officers to Saigon to assemble a dossier on the case.

On the basis of the secretary's visit and the reports from the two officers, the Defense Department said "a careful review will be made to determine what information may be made public without prejudicing any potential prosecution and without compromising the rights of any of the defendants."

This indicated that there was little or no likelihood that the men would be released when the Army resumes its investigation of an enlisted man's billet in Long Binh.

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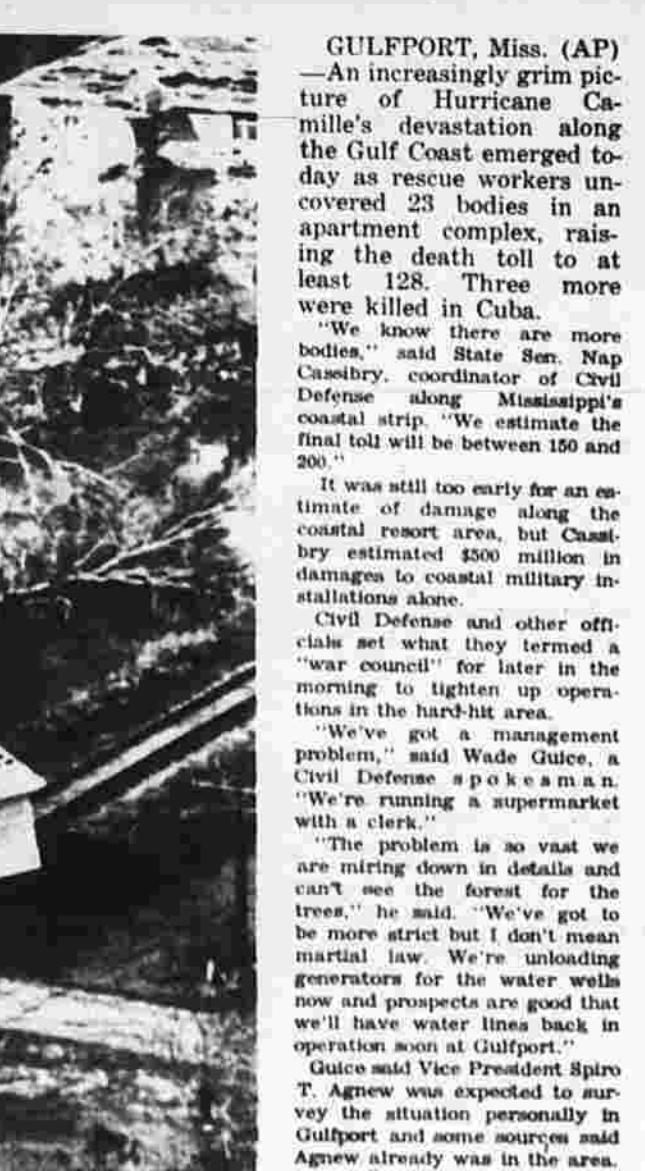
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### Czech Leader Says Invasion Was Needed to Restore State

PRAGUE (AP) — Communist party chief Gustav Husak today whitewashed the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia and repudiated the country's historic week of popular resistance to it one year ago.

Husak said the Czechoslovak people were unprepared and shocked by the entry of Soviet and other Warsaw Pact troops last Aug. 20, 1968, because they had been operated on by "right-wing propaganda" and because they party chief Alexander Dubcek and his associates had withheld information on their dealings with Moscow.

Addressing party workers in Prague, Dubcek's successor said the Soviet Union, Poland, East Germany, Hungary and Bulgaria "decided with a heavy heart to take the step they took because of fear for developments in Czechoslovakia, fear for the Socialist camp and because they had lost confidence in the Czechoslovak leadership and saw no other way out."

In his 30-minute speech, Husak referred to the invasion as "the entry of armies" and to the Dubcek regime merely as the former leadership, without giving names.

He said the public wrongly "interpreted as an occupation" the presence of unidentified foreign troops.

The party chief insisted that the Dubcek leadership "had pursued a struggle with the right-wing forces, had brought order in the mass media and in-

### Rham District New Referendum Weighed For Addition to School

There is a strong possibility that another special referendum might be called to approve additions to the building program at Rham High School.

On Dec. 4, 1967, the town turned down the Board of Education's request for funds for a planned building complex, a greenhouse addition, additions to the music rooms and new athletic fields, which would include track and tennis facilities.

PLAY TO SHUT OUT DANGEROUS OPPONENT  
By ALFRED SHEINWOLD  
One of the most important things to learn about bridge is to be able to play to shut out a dangerous opponent.

Neither side vulnerable. Opening lead — Jack of Diamonds.

West opened the jack of diamonds, and dummy's queen took the trick. The average player would probably lead the club and go down at once.

A crummy player might lead dummy's jack of spades at the second trick, hoping that East would fall to put up the ace.

Both of these "normal" lines of play miss the point that East is a hyena. He must be kept out of the lead if South is to make sure of his contract.

South should begin the hand by taking dummy's three diamonds in order to get rid of the king of spades at once.

There is no way for East to gain the lead.

Declarer continues with dummy's jack of spades. If East puts up the ace, South ruffs; if West has both high spades, East can never get in to lead through the king of clubs.

Partner opens with 1-N-T (16 to 18 points), and the next player passes. You hold: Spades, A-7-5-3-2; Hearts, 4; Diamonds, K-7-5-4-3; Clubs, J-8.

What do you say?  
Answer: Bid two spades. Game is almost out of the question since the combined count can be only 23 points at most.

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### Integration Pace Holds U.S. Rights Aides Insist

WASHINGTON (AP) — Officials in the federal office of Civil Rights say the administration's new guidelines have not slowed school desegregation.

In fact, they predict a record increase this fall.

The proportion of Negroes attending formerly all-white schools is expected to jump from 20 per cent to 40 per cent.

"The desegregation plans keep pouring in," said a spokesman for the Office of Civil Rights—OCR.

Administrative desegregation actions have been started against 48 additional districts since July 3, the OCR official said.

An unresolved issue, however, is the new relationship between the OCR, an arm of HEW, and the Justice Department.

Two departments were given responsibilities for school desegregation and the new guidelines.

Communication at first was poor, officials say. But each department now is letting the other know what actions it intends to take.

Justice handles court suits and OCR administrative desegregation actions.

In addition OCR officials say there has been no pressure from higher up to ease the pace of desegregation.

### Loss of Foreign Bases May Boost Carrier Role

WASHINGTON (AP) — A foreign affairs specialist and even military spending critics are looking for a new role for the Navy's fleet of aircraft carriers.

They suggest a Navy built around up to 24 attack-aircraft carriers—there now are 18—could take on much of the U.S. defense effort abroad if this country reduces its foreign land bases.

One of the four admirals said the United States has no air base of its own in southern Europe, may lose them in Okinawa and the Philippines and could only questionably maintain them in Thailand after Vietnam.

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Federal Workers To Sue For Review of Salaries

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — The National Association of Government Employees planned to file a suit in U.S. District Court today charging Navy Secretary John Chafee and two other top government officials with failure to guarantee wage control for blue collar government workers in the Rhode Island area.

The law recently passed by Congress allows the government to take outside areas into account when wages are determined.
