- 8 medium-sized green gumdrops 8 medium-sized black gumdrops. each cut into 3 triangles 8 pieces black string licorice.

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, 1 envelope (1 oz.) no-melt chocolate flavored ingredient Semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Whole cashews

1 2 teaspoon salt

- Beat together shortening and sugar until creamy. Add egg, vanilla and peanut butter; blend thoroughly. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture; blend well.
- Divide dough in half. Shape one half to form a roll 8 inches long. Add chocolate to other half. Roll out chocolate dough on waxed paper to form an 8-inch square. Place roll on chocolate dough; wrap chocolate dough around roll; pinch seam together. Wrap in waxed
- Cut into 1/4-inch slices. For each owl face, pinch chocolate dough to form 2 "ears." Use 2 chocolate pieces for "eyes" and a cashew for a "beak." Place on ungreased cookie sheets. (If desired, make small hole in cookies with wooden skewer. After cookies have baked, thread ribbon through hole to hang on tree.) Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes about 2-1/2 dozen cookies.
- *If dough is refrigerated several hours, allow to stand at room temperature about 10 minutes before slicing.

HALLOWEEN DOUGHNUTS

Vanilla Glaze*:

4 teaspoons milk

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1 cup sifted confectioners sugar

- 3-1/3 cups pancake mix
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon mace 1/4 teaspoon cardamom
- 1/3 cup shortening, soft 2 eggs, beaten
- 2/3 cup milk
 - For doughnuts, combine pancake mix, sugar, cinnamon, mace and cardamom. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add eggs and milk, mix thoroughly, Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas; knead gently a few seconds. Roll out to 1/2-inch thickness; cut with floured doughnut cutter. Fry in hot deep fat (375°F.) 2 to 3 minutes or until golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper. Cool. For vanilla glaze, beat together sugar, milk and vanilla until smooth. Drizzle glaze on dough-nuts. If desired, decorate with checolate shot, nonparells or candy corn. Makes 12 dough-

*For Chocolate Glaze, add 1 envelope (1 oz.) no-melt chocolate flavored ingredient, increase milk to 2 tablespoons and decrease vanilla to 1/4 teaspoon.

MAPLE CANDIED APPLES

- 2 cups maple-blended syrup 1 cup sugar 1 4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 9 wooden skewers 9 medium-sized eating apples, washed and dried

Bring syrup to boil in top of double boiler. Stir in sugar and cream of tartar, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Cover and boil 3 minutes. Uncover and cook over medium-high heat to the hard crack stage (300°F.) or until syrup dropped into very cold water separates into threads which are hard and brittle. Remove from heat: place over hot (not boiling) water.

Insert a wooden skewer into each apple. Dip one apple into candy, turning to coat evenly. Let excess drip from bottom of apple. Immediately roll bottom half of apple in chopped peanuts; press lightly with palm of hand to make peanuts adhere to candy. Place on lightly greased aluminum foil to cool. Repeat with remaining apples. Makes 9 medium apples. For ease in eating, tap side of apple with back of spoon to crack candied coating. NOTE: To make a delicious maple candy, combine any remaining syrup with any leftover

peanuts. Spread on lightly greased aluminum foil to cool. Break into pieces.

Two 6-oz. pkg. (2 cups) semi-sweet chocolate or butterscotch pieces



There need be no doubt because it is there in the voting record of their representatives in office—that if the Democrats had been in power in Manchester during the past three years we would have borrowed more, spent more, and taxed more than we have under the Republicans.

The Democrats have repeatedly voted in favor of bonding for current obligations in a way the Republicans-and the voters of the town, too, when the choice got to them-have opposed and rejected.

The Democrats have repeatedly fought for appropriations which, if they had been allowed to stand, would have required substantial increases in the tax Instead of accepting the Democratic

theory that everything can be done at once by one financial means or another. the Republican party in Manchester has attempted to formulate, and hold to, a program of continuing accomplishment which does not seek to place undue and unfair financial burden on the wrong people. The Republicans do not believe in spending and financing in such a way that what ought to be the housekeeping

expenditures of today are billed, with those interest charges which sometimes almost double the final cost, to the children of tomorrow. The Republicans do not believe in spending in such a way and at such a rate as to make it a hardship for lifelong residents to keep on trying to live in Manchester.

This difference in the spending and financing approach is the main issue of the local campaign.

