

Civil Service Works Bored College Grades

The young people complain that the middle-level entry jobs and management intern roles to which they're assigned don't seem to demand enough of people with their talents and training. Lack of challenge is cited often by young workers who resign after giving federal service a brief trial, and the turnover in their ranks is distressingly high.

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Election Reform Debate Begins

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House launches an historic debate today on proposals to change the 18-year-old constitutional provision for the election of presidents.

Several days of discussion and voting are in prospect and final action is not expected until next Wednesday.

Three alternative plans will be put before the House, but only one appears to have a chance of winning the two-thirds majority required for passage of a constitutional amendment.

It would eliminate the present electoral college and provide for direct popular election of the president. If no candidate polled 40 per cent of the popular vote, a runoff election would be held between the top two contenders.

The proposal, which has the backing of House leaders of both parties, was given a boost when the Republican Policy Committee strongly endorsed it Tuesday.

The committee lays down the party line on major issues and House GOP Leader Gerald R. Ford predicted at least two-thirds of the Republicans in the House would vote for the direct election.

Soccer Riots Spotlight Trend to Mass Disorder

ROME (AP) — The soccer riots in Caserta spotlight a disturbing trend to mass disorder in Italy. General strikes, city-wide revolts, clashes with police and demonstrations on a grand scale have become commonplace.

There were plenty of political and labor riots in Italy after the upheaval of World War II. And "kiddie-references" to the Italian scene are fairly common on the soccer fields in this as well as other lands of hot Latin blood.

But never have so many Italians seemed to have the idea that if you make enough big trouble, somebody will listen to you. The immediate grievance can be of seemingly small importance.

The people of Caserta were enraged because their soccer team was dropped from the Class B league to the Class C as the result of a bribery scandal. They virtually wrecked their town and, gurgling and weeping from tear gas, fought riot police with rocks, iron bars and their bare hands.

The Turin newspaper La Stampa commented on the riotous Caserta's municipal employees to join the protest.

Some trace the trend back to widespread student rioting that began in the spring of 1968. The students got results; the government finally drew up a university reform bill.

With the political situation highly unsettled as the result of the Socialist party split which wrecked the center-left coalition government, and with unions agitating for sweeping improvements in their contracts, the disorder is likely to continue.

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To Take Course

Oral Exams Due Tomorrow For Assessor, Inspector

Candidates for the positions of assessor and building inspector will be given oral exams tomorrow by a panel of experts provided by Richard Frandenburg, State Tax Commissioner's Office.

The selection of those who will be given the job is the responsibility of the assessor or inspector.

Student Representation

MIDDLETOWN (AP) — Student representatives at Wesleyan University have been given the right to be represented on the university's administrative committee.

Wesleyan University President Edwin D. Robertson announced the decision of the trustees and cited their "strong conviction that the faculty and students must have more direct voice."

Under the new system, five of the six committees of the board of trustees will each consist of three or more trustees, a chairman, two faculty members and two undergraduate students. Only the trustees nominating committee will not have any students sitting on it.

Lagos, Nigeria (AP) — The Dona Mercedes, a landing craft chartered by the U.S. government for the International Red Cross to ship relief materials to Biafra, has sailed from Lagos.

The Dona Mercedes is bound for the Nigerian Midwest port of Koko to pick up 500 tons of wheat which will be distributed to feeding centers in Biafra.

The Dona Mercedes and her sister ship, the Dona Maria have been tied up for 12 weeks in Lagos while negotiations went on. Nigeria maintained that neither vessel could sail until the technical details and security involved in such trips were fully worked out.

Heart Doctor Severs Ties With College

HOUSTON (AP) — Famed heart transplant specialist Dr. Denton A. Cooley resigned Tuesday from the clinical staff of Baylor College of Medicine.

Cooley could not be reached for comment. Earlier this summer, Cooley resigned as a full-time faculty member and joined the clinical faculty. The new resignation apparently severs his relationship with Baylor completely.

His resignation also came a day after he had been named to the National Heart Institute's advisory committee on heart transplantation.

