"The use of threats, blackmail and provocations in relations with the socialist and developing countries, increasing international tensions; making advances to the forces of imperialist reaction making calls not for peace but for warall this causes the legitimate anxiety of many peoples and states."

We agree completely with the Prayda editorial, and its warning to Communist

But we would hate to see so much sane eloquance wasted on just one possi ble offender in one possible opening of the next, and perhaps last, world war.

We would note approvingly, that the present policy of the United States, in the supposedly small war in which it is currently engaged, seems to have definitely shifted to an effort to cut down the size and the temperature of that

We would suggest, hopefully, then, that Pravda turn some of its own logic inward toward the question of Russia's attitude toward the war in Vietnam, and ask Russia itself to consider the threat to all mankind, and the danger of war everywhere, if Russia doesn't try to do whatever it might be able to to about shrinking the Vietnamese con-

We would hope, also, that Pravda and its masters in the Kremlin might be able to turn inward some of their eworthy logic about the danger in careless and wanton propagandistic aggravation of international tensions, and e would suggest that Pravda and the Cremlin cure themselves of their intinct to think it is, after all, nic ind convenient and comfortable to have the United States bogged down in Vietnam, and to have the Arab-Israeli situaion always near the boiling point in the Near East.

To give the peace a chance, to pronote everybody's chances for survival, e better behavior of more nations than Communist China is required. The Pravda sermon is a good one, for Moscow, and Washington too, as well as for Pelping.

Disease And Smoking

While there is a good deal of statistical evidence that smoking, as the caution rays "may be hazardous to your health," it would seem very proper for he government to continue its research this field, despite the well intentioned efforts to reduce cigarette advertis-

First, it has to be realized that advertising restriction in Great Britain and in Italy has not done much to reduce consumption. The sale of cigarettes goes up, and the differences in per capita consumption has been marginal. In those cases where it is down, the supposition exists that it is because of the welladvertired dangers of cigarette smoking, rather than the absence of brand advertising.

Second, there are quife a few nasty questions kicking about that dezerve an answer. As Dr. William B. Ober, director of laboratories, Knickerbocker Hos pital, and associate professor of pathology. New York Medical College, has not-"There are certain well-known data which the cigarette-lung cancer hypothesis does not explain. For example, in Great Britain the per capita consump tion of cigarettes is half as much as in the United States but the incidence of cancer is twice as much. In Australia, the per capita consumption of cigarettes is about the same as Great Britain, yet Australians have half as much lung cancer. In Holland, the perconsumption of cigarettes is lower than the United States, but there is 33 per cent more lung cancer. People who tell you that cigarette smoking causes lung cancer do not like to be reminded this data. .. I present you with this information to show you that you cannot rely upon incidence figures in a general

population as proof." While it is not being argued here that ancer, heart discase, and other hung diseases cannot be caused by smoking. we do point to two dangars. The prob lem will not disappear if TV advertising ceases (although it could be that fewer young people will take up the habit); second, research should continue on the whole problem of disease and smoking. In the meantime, it is probably safer not to smoke.-MIDDLETOWN PRESS





ROASTS GO OUT TO DINNER



Patio Picnic - In a kettle-type grill, a pork roast is basted with orange sauce. Hot go-withs are individual potato servings, wrapped with cream and butter in foil, and a casserole, Vegetable Medley, from the kitchen. Icy milk and crisp, colorful Sour Cream Cabbage Slaw add a cool touch

VEGETABLE MEDLEY Buttered casserole, 2-quart

- 6 servings Pieheated 350° oven
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter 2 cups (approx. 1/2 lb.) sliced zucchini
- 1 cup chopped green, pepper
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 34 cup thinly sliced onion
- 2 cups cubed eggplant V2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup coarse breed crumbs
- 3 medium tomatoes, sliced

In skillet melt butter. Add zucchini, green pepper, celery and onion; sauté until just tender. Stir in eggplant and salt; turn into casserole, leaving butter in skillet. Add crumbs to butter in skillet. Top vegetables with tomatoes and buttered crumbs. Bake 30 minutes.



Drain peaches, reserving syrup OR peel and slice fresh peaches and sprinkle with 2 tablespoons lemon juice. In cake pan, melt butter: add brown sugar and 1 tablespoon reserved peach syrup OR lemon juice. Arrange peaches in pan. Prepare cake mix according to package directions. Pour 4 cups batter over peaches. (Any remaining batter can be made into cupcakes.) Bake 35-45 minutes. Cool in pan on rack. Take to picnic covered with foilwrapped cardboard a little larger than cake. Ten minutes before serving, place cake in pan on grill over low charcoal briquet fire to reheat. Invert cake onto foil-covered cardboard.

Charcoal grilling, a favorite for burgers and steaks, is a fine way to treat roasts, too. That's nice to know because roasts are an easy way to satisfy a group with big-as-all-outdoors appetites. If roast on a grill is news to you, get to know more about the idea with these menus. One roast is done entirely on the grill, the other heated there after being prepared ahead. For portable picnics, make sure to use a totable cooler to keep cold foods (like dairy items) really cold while hot fare grills. On the patio or the beach, aluminum foil is an indispensable cooking ally. And, as for that covered kettle grill, here's a minute refresher on how to use it:



Line grill with Heavy Duty Foil to reflect heat upward and make grill clean-up easier.

Mound or pyramid charcoal briquets to one side. Use an electric starter or apply lighter fluid and wait at least one minute before lighting.

Light charcoal briquets and place foil pan to catch drippings beside fire. Let charcoal briquets burn until they show gray spots.

Place meat on rack above pan. Cover and adjust dampers for a slow fire. Roast, basting occasionally. Meat cooks in a flavorful charcoal aroma without flare-ups or smoke. Drippings may be added to sauce.

ORANGE GLAZED PORK LOIN Kettle-type grill 6-12 servings

1 pork loin roast (3-5 lbs.) SAUCE:

3 tablespoons butte 1/2 cup brown sugar

To prepare Pork: Score fat at 1-inch intervals. Place roast, fat side up, on grill, directly over drip pan prepared from three thicknesses of Heavy Duty Foil. Insert meat thermometer through fat into very center of the meat. Place cover on kettle-type grill, adjust dampers and roast at low heat, (approximately 350°) until meat thermometer registers 170°. To prepare Sauce: In a 1-quart saucepan, melt butter. Stir in sugar. Add orange juice and stir until smooth. Using 1/4 cup sauce, baste roast during last 20 minutes of roasting time. Serve hot with pork. Makes approximately 2 cups sauce.