It is enough of a real difference-no matter how humdrum and uneventful the campaign itself may seem-to demand an exercise of choice from every reasonable citizen. Takes Two To Polarize

A great deal has been written lately about the hardening political and social attitudes of the working class. Naturally, this anthropology has been done by members of what might loosely be call ed the intellectual class. Just as naturally, these anthropologists seldom study

The gathering of the clans in the working class is only half the story, however. its mirror image is also taking place in consolidation and hardening of a titudes on university campuses, in the journalistic craft and wherever intellectual pretensions are found. The phenomenon is not the growth of new attitudes in one subculture, but something potentially more mischievous, a polarization By now it's widely recognized that the

white working class has recently spawned some curious notions, like its belief that the Negro is the only one who ever gets a break. It's less widely recognized hat much of this "working class reac tion" is precisely that, a reaction to the self-righteous and contemptuous attitudes often found in the intellectua class. When, for example, a man has seen muggings become commonplace in his neighborhood, and when you call him a bigot for worrying about law and order, then rightly or wrongly he will conclude that whatever else you say is probably nonsense too. And that goes double for what you say about race.

The attitudes of peer groups, indeed, may be especially important in the academic or journalistic communities, where the common coin is presti Writing in the current issue of The Public Interest, for example, Columbia Professor Charles Frankel reports that as he moved from Government to academic life and back, the pressures for conformty changed in direction but not in in-

Mr. Frankel sympathizes with academic critics of Government policy, but he writes that "respect for the facts require that, within the scholarly community, considerable social pressure can evelop in favor of one view or another. With respect to Vietnam, for example it simply has to be admitted that, wit in the university world, the courageous dissenters are not those who disapprove of Government policy but those who approve of it."

In whatever subculture, these peergroup pressures have a special effect in this age of mobility and instant com munication. It's startling and a bit frightening how quickly polarization can develop over issues like Vietnam and Woodstock, where the classes are not divided by any underlying rational interest but by a clash in styles and perceptions. In this age, the effects of peer groups no longer operate merely within geographic regions, though plenty of that emains. The pressures transcend regions to permeate and divide national

The danger is that class polarization may become as divisive as sectional polarization once was. And as the sections flight led to the Civil War, so the class fight could lead to a painful crisis of its own. One wonders how long a soclety can maintain democratic institutions without rapport between the common man and the elite.

The intellectual class particularly needs to start examining its own role in the growing polarization. Not merely benuse some of its own beliefs are stiffnecked and foolish, and not merely because some intellectuals and would-be intellectuals debase themselves with simplistic name-calling about "immoral" wars and "racist" societies. Beyond that, there is a special problem about the function of the intelligentsia.

A good many of the intellectual elite seem to celebrate the growing class solidarity among them, viewing it as the fruition of enlightenment. Surely this is an egregious misconception of the nature of truth. If Western intellectual tradition teaches anything, it teaches that truth is not found by drinking at the font of any dogma. It is found in the open and honest clash of ideas. Diversity s the lifeblood of the intellectual class. provided it wants to remain a class of intellectuals rather than haughty but narrow-minded Mandarins.

Intellectuals and their camp-followers then, ought to be especially solicitous of diversity and especially wary of pressure toward conformity. The growing endency in their community works i the opposite direction, and it poses a peril to both them and the WALL STREET JOURNAL

On Inquest BOSTON (AP) — The issues that have delayed the inquest into the death of Mary Jo Hopechus may be decided upon by the Massachusetts Supreme Court any day now, according to sources close to the court.

Miss Kopechuse died July 18 when a car driven by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., plunged off a narrow bridge on Chappaquiddick Island and landed in a tidal pond. Kennedy escaped.

Miss Kopechuse's death was ruled accidental drowning by a medical examiner.

A majority of the justices on the court met behind closed doors Tuesday. Part of their time, according to one court source, was devoted to polishing the wording of their decision on the issues that have helted the inquest.

State Welfare **Head Resigns** HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)

State Welfare Commissioner Bernard Shapiro submitted his resignation to Gov. John Demp-sey today effective Dec. 1, giv-ing his wife's health as the reason for ending 10 years as commissioner.
Shapiro said the pressures and tensions of the post had begun to affect the health of his wife, and he was unable to persuade her that he should remain in

the job any longer. Shapiro, 61, became welfare commissioner in 1959 after holding several administrative posts in the New York State welfare service. While in New York he participated in two studies of the Connecticut welfare system which brought him to the at-tention of Connecticut officials. "I must reluciantly submit my resignation as commissioner of welfare," Shapiro's letter to Dempsey said. "It has been increasingly more difficult for my wife to
