A Speech In The Rose Garden

In one respect, perhaps inevitably, President Nixon has gone full circle on the war in Vietnam, finally heading himself back into a repetition of a scene and of words which President Johnson made so familiar. The scene is the White House rose

garden. The ceremony being performed is the presentation of a Presidential Unit Citation to the First Marine Regiment for its courageous and distinguished service in Vietnam.

And the Presidential words, as they were actually uttered by President Nixon last Tuesday, and as they were uttered in substance before him by President Johnson many times over, were these:

"I trust that the political leadership that we have in this country will be able to match the sacrifice that they have

"We think we can bring peace. We will bring peace. The peace that we will be able to achieve will be due to the fact that Americans, when it really counted, did not buckle and run away, but stood fast, so that the enemy knew that it had no choice except to negotiate -negotiate a fair peace."

Thus, using a moment of recognit of military courage and sacrifice as his opportunity, the current President made is effort to deal with his rising tide of what must seem to him irresponsible demand for him to end the war by some arbitrary timetable of unilateral American withdrawal.

This is not the President who began this war, but the one who came into office pledged to end it.

Instead of the escalation which was the long policy of his predecessor, he has specialized in gestures and actions lesigned to reduce and cool the war.

But his gestures- perhaps because hey really haven't been big enough or saningful enough -perhaps because anoi has no intention of dealing quickly on any terms-have not produced suc-

cess in the peace negotiations at Paris. With that the situation, he finds himself faced with the demands of domestic peace crusaders that he do something like set a specific date by which all American troops will be withdrawn from Vietnam

In his position, he wonders what kind of inspiration that will give the North Vietnamese negotiators at Paris.

He has a military citation to present. to Americans who have already done their share of fighting in Vietnam. He elivers to them a speech in the formula often used by his predecessor, so natural for any President in that situa-

The comparison, however, is not just President Nixon deserves some credit nd time and latitude because he has been trying to move in the right direcon. But instead of winning such fair nd balanced treatment from the peace usaders, the latter are on the point of ewarding him by making demands of him which are much sharper and more rastic than anything they asked from President Johnson.

The result gives him much less chance of playing an effective hand toward eace than the critics were willing to llow Johnson, His whole course of acion has been designed to show his willngness to negotiate, in an extremely bliable fashion. The current drive of the peace crusaders would have the result of leaving him nothing to negotiate with or about. The nation's leadership on peace ought to be allowed to remain, for at least a fair amount of time and testing, with the White House.

Selling The Front Seat "There are few back seats worth get

ting into anyway." That was the rather rough verdict o a newsman who had just spent considerable time in Detroit investigating the qualities, efficiencies and comforts of the latest crop of automobiles.

This reporter found that it was im possible to enter some back seats head irst, but that backing into them was quite a feat too. He found there was little room for any kind of feet in the average Detroit rear. And he discovered, as have others, that a car's external size may be no guide at all to the amount of rear seat leg room. These are, of course, familiar com-

plaints. What no one has answered, as yet, is the question of why Detroit does this, and why it thinks it can get away with

it, model after model, year after year. The answer is, we believe, relatively simple. The back seat rider is seldom the purchaser of the car.

The purchaser is the individual who gets into the front seat, adjusts himself or herself behind the wheel, and proves very particular about the degree of comfort he or she experiences in that driver's seat.

The person sitting alongside the driver on the front seat may also have a voice in the decision to buy or not to buy. But it is very seldom that the purchasing money or the operating individual bothers to do more than cast an appraising glance at the upholstery in the back seat.

Detroit bets, model after model, year after year, that it can get away with selling its front seat and giving back seat drivers one more thing to complain about.

A Privilege Of Hummingbirds

If an ordinary sized man ever kept himself at the same level of activity as that which is normal with the hummingbird he, like the hummingbird, would have to spend most of his time eating in order to get the strength and energy to keep on eating.

But if, for all his hummingbird energy he were still a man in size, the food he would have to eat to consume at the rate of a hummingbird would total 285 pounds of meat and either 370 pounds of potatoes or 130 pounds of bread every

Then, like the hummingbird, the mar would hardly ever have time to leave the table, and would have to keep stoking continuously away in order to have the strength to keep on wtoking.

