

Marijuana dealers apparently are using helicopters to haul the weed out of this rich harvest

area in north central Kansas, Undernheriet Lorin Kasper of Cloud County said Thursday.

Two helicopters have been sighted in "the heaviest concentration of marijuana in our county, and it extends into Republic County," Kasper said.

There have been more than 175 marijuana arrest in Kansas this summer.

"A farmer told us that in mid-September, he saw a helicopter land in a draw," Kasper said. "He looked through a hedge and saw a man jump out of the chopper, run into the weeds and come back carrying three large bags. The man threw the bags into the chopper and it took off, headed west.



SIRS—for satellite infrared spectrometer—was among in-struments sent into orbit aboard the Nimbus III last April 14. It measures the infrared ener gy put out by the atmosphere to provide data for a temperature SIRS was intended as a re-search and development experi-ment, but it was so successful it

is being used operationally, said Dr. Harry Press, Nimbus III project manager for NASA.

The device gathers information normally obtained through use of weather balloons or instrument reaches. trument packages carried alo by rockets.

Already SIRS-gathered data has resulted in improved weather reports from the vast ocean areas and other remote sectors about 80 per cent of the earth's surface—where balloon sounding data is extremely rare, Press said.



East Germany Draws Back

It has taken something like 72 hours, following the certainty that Social Democrat Willy Brandt would become the new Chancellor of West Germany, for the Communist regime of Walter Ulbricht in East Germany to go into its own headlong switch of attitude on the issue of more cordial relations between East and West.

As was precisely the case in the long coolness Christian Democratic leadership in West Germany held toward more friendship with the East, there is an elemental case of political survival in-

Just as the Christian Democrats always knew that any reunification with East Germany might mean their own political loss of power, so the East German regime of Ulbricht knows that its own chance of ruling East Germany lies in fending off forever the possibility of reunion with West Germany.

All this elemental politics was on open display at East Germany's celebration of the 20th anniversary of its own existence as the German Democratic Repub-

The first thing glaringly obvious was that Ulbricht regarded the prospect of Brandt becoming Chancellor as if it were some kind of disaster, in spite of the fact that Brandt has always been the leader toward more cordial relations with East Germany.

## Watkins Funeral Service Is 95 Years Old

Watkins Funeral Service is the work of Herbert W. Swanson, who was with the firm for 40 years. He retired in June 1968 as advertising director and secretary.

Watkins - West Funeral Home (owned and operated by Watkins Bros., Inc.) celebrates its 95th birthday this month with the opening of its newly enlarged and redecorated facilities. It was designed by arcritect Thomas Johnson, constructed by Leon Cieszvnski of Manchester and supervised by funeral director William J. Lennon. The enlarged and remodeled funeral home has an entirely new chapel of 1688 square feet with a seating capacity of 150, reception room for both chapels, an enlarged smoking room on the second floor and rest

rooms on both floors. The two chapels are designed so the large family room can be used for either chapel, or the entire room opened so as to seat more than 300 persons. Both chapels can be divided by folding doors for smaller fu

The chapels are now sirconditioned by a new central Carrier air-conditioning system which is thermostatically controlled with diffusers in the

A new, large display room has been located on the ground level with direct entrance from the private, off-street parking area which has also been enlarged. The entire first floor has been recarpeted wall-towall with a carved stylized diamond pattern in a blue-green coloring. Woodwork is painted a soft gray-green, and French Provincial open arm chairs and ove seats upholstered in gold. Draperies in the various rooms range from figured prints to tone-on-tone damasks.

Extensive landscaping has been done to beautify the

grounds. Eric Sloane, Connecticut artist, author and collector of Early American tools, recently stated that the reason so many old line furniture stores of New England started out as funeral services may have been because both coffins and furniture were made of wood. That well may have been the case, for Watkins Bros., celebrating its 95th anniversary this month, was actually started as a funeral service on Oct. 8, 1874, and later added home furnishings, pianos and organs to its business. It all started one day in East ford, Conn. where the Watkins amily lived prior to coming tended the funeral of Gen. Nathaniel Lyons, first general to be killed in the Civil War. The two boys, Clarence G. and F. Ernest, were very much impressed by the pomp and dig-nity of the occasion, with the horse-drawn hearse decorated with feather plumes, and all the horse-drawn hacks rented from livery stables in nearby towns.







or most Vietnamese, "nuoe mam" is a popular sauce of life. It is a condiment made from fish, and it is used to flavor food, dunk food in, mix with soups, moisten dry rice, or almost anything else to do with eating. On the island of Phu Quoc, in the Gulf of Siam, nuoc mam is serious business. About three million liters of the sauce are exported annually. The residents of the

claim that it is the best produced anywhere To make the sauce, layers of small fish, caught in the island's coastal waters, separated by layers of salt, are placed in giant wooden vats. The fish are left to decompose for 12 to 14 months, during which time they liquefy and mingle with the salt. As the level falls, more fish and salt are put in on top.

Then, after a year or more, the bottom of the vat is tapped and the sauce begins to trickle out-a pungent golden sauce with a powerful bouquet (or what the unsophisticated might be tempted to call a stench). The first out, that from the bottom which has been there longest, is considered the best. Tasters and smellers, with tiny china cups attached to a long bamboo handle

sample the sauce as it pours out into other containers. If judged satisfactory it is transferred to five-gallon cans for shipment to the mainland. The product is very highly prized. 




