The Ladder

Once, a couple of centuries ago, there was a time when you had to be a white Congregationalist of English descent in order to be anybody in this country.

Since that time, members of every race and creed have been making their way up the American ladder, achieving osition both economic and social, ataining prestige and power, winning ors, until, in truth, there are moments when you have to look hard to find the Mayflower type still up there at the top, so many others are at the top too.

As the representatives and members of one race or creed or ethnic descent have, over the decades, made their climb, a certain kind of reaction has been repeated, again and again.

Those already on top have, after an initial phase, of prejudiced resentment, reconciled themselves to the prospect of sharing the best and highest things of this country with others.

And those in the race, creed, or ethnic division, represented by the latest is still something of a delicate problem climber have been uniformly proud of in international relations. their successful representative, realizing that what he has achieved represents a insult, to the regimes in the Philippines Germans, Italians, Swedes, Greeks or lives of their young men. Slavs. Catholics or Jews, whatever it is And there are subsidiary problems. he himself happens to be.

But when we come to the particular division which has had to start off lower and wait longer than any other division the success of the particular individual o longer meets with precisely the same from his own group. The Negroes had to start out in the status of slave. The way up for them has been slower and harder than it ever was for any other group. The resistance to their advancement has been greater.

The result of all this is that some blacks have lost patience with the normal American climbing process and do not react in the normal way when some noteworthy individual takes a big step up the ladder.

There is now a sort of test case in the news-the selection of Dr. Clifford Reginald Wharton Jr. to be the new president of Michigan State University. Dr. Wharton is the son of a Negro who rose through the diplomatic service to be Ambassador to Norway. Dr. Wharton himself has specialized in becoming "the first Negro" in a number of positions, at Harvard, and outside in his professional life as an economist.

Now he becomes the "first Negro" to head a major public university in the North.

This is a giant step up the American

Most of the people he will join "at the top" will have genuine welcome for him. The education of America's best in the proper destiny of the Negro in American life has been proceeding very swiftly in the last few years.

It is among the people he might be said to represent and lead that the reaction will be divided. Some blacks, undoubtedly a great majority of them, will be proud of him for his accomplishment, and will feel that his success in reachng this new height reflects credit and opens new opportunity for all black

But there will be an impassioned miority of blacks who will not react that way at all. They will feel that Dr. Wharton has sold out to the white establish ment by accepting honor and favor and cognition from it. They will reason that he has received this honor not besume the white establisment really beeves in advancing the Negro, but because it wants to appease him and satis fy him with much less than his ful rights in our society. And, instead of wishing Dr. Wharton success in his new position of leadership, this extremist minority among the blacks is quite likely to go out of its way to cause trouble for him, to humble him for taking the white man's honor, and to discredit all the good intentions which center around the possibility of the Negro finally coming up, in his turn, as every other American group has done.

The place to look for this attitude to show will be on the campus of Michigan State itself." If the minority we have described exists there, as it exists throughout the whole Negro community, it will be found trying to give Dr. Wharton's campus not the least trouble on the racial front, but the most. In the view of the minority black extremists, we imagine, Dr. Wharton should divest himself of his degrees and his sophisticated polish and his smooth successful appearance and turn his talent to the business of growing his hair long and training snipers for emergencies in the ghettoes.

The majority reaction will be to salute his success story, and the example and encouragement it gives, and to hope that this nation has time for the last great group to do its climbing too.

Working with miniscule narcotics police force, the Mexican government seized and de-stroyed 47 tons of marijuana last year. The Mexican attorney general's office reported that between Jan. 1 and March 31 this year, 11 tons of marijuana and nine million pills were destroyed in Tijuana, Mexico, alone. Hundreds of armed men from Syria kidnaped more than 20 policemen in an attack before dawn today on two Lebanese border posts, the Lebanese army reported. It said police and army units repelled another raid on a third bor-


der post. Al Fatah, the biggest of the Arab guerrilla organisations, said its forces made the attacks, captured 24 Lebanese and would return them quickly. Al Fatab said the raids were a warning "to prove to the ruling author ties in Lebanon that the Pales tinian revolution is capable o returning any blow doubly."

An estimated 100,000 Syrians demonstrated in Damascus to day, roaring chants of "Death to Lebanese traitors" and calling for overthrow of Lebanon's military commanders who were characterized as agents of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. Significantly, the demonstration was led by top-ranking leaders of Syria's ruling Baath party and branch leaders of the Palestine guerrilla organization.