This is an understandable extrapolation of hummingbird statistics into the iuman proportion

What we can't understand is how, for all its incessant intake, the hummingbird remains forever so light and graceful and perfectly proportioned, while mere man, the moment he reaches for another piece of potato, seems to start slowing down and bulging.

Lindsay Against Sin

Anyone who lives, or precariously exists, in New York city can tell you at once what ought to be the issues of the Mayoralty campaign in November. The fundamentals of city life, laid down by the ancient Romans, and improved upon by nineteenth-century Britain, arsurely well kown; a body of law protested in emergencies by the police and enforced in tranquility by the courts; a pure water supply; a dependable system of public transport; free and orderly public education; and the systematic

learing of refuse from the streets. are, however, the very things in which New York is failing fast. Its water is doctored with increasing des peration to taste like carbolic acid. Its treets, once you get above or beyond the wealthy compound of the upper East Side, are abandoned to dustbins groaning with uncollected garbage. Its courts pro vide so long an is val between crimand punishment unit many dangerous criminals are out on ball or appeal. The public transport is congested, dirty, and ubject to power blackouts. The schools are a battleground of races, and teachers too harried by disorder to do much teaching. Only the police have managed, by exercising restraint that sometimes verges on the heroic, to improve their old, tough image. This must undoubtedly be put down to Mayor Linday's indoctrination efforts. Yet Lindsay is now hardening his cam-

aign strategy along magnificent Orwelian lines. He more and more suggests that without him the city will relapse into the jungle it in fact inhabits. And he has decided to come out like a man the war in Vietnam.

The first strategy is the old La Fontain exercise which warns a man on his deathbed that if he doesn't watch out he will catch a cold. The second rades on the universal weariness with the war in Vietnam and the universa inability to say how it can be ended It will not be necessary for Mayor Lindsay to offer a plan, either domestic or foreign. It is enough for him to view as a hideous prospect the actual condi tion of the city; and to deplore the bloodshed of the insoluble war. This double talk, reinforced on television b Lindsay's radiant good looks, should to refurbish the picture of St. moving on the dragon brought him with such high hopes into City Hall. Preheat oven to 350°F. Drain fruit cocktail, reserving juice. Measure 11/3 cups fruit into baking dish and heat in oven 10 minutes. Beat with electric mixer at medium speed for 3 to 4 minutes. Grease and flour rectangular utility pan ($8^{\circ} \times 12^{\circ}$ or $9^{\circ} \times 13^{\circ}$). Pour cake batter in pan and spoon hot fruit evenly over top. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 40 to 50 minutes or until done. Melt butter or margarine in heavy saucepan. Blend sugar and cornstarch and stir in until dissolved. Gradually add 1 cup fruit juice and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Beat egg yolks and stir small amount hot sauce into them. Add egg mixture, almond extract, vanilla and remaining fruit to sauce. Heat and serve over cake. Yield: 8 to 12 servings.

A majority of the homemakers interviewed expressed confidence in serving roast beef when they did not know guests' preferences.

Add autumn glamour with a hot cling peach sauce and a tiered golden crown salad jeweled with glistening fruit cocktail and set on a ruff of lettuce. Hot or chilled, these popular and convenient canned fruits add fine flavor to dinner menus. Complete the main course with baked potatoes, a green vegetable such as Brussels sprouts or broccoli and hot rolls.

With this menu, the range and the refrigerator will free the cook for hostessing. Roast beef competes with convenience foods when it comes to ease of preparation. A roast requires a minimum of the cook's time as the oven does the work. When it's a boneless sirloin tip, the carver's job is easy too. Select high quality sirloin tip for roasting. It is most tender when cooked only to rare or medium and carved in thin slices.

Season 4 to 6 pound beef sirloin tip roast with salt and pepper. Place the roast, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in the center of the thickest part, being sure the bulb does not rest in fat. Do not add water, Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325°F.) until the roast meat thermometer registers a temperature of 140°F. to 160°F., depending upon the degree of doneness desired. Allow roast to "set" for 20 minutes for easy carving. Internal temperature may rise 5° or more during this time.

Chill, When sour cream gelatin mixture is partially congealed, fold in chopped nuts and remaining fruit cocktail. Pour into mold on top of first layer. Chill until firm (about 6 hours). Yield: 12 servings.
