





A Costly Campaign

By the Federal Communications Comission report, political candidates in the 1968 federal, state and local elections spent a grand total of 868.9 million for broadcasting.

This was a 70 per cent increase over the \$34.6 million spent in 1964.

The two parties split the total about evenly. The Democrats, however, had to devote more of their resource to their primaries where they spent \$12.4 million as compared to only \$5.4 million for the Republicans.

And having spent so much money fighting among themselves, the Democrats and only \$15.4 million left to spend in the campaign itself, while the Republicans turned fat with \$22.5 million. Of the total of \$58.9 million for broad-

Heraldic history has been made in the town of St. George, Bermuda. St. George is the oldest British town in the western hemisphere and has been capi-tal of Bermuda for over three and a half centuries, but it had never had a coat of arms.

Now for the first time a herald of England's College of Arms left the United Kingdom to deliver Letters Patent-the exquisite, hand-scrolled document drawn up by the College of Arms-granting armorial bearings to the mayor and corporation of

In full regalia, as never before outside the British Isles, Dr. Conrad Swan, Her Majesty's York Herald of Arms-in-Ordinary, came to Bermuda to take part in the ceremony specially organized for the occasion. While in Bermuda, the York Herald also presented armorial bearings to the Bank of Bermuda, on the occasion of the dedication of its new building in Hamilton-the highest building in Bermuda,

St. George put on a jolly good show for this memorable day in its history. In return for the herald's unique visit, it accorded him a unique gesture of appreciation: he was made an honorary freeman of the town. This was the highest honor which could have been given to him and there is no known record of it ever having been given before.





So stringent are the script de-mands of "Mission: Impossi-ble" that Geller has composed a seven-page instruction sheet for writers. It begins:

"'Mission: Impossible' must be written backwards, because the HOW is the key to the series. The fascinating problem is of no use to us without knowing

"It is the detailed unfolding of this solution to the problem that makes a 'Mission' plot. As a retitne can very rarely be fixed

in the writing of the teleplay."

Such detailed plotting has contributed to the series, success, mid Geller—"We tell a lot more story than most shows." He also considers photographic tech-niques a major factor.

We brought a film first to TV in that we made great use of the eye. What we were first criticised for now brings us praise: The fart that the show moves so fast you must pay attention all the time. With 'Mission' you can't go to the bathroom or to the kitchen for a beer. The audience has learned that they have to watch the show or they'll miss something."
