

Who Sponsors Violence?

Over in Vietnam, we are holding, for possible charges, eight members of our most elite professional fighting force, the Green Berets. They may be charged with having carried out the execution of a Vietnamese double agent condemned to death by some sort of informal verdict from the CIA, our professional cloak and dagger organiza-

Out in California, police are holding, to bring back cast to New Haven to face possible charges of having ordered the execution of one of its members apparently suspected of double dealing, the national head of one of our racial organizations. The story is that some sort of trial was held in a New Haven apartment, a verdict pronounced, and the victim then executed.

Also out in California, police are supposedly being guided, in their search for a solution to a ghastly houseful of apparently ritualistic murder, by the idea that the method of execution employed was patterned on a method taught our soldiers in their guerrilla training.

Meanwhile, down in the super-rich community of Scarsdale, some of the sophisticated American community have been spending their summer taking special courses in guerrilla warfare, on the theory that this is what their world is going to be like, wherefore they had better be prepared for it.

And if, indeed, some television program took these four things and presented them to us together, and said something like "Here, America, This Is Your Life" there could be all kinds of quibble and protest, but no real

This is, at least, part of our life, part of the pattern of violence, official' and otherwise, we have allowed to survive and-even; it sometimes seems, to grow and increase in this age of enlighten-

The root of such violence, it may be noted, comes not from somebody's cheap idea of what makes good television entertainmient, or from the brutalizing experience of watching violence on television.

The root of it lies in practices some presumably very civilized people consider permissable, appropriate, regrettably necessary in a world which still concedes itself the inevitability and e legality of war. It may not be nice; but it is the way it is. We may not like to train your young men in such things; better, however, to take them tough and ruthless into war than tender and squeamish. Of course we don't like ence; but when we have to dish it out, we should have skill and efficiency, . It is, of course, too bad if the violence a nation teaches professionally for use by professionals in uniform happens to inspire illegal imitations on the part of questionable organizations or mentally

unbalanced individual citizens. And sometimes we get all mixed up, so that, as in Vietnam at the present moment, we even toy with the idea of punishing those who have merely committed the violence they were trained and ordered to commit.

But one thing ought eventually to work itself clear, in our own minds. It is that if there is this violence, and if there is responsibility for it, the responsibility lies not apart from us as a people and a nation, but within us all. When we stop teaching it officially, we shall have an easier time disowning and checking its carcinogenic spread among us.

Camille Had Claws

Those of us who have had a tendency to think there is usually too much wolfcrying in connection with hurricane threats have been properly chastened by the slowly unfolding but increasingly tragic story of Camille.

The loss of life and property testifies that this was indeed a major storm. every bit as ferocious as the most lurid advance warnings predicted it could be." The winds did destruction which labeled them as strong as the warnings did. The storm waves deposited big ships up on what is normally dry beach.

And there seems no slightest question that the fact that urgent, strident advance warnings were given did result in the saving of many thousands of lives. This accomplishment more than justifies the many instances in which the hurricane warning system has spurred

people to alarm and to precaution which the actual weather event later proved unnecessary in their specific location. The fury of which a hurricane is cap-

able is so great, and the determination of just how and where it will strike so difficult that warnings have to be broad and general. But anyone who has seen the dazed faces of those whose homes were taken by Camille will not, for some time to come, think any alarm too strident or any precaution too troublesome

If a strident prediction blows past, harmlessly, that will be a cause for thankfulness, but not, while the memory of Camille lasts, for any resentment over wasted or unnecessary precautions. We wouldn't be surprised if loss of life to Camille proved heaviest among those who were so sophisticated they discounted half they heard about the danger and certainly couldn't be bothered to upset themselves to get out of its path. The rest of us will be taking hurricanes more seriously for quite a while, even to the extent of remembering two characters named Hazel, in October, 1954, and Diane, in August, 1955.

Two University of California sociologists, Prof. Charles Y. Glock and Rodney Stark, have concluded a five-year analysis of prejudice and church belief in the United States.

A few of their findings: While 75 to 90 per cent of Protestant and Roman Catholic leaders and clergy are working actively against racial and eligious discrimination, the majority church members are not only prejudiced but also deny the right of the churches to challenge their prejudices. Racial prejudice is higher among nembers with conservative theological and among members who are most active in church activities, The traditional Christian image of man prompts such people to blame the miseries of the disadvantaged on their

own shortcomings. Half of American Christians continue to blame the Jews for the Crucifixion, despite official church prosouncements to the contrary. Sutholics are a little less prejudiced. Protestants and liberal Protest-

ants are a little less prejudiced than conservative Protestants. When the churches search for sup-, port for their othical teachings, they are more likely to find it among those

who stay home on Sunday. The sociologists emphasize that "a great many devout Christians" do accept their churches' ethical preachents and are trying to fight preju-"but when the whole range of Christians is examined, ethical commitment is, seemingly, not the typical product of religious devotion."
