"I shall grade it accordingly with a zero," said the teacher, Alexander J. Chavich, 38, "I don't think I shall have to worry about a blank piece of paper again unless the guy is absolutely suicidal." The students who attempted

to leave their seats quickly discovered Chavich can slightly see light and was aware of their movement. He returned them to their seats, somewhat astor

But the day in Macombs Junfor High School, located in a disadvantaged area of the Bronz,

Principal Milton Stier. Furniture had to be rigidly arranged so Chavich would not bump into it. Studenta were told to speak out for attention instead of raising their hands. Chavich was excused from luncheon monitor duty when it became apparent he could not handle 500 youngsters swirling

about. His textbook is being transcribed into braille and he will hire, at his own expense, someone to read aloud written school

"I've been told by my colleagues I was foolish to accept him," said Stier, "but I think it's wonderful for the childrennot to the extent he's blind but that he's overcome it. 





The Kidnapping The kidnapping of American Ambassador C. Burke Elbrick by Brazilian terrorists should cause the Nixon administration to study carefully whatever suggestions Gov. Nelson Rockefeller made at the conclusion of his Latin-American tour.

Rockefeller's report has not been made public yet, but it certainly concludes that all is not well in the United States' relationships with Latin American countries. The need to assess American policy toward Brazil is emphasized by the fact that the kidnappers, according to the description given by Elbrick himself on his release, were "intelligent fanatics" and not stupid thugs as one could have assumed they might be.

Moreover they made it clear to Elbrick while he was in captivity that they hold the United States responsible for most of Brazil's troubles. This sweeping insearch of desperate men for a whipping

It may not be within the power of the United States to change the conditions under which it is possible for those who chafe under repressive measures of South American governments to blame this country. But our policies thus far, or perhaps the failures to implement olicies, have not helped.

Perhaps the kidnapping will encourage a reassessment.

The Diesel Too?

After an impressive session of the Environmental Quality Council out at Western White House in San Clemente, he President's science advisor, Dr. Lee A. Dubridge, announced that the federal government is devoting \$2,200,000 this year, and hopes to devote two or three times that much in future years, to the encouragement of a competition for a "low pollution" vehicle which will help out in our national effort to keep ourselves living in air fit to breathe.

This federal money will be going to conventional automobile manufacturers but also to other companies experimenting with possible improvements on or alternatives to the gasoline engine.

The eventual winner in this competition may be a steam, turbine, or electric engine, or some refinement of the present typical gasoline motor.

"It will be an interesting technological race," said Dr. Dubridge, "to see whether in the 1980 period the gasoline engine will still be superior to any other engine for propulsion."

The significant news in all this i that by the staging of this Council meeting, by the devotion of federal funds to the purpose, we are, as a nation, exhibiting, down here on earth in our own atmosphere, a minor portion of that will to achieve the highly difficult which we did achieve out with the moon.

Perhaps we do grow less tolerant of our own failure to deal with problems which once might have been considered beyond solution. Perhaps we do begin to feel muscle we didn't realize we had before. Perhaps we have shaken off some of the psychological chains which kept us from acting as if we had the power to determine at least some of the conditions of our own living.

Junk the gasoline motor, that demonstrated mainstay of 20th century civilization?

Back On Earth, Gremlins

It almost seems that the gremlins are conspiring among themselves when they take this summer-the summer of Amer ican technology's first landing on the Moon-to give a demonstration of their easy ability to foul up what should be the more routine technology of ordi nary American living.

But it is this same summer of the noon landing, 1969, which finds author ities in New York City conducting investigations trying to figure out why it f two of the services most essential to urban living-the provision of electric current and the maintenance of telephone circuits - are threatened with daily breakdown and insufficiency. The world's greatest city cannot seem

o guarantee itself a fall-safe sysem of electric power to keep itself cool and moving and lighted.

The world's greatest city can't seem to guarantee itself reasonable telephone service.

And the world's gretest city somehow fails to be able to claim for itself train service which doesn't break down every other day stranding commuter passengers helplessly.

But-as everybody must by this time e almost sick of repeating to every body - let it be necessary to have 2,000,000 intricate parts of a lunar module function flawlessly across quarter of a million miles of space, and that is something we can do.

Why our comparative failure, back here on earth? One perhaps shallow and incomplete answer is that we are in love with bigness, and not half as cautious perhaps as we should be about the possibilities that sheer bigness constitutes not merely progress, but also, on the negative side, increased vulnerability to accident. That, however, is not really an answer, because we do prove, in space, that size and complexity can be brought into the disciplines of perfect tooling and programming.

Perhaps the closest thing to a real answer is that we don't really care as much about accidents on earth as we do about accidents in space, even though the number of human lives endangered by our lack of caring is much greater than the number we risk in space.

Nothing shoddy is ever permitted t dictment is absurd and suggests the get even close to a space program. But something that has a chance of making do down here on earth is all too likely to get that chance.

The French have no common sense and their only concern is with prolifer ating their language. It would be laugh able to let them start from scratch in governing wide expanses of territory wh'n there is no one to whom the niceties can be imparted. The Spanish have "ome claim. They have administered Ric de Oro, which in climate and vegetation is more like the moon than any place on earth. But they turned it into a penal co'ony and would probably do the same again. The Portuguese are, apart from he Russians, now the world's foremost colonial Power, but the'r existing empire is already too much for them. When one looks round there remains only Britain; and the more one thinks of it the more attractive does the proposition be-

The British type of colonial administration thrives best in a vacuum, where there are no people to mees things up. Ask any African and he will tell you that no one has ever drawn straight lines on a map better than the British The Home Counties are full of men withcolonial experience, still in their prime. wilting for want of somewhere to administer. No one would have a better instinctive knowledge than they of the sort of tier-structure required: provinces, regions, states, autonomous areas right down to strategic hamlets, all uninhabited. Until people arrive in num-bers and start demanding things like advisory councils and legislative assemblies, British administration will be sound and just. And when the time does come for the moon to be thickly populated, when quarrels break out and the people start getting uppity, no one has more experience than the British in clearing out and leaving the chaps to jolly well make the best of it, what?
