





The White House said letters from the President will be mailed Monday as a followup to his nationwide radio address in which he asked all citizens to "bear the burden of restraint i their personal credit and pur-chasing decisions, so as to reduce the pressures that help drive prices out of sight."

Or Mankind Learning To Walk? As becomes quite obvious in the talk and print aftermath, nobody knows quite

what to make of the Moratorium. And that - an inability to decide upon its practical results - is perhaps an inevitable consequence of any effort to judge it as one might judge some other event in the public domain - an election, a vote, a speech, the adoption of a platform, a public opinion poll.

Will it influence the President ? Will it stab our troops in the back? Will it help produce a quicker peace? Will it needlessly prolong the war?

Answers to such questions, even among those who helped organize the Moratorium and who participated in it, are uncertain and contradictory. Even the specific intent of those who participated in the demonstrations refuses to submit to any single, general definition. Some were against this war in particular, some against all war in general; some took the particular conduct of the President as their target, hoping to in- it was that there was never anything fluence it, others wanted to take authority itself away from established leadership and have decision rise from the

But such disputation and difference of opinion over what the Moratorium may have accomplished, or may have meant to those participating in it, does not iminish the possibility that there is one central proclamation that might be made about it.

With this Moratorium the device of emonstration at least momentarily crossed the line into respectability. Americans who had cringed, in advance, at the spectacle of such a fringe preauming to present itself to its more responsible betters, found their instinctive reaction contained less recoil than they had expected. Somehow, in the aftermath, the automatic assumption that anybody participating in such affairs must be somebody abnormal began to fade a little.

For this, the generally peaceful conduct of the demonstrators themselves was primarily responsible. Colorful side touches - like the participation of some of the nation's financial leaders in the special participation Wall Street staged in historic Trinity Church - disconcerted what had once been a disdainful assumption that only the weird and the crackpots and the hipples dared demonstrate for anything, let alone a cause like peace.

Even the demonstrators themselves, then, ought to be able to agree on one thing. In and by the way they did it, they confirmed and enlarged the right of people to take beliefs and act upon them, to select a vision and march for it, to find a mood and a spirit and exemplify it in public assemblage. It is not a substitute for the complicated ways that things must be done, in this complicated, institution - spangled, constitution - girdled, bureaucracy - tangled world of ours. It is a return to the simplicity with which an innocent, undoctrinated child might begin walking through his world, choosing between sun and shadow. It may be the most impractical birth of something new in all the history of mandkind. Or it may be mankind learning to walk for the first

No Cheap Alloy, Please

The members of the Senate and House at Washington are of equal mind in wishing to create a coin which will be memorial of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

But when it comes to the question of what shall be in the "Eisenhower dollar" the Senate has voted one way, the House

The Senate, loyal to some of its active silver state members, voted to create an "Eisenhower dollar" which would have at least 40 per cent silver content. The House, loyal to the Nixon Administration's effort to control the price of silver downward by keeping it out of all public money, voted to create an "Eisenhower Dollar" which would be copper and nickel, like one of our present quarters.

No such difference over the content of the "Elsenhower Dollar" should ever have been allowed to rise, no matter what the effect on the price of sliver. The Tyranny Of The Diploma

'Education is the greatest growth industry in America," proclaimed Dr. rayson Kirk, the Lyndon B. Johnson of Columbia University, not long before the children of that growth rate drove him into exile. Neither the rebels nor Kirk connected the cause of the growth rate with the students' dissatiafaction Both are the result of diplomaism Because diploma requirements are be ing attached to virtually every well-paid job, more and more students must attend iversities that offer less and less in eturn for their time and tuition. Yet, ronically, no one in the campus turmoil advocates the abolition of the diploma. Even Students for a Democratic Society a not revolutionary enough-or, perhap not democratic enough-to demand the right not to get a degree and still compete for a good job. Nor, another irony, were the ignorant armies of students and police that they are both victims of the

We are all victims of diplomaism, for the elimination of performance as the criterion for success impoverishes the whole society. Yet the victims do not try to make common cause. The student condemned to ever-longer years of classroom futility yells "pig" at the policeman who has suffered a disastrous loss of prestige for lack of a diploma. cop swings his club at the head of a black ghetto youth who by class and income and race is excluded from the pursuit of the diploma that alone would allow him to prove his ability in th marketplace. The cop and the other sullen members of Middle America express their anger by voting for George Wallace because Wallace accurately informs them that "pseudo-intellectuals" are putting them down for lack of a diploma But neither they nor the blacks nor the young challenge the growing tyranny of diploma.

In the genuinely democratic society jobs and promotions would be awarded strictly on the basis of performance. But in the United States, the disease of judging people by paper credentials has been spreading rapidly and few occupations are still exempt. Sports and the arts are virtually the only pursuits in which performance is the exclusive test of merit Of all the paper credentials now on the narket, the bachelor's degree is the or with the least meaning and the most power. It has become the almost indiapensable passport to good jobs and to he advanced degrees that offer better ones. And all the wrecking of deans offices has done nothing to put the diploma system up against the wall. Unless the power of the diploma is undermined, the campus revolt may produce nothing more than a student vote in running the education guild. The entry probe would carry a mass spectrometer to sample the composition of the Jovian atmosphere as well as instruments to determine temperature, density, pressure, plus the physical properties of the clouds. The flyby would measure the fields and particles in space and detect any radio emissions from the planet.

This entry probe will require matchless engineering ingenuity. It must be lightweight, capable of withstanding the extraordinary atmospheric conditions and high-pressure mechanical stresses. It must also execute a variety of complex scientific experiments and communicate the results to the mother spacecraft for transmission to the earth. In designing such a probe, we must bear in mind the problems the Soviet Venera 4 encountered in the atmosphere of

Venus.

It is hoped that such a probe

can account for the cloud features not only of Jupiter but the other major planets as well. With the ending of the Apollo program, the Space Science Board has emphasized the need to advance planetary sciences by using space technology developed over the past decade. They point out that the length
