

ed, will be subjected in the name of medical science to just about every kind of indignity doctors can tell nurses to perpe-The androids-computerized

automatons fashioned in human form-are the latest in a series of life-size simulators designd to speed the training of physicians, dentists and nurses and at the same time eliminate the possibility of harm to human patients turing the learning process. They are the brainchildren of sioengineer Don F. Carter, one of the creators of Sim One, a \$275,000 simulator used experimentally since 1967 to train

anesthesiologists at the University of Southern California. Sim One. a 6-foot-2, 195-pound robot with plastic flesh and aluminum bones, gives human-like reactions to anesthetic gases and to intubation, a delicate procedure which can damage living tissue if improperly per-Carter's dentist-trainer, being

Three weeks of summer remain. But somehow, Labor Day has come to mark the end - and the beginning.

Chances are the first strangely, orisply cool night has already come, an unexpected but suddenly welcome tonic for summer-tranquilized sensibilities. The frost is not yet on the punkin, but we know it soon will be.

At no other time of year is there quite this sense of pause, of time out from the relentless march of hours, days and seasons.

Labor Day has another, official raison d'etre, of course. We salute with good reason the nation's workers. But over so many years this has become more pretext than purpose.

The real meaning of Labor Day to a working nation is the pause that represents, despite what the calendar may say, the ending of one year and the beginning of another. It is a time curiously out of time, a time for saying farewell to the year that has faded with summer and for looking forward to autumn and the quickening tempo of another

Straight From The Experts

One of the blessings of this era of high education and still higher specialization is that we never need lack for expert, authoritative guidance in fields which were once shrouded in considerable mystery.

We have, for instance, just had some expert briefing on the question of our inflation.

Down in Washington, retiring Assistant Secretary of Commerce William H. Chartener, famed for being righter than anybody else in previous predictions about our economy, says that inflation is certain to continue at its present rate for the remainder of the year.

But at the same time, the Wall Street Journal, which has access to the best minds and the best indices, reports, in a piece from Chicago, the glad news for housewives that the next thing that is going to happen with the price of many foods is a nice pleasant drop, some of it due primarily to unusually good weather for crops, which has, in turn, made possible the rearing of more animals for the meat market.

Even the price of beef, says the Journal survey, has already begun dropping. out in Chicago.

More or less backing up the Journal survey is the advance estimate from that same Department of Commerce Mr. Chartener is leaving, an estimate to the effect that August figures, when tabulated, may show the first decline in a year in the wholesale price index.

All this expertise adds up to the kind of information we present day Americans are so lucky to be able to get. The main things to know, right now, are that prices are going down and that inflation is going to continue.

It is better, for peace of mind, to concentrate on generalities and not pay attention to particulars.

On the same day all this experiness was in the air there were, for instance, such little touches of mere fact in the news as an increase in the wholesale price of milk, and an announcement by a leading manufacturer that it is about to raise the price of its sheets.

Cynical Ecumenical Question Over in England, a 14-year movement oward reunification between the Metho dist Church of England and the Church of England has just colleged. The reunion would have required at least a 75 per cent approval on the part of those qualified to vote on it. The Methodist vote was 77.4 per cent in "favor; the nglioan percentage was high enough with the bishops, but fell as low as 67 per cent among the lower chergy.

This outcome is being regretted by all the high-minded churchmen, including the Archibishop of Canberbury himself, who worked so hard for it so long.

Furthermore, it is being considered something of a setback for the worldwide councilout movement, which even now has n.any unification plans part way toward decision.

Possibly, the ecumenical tide, with its dream of finding all Christianity, perhaps even all religion, ending up with one identical central core of truth and doctrine, has now begun to recede. The normal thing to do about such a

prospect is, we suppose, to regret it. The ecumenical vision has done credit to the aspirations and the idealism and to the remarkable sureness of faith in those who have dedicated themselves to

But there is a cynical question that might be asked, bearing in mind that only a very small percentage of the lay people involved have a high enough concept of their own faith to be willing to trust it into some ideological and caremontal melting pot.

The cynical question is this: After we all units, what would most of us have Inft?

After we divested our individual sects and denominations of their particular creeds and customs, would there be real life and appeal in the conglomerate that would result?

We think we know what the answers" are suppored to be. If we could only stop our rivalry of forms and creeds and customs, we might all get closer to the one central truth, the one salvation, we are all supposedly looking for. If we could strip away the non-essentials, on which we have fed our divisive prides and controversies, then all our churches might come nearer their true

But not everybody has dared bet on the reality and power of what faith might be found once the dogma had been pried away, or on the capacity of human beings to unite on the one shining truthand quest even after it has been opened more plainly to them.

Religion has developed purpose and mgth and a sense of life in the ac centuation of its own divisions. And, although this may be the wrong, the wasteful way to have a religion keep itself vibrant and bind followers to itself, the cynical question remains: After ecumenicism, what would be left? We applaud and envy the faith of those who have been willing to take the risk.

Healthy Challenge In North Haven The spirited North Haven clash over -funds to start a Community Action Develorment Plan (CDAP) is reminiscent of the early doys of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal, Then, rockribbed Republican Connecticut towns stubbornly and vainly resisted Washington control by passing up thousands of dollars in federal funds; now, North Haven individualists want to forego the chance to get State funds under the CDAP program because it entails adherence to certain standards set in Hartford.

The North Haven opponents lost their vigorous fight to block the town's CDAP program. But the closeness of the vote, 227-214, and the heavy attendance at the town meeting, reflects a rising tide of community independence, a renewal desire for local self-determination. Interestingly, the North Haven i sue came to a head on the day that President Nixon sent to Congress a landmark proposal for federal revenue sharing with state and local governments - a proposal that calls for distribution of funds without Washington interference.

While the goal of grass-roots decisionmaking has not been abandoned, say Republican party and town officials in North Haven, reality requires recognition of certain hard facts. Not only will a town expenditure of \$26,000 bring in \$79,400 in State funds, under the program, but the planning procedures involve federal, state and local inter-relationships that could seriously affect the growth of the municipality.

Nevertheless, the opponents of CDAP. led by the Concerned Citizens Council, to well to make the town prove its case. Too often these days, centralized control is blandly accepted. The result often is vague, theoretical and expensive blueprinting by bureaucrats rather than soundly-conceived programs developed by community leaders better acquainted with the facts and the viewpoint of the

The citizen interest generated by the CDAP controversy in North Haven was indeed a healthy sign. More than 400 townspeople showed up to vote - a heartening indication of intelligent concern, considering the fact that there was no emotional factor that goes with a clash between personalities. If there are seriousdefects in the CDAP program, such interest could force charges on the state level. - NEW HAVEN REGISTER.

Dr. Donald W. Cox, an astute observer of the political aspects of space who has treated this subject in his writings, in-dicates that we have an almost parfect analogy of space with the situation in Anarctica. There a pattern has emerged which has proved eminently

successful.

In Antarctica the United States, the Soviet Union and other major powers have signed an agreement abrogating territorial rights. Since the days of the International Geophynical Year (1957-58), just over a decade ago, the exploration of Antarctica has been treated. as a cooperative venture among nations. One significant step in this evolution has been the renouncing of territorial claims and the banning of nuclear weapon explosions in that area. Scientists in this icy wasteland have evolved a peaceful, cooperative pattern in which they practically live with one another with a minimum of nationalistic overtones. Thus a pattern based on peaceful coexistence has been set for the

future. Currently, what is needed is a formal treaty between all nations capable of exploring the moon. This treaty would propose the cooperative exploita-
