This is the conclusion of Dr. Eugene Jennings, professor, management consultant and personal adviser to executives. "The affluence of the 60s," he said the other day, "was achieved at a considerable human cost."

Jennings has noted the appearance in growing numbers of "short cycle winners' and terms them subclinically sick. "They suffer from energy fatigue and unable to recoup, plug away but with little success."

The major cause of energy

"The opportunity to go to the top by dint of effort and skill was too great to restrain," Jennings believes. "They over-invested energy during the climb and now, near the top, have no reserve fuel with which to live up to their reputations."

These men have impressive records and they remain deceptively capable. Often they are hired away to perform the same wonders at other companies and begin with a flash of frenzied effort that soon fizzles.

"They lay back and run with the pack," Jennings observed, the though conserving their enterties as an emotional anesthetic.

It means, essentially insecure executives, the more realistic answer lies in priority living.

This means deciding what is worthwhile and pleasurable in both job and personal life and placing them above the unpleasant chores. It means getting up goals. It means, essentially, breaking the bonds and enjoying life.

Jennings believes that corporations might consider identifying certain jobs as killers and automatically remove the executive after a period of time without humiliating him or damaging his career.

After recouping his energies in a less stressful position, Jennings believes, the executive should be available again to handle another killer job.