The National Heart Institute asked Baylor if its funds had been used in development of the artificial heart Cooley used.

NHI guidelines for funds granted to Baylor require doctors to submit their intentions to a human experimentation committee at Baylor.

Cooley said his device was developed without NHI funds and that he did not have to obtain clearance from the Baylor committee. He said his device was for therapeutic purposes, not experiments or research.

A Baylor committee set up to investigate determined that the artificial heart used by Cooley was substantially the same as one it was developing with NHI funds, but the Baylor trustees took no action against Cooley.

St. Luke's which has a human experimentation committee, unanimously approved Cooley's plan for future use of the heart.

Cooley is expected to continue his activities with St. Luke's, Texas Children's Hospital and with the Texas Heart Institute, which he founded.

"I've been in public office since 1962, and I learned very early in the game that when you're beset by reporters, you have to have time to think," he said.

"So every time they ask me a question, I put the pipe in my mouth, take out a puff and light the pipe. By the time I puff on it a couple of times, I have the answer."

The Board of Education voted to accept the recommendation of the transportation subcommittee to offer a compromise rate schedule to South Windsor bus contractors.

The board last night agreed to offer \$40 per bus for the first 60 miles and 35 cents per mile for any run over 60 miles.

There was little discussion of the board's decision since the contractors were not at the meeting. Board chairman Charles Lyons expressed his disappointment as did the other members of the board that the contractors were not in attendance.

