





Hundreds of armed men from Syria kidnaped more than 20 policemen in an attack before dawn today on two Lebanese border posts, the Lebanese army reported. It said police and army units repelled another raid on a third bor-

der post. Al Fatah, the biggest of the Arab guerrilla organisations, said its forces made the attacks, captured 24 Lebanese and would return them quickly. Al Fatab said the raids were a warning "to prove to the ruling author ties in Lebanon that the Pales tinian revolution is capable o returning any blow doubly."

An estimated 100,000 Syrians demonstrated in Damascus to day, roaring chants of "Death to Lebanese traitors" and calling for overthrow of Lebanon's military commanders who were characterized as agents of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. Significantly, the demonstration was led by top-ranking leaders of Syria's ruling Baath party and branch leaders of the Palestine guerrilla organization. Meanwhile, Iaraeli warplanes struck on two fronts today, hitting Egyptian military installa tions on the Suez Canal and susected commando bases inside

The attacks on the Lebanese border posts were in retaliation for army action early this week against Arab commando campe n southeast Lebanon. The Palestine Liberation Organiza tion claimed that 14 guerrillas were killed and 25 wounder when the Lebanese army attacked three guerrilla villages. The army said the guerrillas started the fighting and that casualties were two soldiers an five guerrillas killed, and two




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



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The Credit And Chance Due Nixon We would have to be labeled a completely insensitive and foolish people if we had ever allowed the current atmosphere of demonstration for peace to get away with trying to take President Nixon for its principal target.

Fortunately, our national decency has been rescued by the conscientious remarks of men like Senators Mike Mansfield and J. William Fulbright, who have now taken post-Moratorium pains to set the record straight.

The Senate Majority Leader said, in his remarks, that President Nixon has brought about a "deescalation of the conflict" and developed what is "in essence sort of a ceasefire and stand fast approach." Senator Mansfield suggested that people who want peace in Vietnam get behind the President and "urge him to keep on the road he is traveling."

The Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, for his part, said he thought President Nixon was indeed "trying to wind down" the war.

Such comment is, from the political point of view, refreshing in its candor, honesty, and justice.

But it is particularly fortunate that it has come at a moment when some demonstrations have been tempted to act and speak as if President Nixon were doing the opposite of what he has been

It shouldn't need to be said again that he has opened a policy of reducing. rather than augmenting, our forces in Vietnam

The reduced weekly casualty figures should point out, beyond the need for help from anybody's voice, that somehing we have been doing, or not doing, in Vietnam, has operated to slow down the pace and the human cost of the

It is the formula of moderation. As the nature of the experiment with the cyclamate rats would suggest, even the rats might have been given moderate amounts of the stuff without ever showing any harmful result. It is quite possible that human beings were never going to be harmed by any cyclamate products unless they consumed them in what would have to be ruled an excess. Or, to take the point of decision and judgment back still another point, most of the people who welcomed the cyclamates might never have had any reason to be interested in them if they had been able to be moderate in their consumption of products containing normal and natural sweeteners.

The government can't legislate moderation. It can only make a choice between open supply and flat prohibition. But individuals always have a choice, and whenever they do succeed in choosing moderation they not only benefit themselves by governing themselves wisely, but they free their governments from the need to resort to remedies perhaps more drastic than the situation should require. There are relatively few things so dangerous that use in real moderation has to involve harmful results. There is hardly anything that can be consumed in excess without injury.

An Illusion On Marijuana

The Administration's recent drug control efforts reflect a disproportionate emphasis on suppressing marijuana, which makes a good deal of sense as a way to achieve a political splash but not much sense as a way to reduce the drug

The Administration can draw atten tion to its toughness on drugs, for example, by bottling up the Mexican border in "Operation Intercept"-an anti-smuggling drive that appears to be aimed primarily at marijuana and only secondarily at harder drugs. The drive causes untold inconvenience to tourists, residents of both nations living near the border and the customs officials themselves. Whether it has any effect whatever on drug importation if far less

It seems that because of a drought in the Mexican growing-lands and other reasons, relatively little marijuana has been coming in anyway. Also, the drug can be grown almost anywhere in the United States itself. More important, such emphasis on chasing marijuana smugglers seems likely to draw limited drug-control resources away from efforts to suppress heroin and other far more dangerous drugs.

There is, in addition, a real pose bility that even the immediate effect of the anti-marijuana efforts may be worse than useless, A Deputy Attorney General says the drive is intended t push up the price of the drug beyond what college kids can afford. Even i the Justice Department could incredibly succeed in that endeavor, the resul could easily be to push more students and others toward experimenting with more potent drugs. Reports have it that the drought-induced marijuana shortage ing this effect alread A similar distortion appears in the administration's proposed drug control bill. Possession of marijuana would b punishable by a two-to-ten year priso intence, mandatory on second offense except for the possibility of probation or first offense, this is the same penal proposed for possession of heroin. On a rational basis, we see plenty reasons to maintain some type of lega sanction against marijuana. Its long ological effects may yet prov damaging, Psychologically, depe on a reality-escaping drug can do no good, especially for adolescents only saming to cope with their environme and there is a good deal to be said for nning the drug to help counteract the drug-giorification cult that can prepare the ground for experimentation with nore dangerous drugs.