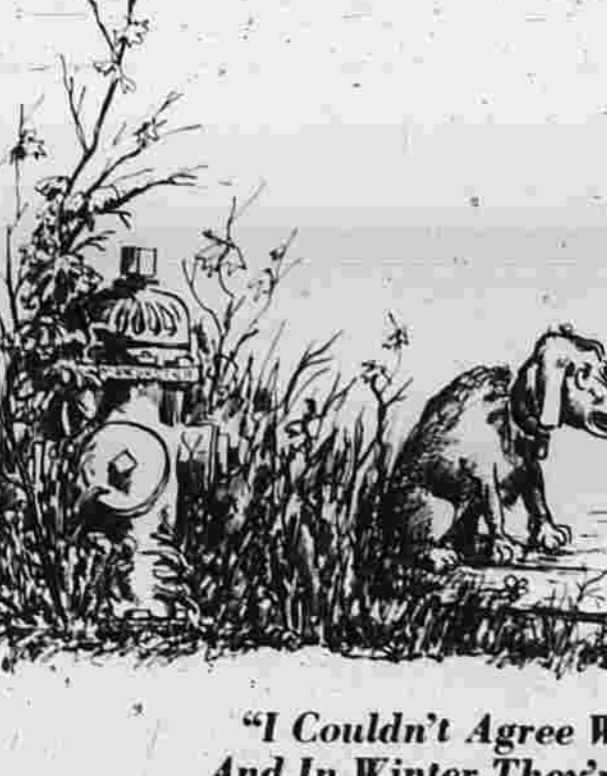

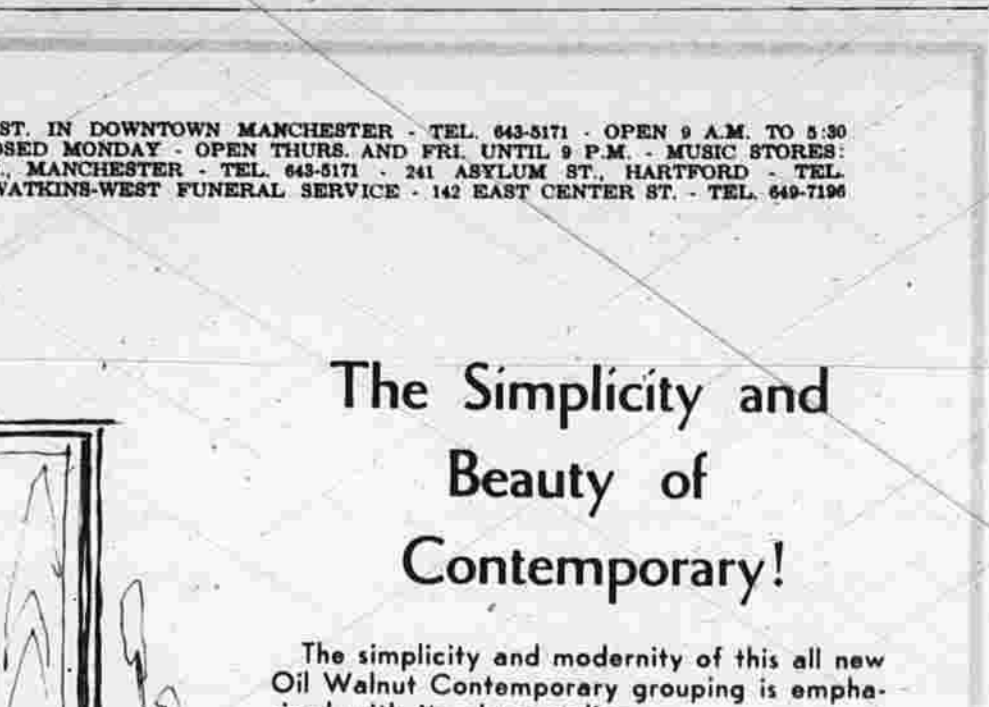

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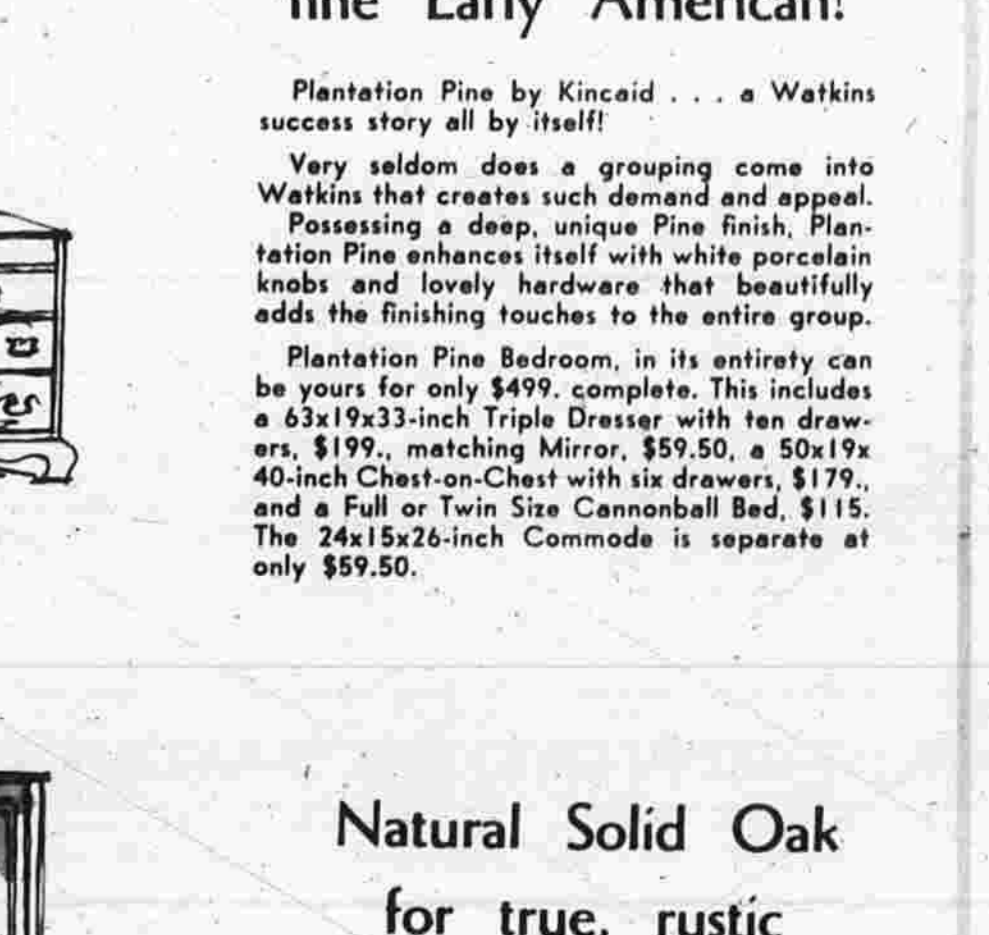