At the same time, society does little rage experimentation with heroin and such when it keeps them and marijuana in the same legal category. Common sense calls for keeping the disction as clear as possible. Beyond that is the question of simple ustice. A ten-year prison sentence, with its possibility of a wasted life, is not comnensurate with the danger of marijuana Thatever its potential for self-de struction, it clearly does not approach that of heroin. More important, its use does not lead to drug-associated crimes like theft or mugging. All in all, marijuana use seems about as serious crime as, say, public drunkenness, a

it ought to be treated as such. Marijuana is mostly a drug of fuzzy minded youths and not of the sophist cated criminal syndicates; thus it's as easy target for administrative and legs crackdowns. But making martijuan legal and social whipping boy is no substitute for doing something serious about drugs, and any notion to the contrary is dangerous illusion .- WALL STREET





Papillon grew up in the south of France, the son of school teachers, and by his own account was tough enough in his late teens to cut off his thumb with a rock when a hitch in the navy began to bore him.

Navy friends led him into the safe-cracking business, and with an underworld reputation, Papillon was arrested as a suspect in the murder of a pimp. On Oct. 26, 1931, Papillon was sen-tenced to life imprisonment and prohibited, even if eventually paroled, from returning to Pau s. Shipped off to the penal colonies of French Guiana, he began what he calls "the road to rot." Papillon's book carrie through 13 years until his last "gallop," his word for an escape. With it came a life in Venezuela in which he pumped gas, hunted for gold, served as an unlicensed dentist in the jungle and later, began to make some money as a night club owner. The murcury dipped to 21 degrees shortly after 6 a.m. to shatter the previous low of 28 for Oct. 24, which was recorded in 1964. Bridgeport shared in the record-snapping cold with a 26 de-gree reading this morning, the owest temperature the 19-year old weather bureau there has recorded on any October day. The previous low was 28 degrees set

The chill moderated sor what in the Plains and Midwest, where some overnight lows were up to 29 degrees warmer than a day ago. But a fresh supply of cold air seeped into the Northwest and northern Rock

Stockmen and travelers were warned of the possibility of locally heavy snow in western Montana by nightfall. Storm centers off the northwest coast and in the Rockies spilled rain into Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

The cold snap in the Northeast dropped the mercury to 17 at Albany shortly after midnight to give the New York capital its coldest October day on record Concord, N.H., chilled to 16 before daybreak.








Unlike most birds that migrate to a warmer climate for the winter this seagull has come to a stand-still on a piling in the fishing village of Stonington. (AP Photofax)

By The Associated Pres BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) -Security forces in Lebanon's northern port of Tripoli fired on demonstrators converging today on the city's main mosque, killing at least four persons

and wounding seven. Defying an indefinite curriew clamped on Lebanon's major cities following bloody clashes between the army and Palestinian guerrillas, the demonstrato were reported to have battled with troops and police in two areas of the town. One column of demonstrator

shouting pro-guerrilla slogans, ran into a cordon of troops near the harbor. Another clashed with security forces in the city square, shortly before neor Moslem prayers.

Official Lebanese sources p out a different account of the clash. They claimed the mother of the local political leader complained at the mosque that her son's house was surrounded b

More than 100 of his arme followers clashed with polic when they set off to investigate. Tripoli is a hotbed of Arab na-tionalism and two large Palestinian refugee camps are situat ed outside the town.

The demonstrators, however were mainly local Moslems. According to Palestinian sources, one Arab guerrilla was killed in Tripoli's Nahr I Bared camp in a separate class

with troops and police. The camp, which houses 10,000 Palestinian refugees, has been the scene of frequer clashes in the past.

list periodically against new scientific evidence that could indicate possible health hazards. The FDA can fund less than 400 inspectors for 50,000 food manufacturing plants that use additives, and the inspectors lack legal authority to check company records for unsanctioned additive use.

Furthermore, critics contend the FDA has erected insurmountable barriers to removal of any substance from the approved list-short of such catastrophic findings as in the case of cyclamates. "The list is a bad, bad area

for us," said a high-ranking FDA official. "It's a real nevernever land for regulation." FDA Commissioner Herbert L. Ley Jr., followed up last week's cyclamate ban with a

additive list and conduct any laboratory studies that seemed Ley mid the FDA will start

with substances most commonly used, such as saccharine, anoth er artifical sweetener, MSG and common components baby food. The National Academy of Sci

Congress empowered the FDA n 1968 to establish the safety of food additives through laboralory tests and regulate their use. But in doing so, the lawmakers exempted from the test provisions additives "generally recognized" as safe by qualified experts.