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In '68 Liberty Beckoned 51,000 Eastern Europeans

In their pockets were passports valid for travel only to Bulgaria and Yugoslavia. But they had decided to go farther. "We were getting closer to the border," one of them explained, sitting on a cot in the Latin re- fugee camp near here. "The immigration man came through the train. He didn't say anything. He took the passports three times and checked them. The train slowed for its last stop in Yugoslavia. The immigra- tion man handed back the pas- ports. The train moved across the frontier. They were safe in Italy. "That hour we passed was awful," the young man said. "He and his friends found a policeman and asked for poli- tician asylum. They were taken to the intake camp at Trieste, one of the largest ports of entry for the non-Communist world in Europe. Anyone fleeing their home- lands. "TAKING THE FIFTH"

"TAKING THE FIFTH" has already become part of the nation's slang. This is an unusual mark of distinction for what is, after all, a technical rule of evidence. What does the expression really mean? Literally, it means claiming the protection of the Con- stitution's Fifth Amendment, which says that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself." The theory of the Amendment is that it is unfair to force anybody to testify on himself. But this does not mean he may keep silent in the courtroom whenever he pleases. He may keep silent only if answering might tend to incriminate him. A witness in a gambling case refused to talk, even after being granted immunity from prosecution. "Even though I cannot be prosecuted," he told the court, "I could still be mighty embar- rassing for me if I tell what I know." But the court ordered the witness to speak out. The judge said the act of embarrassment, alone, was not a weighty enough reason to invoke the constitu- tional privilege. But the witness strictly personal—only for the protection of the witness him- self. Thus, a witness in an assault case was ordered to testify, despite his fear that he would be getting his cousin in trouble. The judge said stretching the Fifth Amendment to protect other people would unduly ham- per the courts in getting the facts they need to do justice. Still, the basic philosophy of the Fifth Amendment is deeply rooted in our legal system. In accordance with this philosophy, it is a general rule that the prosecuting attorney may not tell the jury that a witness who "takes the Fifth" must have a guilty conscience. "A witness may have a reasonable fear of prosecution and yet be innocent," said the United States Supreme Court. "The privilege serves to protect the innocent who otherwise might be ensnared by ambiguous cir- cumstances." CRPA Hearing Tomorrow On Coventry Airport Plan

Strong citizen concern is expected to be voiced at tomorrow night's public hearing on the proposed airport plan of the Capital Region Planning Agency. It will be held at 8 p.m. in the Circuit Court Room of the Windsor Town Hall.

Of particular concern in area towns is the proposal for an airport to be located in Coventry on Rt. 44A and Broad and Milk St. The airport would be publicly owned.

Among those expected to voice their opinions on the proposal tomorrow night are Young, Stephen Lopkin of Coventry representing the Coventry Board of Selectmen, and State Sen. Robert Holley, D-Tolland County. Former CRPA Chairman Roy-mour Lavitt of Vernon is expected to file a commenting letter on the airport plan.

The proposed 1,000-acre location is within a mile of the towns of Tolland, Bolton, and Vernon, prompting many of their residents to voice as strong a concern as those in Coventry.

Although the CRPA report details the site of the proposed airport and runways, other supporting material is generally unavailable.

Many of those planning to attend the hearing tomorrow are expected to seek further information on the proposal.

Basically the proposal calls for acquiring the 1,000-acre site, the construction of a 5,000-foot main runway, a 3,000-foot crosswind runway and future parallel runways. The development of the airport would be phased over a 15-year period with a target completion date of 1982.

Flights at the proposed airport would be operated under visual flight rules and would be controlled by the state-controlled Harris Report.

Both the Coventry and Bolton Board of Selectmen have gone on record in opposition to the plan. Winstham Region Planning Agency Executive Director Dana Hanson of Bolton served on the Airport Advisory Council of Elected Officials.

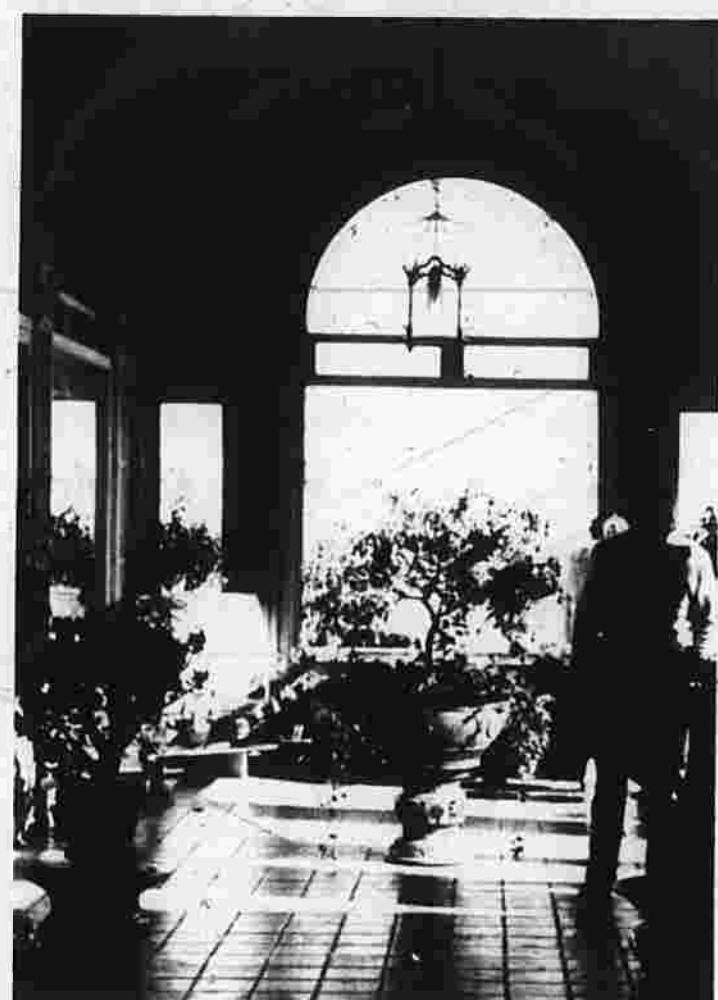
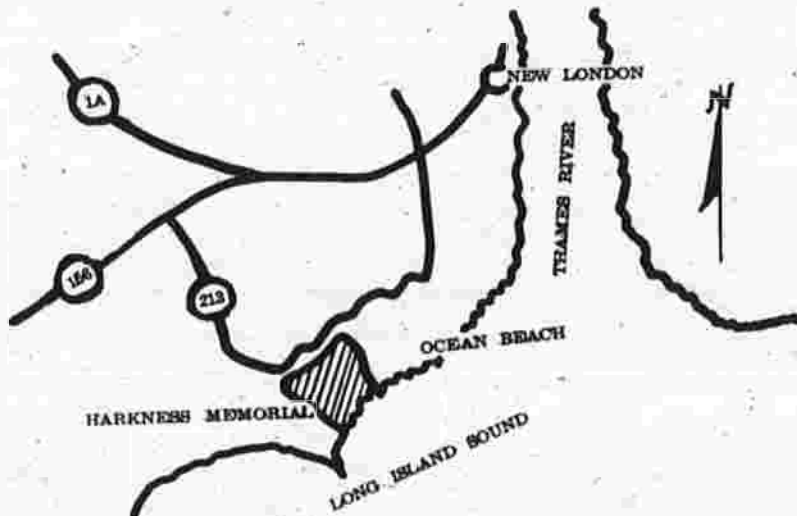

Vienna Planning Major Face Lift

VIENNA (AP) — Downtown Vienna, with its picture-book church spires and greenish domes, is facing a major facelift over the next 12 years, but its exterior will remain unchanged and tourists will not be barred from a single historic sight.

The facelift will consist mainly of a modern underground or subway system and a ring of garages—costing about \$20 million.

Run-down historic buildings will be reconstructed and their facades will remain the same.

The entrances to the subway lines—which will run from the St. Stephen's Cathedral, Vienna's top symbol, to the outskirts of the first district—will be built at St. Stephen's Square and at the St. Charles Church.

Construction of the underground, planned before World War I, is scheduled to begin in the fall.

Precautions have been taken to protect both the frescoes of St. Charles Church and any Roman ruins or catacombs workers might come across as they dig 24 meters below street level.

The subway lines and 30 garages, most of these underground, are sited in downtown Vienna.

Seventy per cent of the Viennese employed in banking and 60 per cent of the city's insurance offices and ministries are located downtown, along with the Parliament, the University and the Vienna City Hall.

Vienna's narrow lanes cannot cope with the growing traffic, and parking spaces is at a premium.

ABA Issues New Code On Fair Trial, Free Press

By WILLIAM J. CONWAY Associated Press Writer

CHICAGO (AP) - A summary of ground rules for handling information on crimes and trials has been issued by the American Bar Association...

The publication summarizes the main provisions of the new Code of Professional Responsibility for lawyers as they apply to pretrial and trial information.

In addition to guidelines on handling news, the code embraces the entire area of actual conduct for lawyers.

The ABA has no authority over any lawyer who practices the code, as such, is not binding on anyone.

However, when the code is adopted by state bar associations or by state supreme courts, as is expected in most states, then it will become binding on lawyers, according to the ABA.

Upon adoption, then, violations of the code could subject a lawyer to a variety of forms of discipline, including disbarment.

The press-bar guidelines were in Part I (the one pertaining to lawyers) of the controversial Reardon Report. The report was approved by the ABA's policy-making House of Delegates in February 1968, over the opposition of news media.

The manual summarizes what the ABA standards do in various phases of criminal cases. First, what they do prior to arrest or charge. They: -Contemplate prompt release of information that a crime has been committed, facts of the crime, announcement that an investigation is under way and its scope.

August issue of the Bulletin of the American Society of Newspaper Editors that voluntary statements of principles and guidelines are in existence in 16 states. Joint bar-press discussions, he added, are under way in other states, including New York and California.

The ABA lists the states where voluntary agreements have been made at Oklahoma, Oregon, Massachusetts, Washington, Colorado, Kentucky, Louisiana, Minnesota, Missouri, Wisconsin, New Mexico, North Carolina, South Dakota, Utah, Arizona and North Dakota.

The ABA's new president, Chief Judge Edward J. Devitt of the U.S. Court of Minnesota, said the ABA standards "complement rather than supersede the voluntary codes already adopted in some states and under consideration in others."

Devitt is chairman of the ABA Legal Advisory Committee on Fair Trial and Free Press. His group produced the manual. The Devitt committee succeeded a committee headed by Justice Paul C. Reardon of Massachusetts.

In Education: Experience Can Provide Best Ideas

BY DOROTHY RICH The Washington Post Some of the best ideas in education don't emerge from those deep-think education planning conferences or from public foundation offices.

Here are four of those ideas. The first three come from Judy Tarr, an experienced elementary teacher with the Montgomery County Public Schools.

1. Good teachers should be identified and used to help poorer ones. The secret of good teaching is no mystery. Teachers who do it well are in touch with students who really need help.

2. A cross-country exchange of teachers is needed. At present, a teacher joins a school district and stays with it forever or else leaves to join another district.

3. A variety of learning approaches should be offered in every school. We know now that different ways of learning appeal to different children.

4. Teachers should start their careers in the primary grades. It should be required that all teachers teach for a minimum time in the early grades.
