Two Blots On The Campaign

One of the reasons the present Manchester municipal campaign may seem dull is that it has, except for two blots, been conducted on a relatively high and quiet level. This is something that should be appreciated by the voters, and something that gives them the best kind of opportunity to concentrate on the real choice offered them.

That real choice, we believe, is that of how fast we want the town to spend money over and above what a reasonable use of its present tax resources will

The Republicans say, in effect, that selves without putting extra and unjustiflable expense on either the children of tomorrow or the elder taxpayers of today. The Democrats are inclined to be more generous with everybody's money. including money tomorrow's generation hasn't begun to earn yet, and money today's elder generation can no longer replenish by the earning process.

That is the main issue of the campaign, and one being presented with considerable candor by the two parties. The voters can listen to them, and follow their own judgment, their own philosophy, their own opinion of what our spending pace should be.

As for the two blots on the campaign, they involve instances in which somebody is trying to sell the voters a false bill of goods. One comes from the Democratic side of the cumpaign. The other comes from the Republican side, although the Republican organization should not be held responsible for it.

Some of the Democratic campaign argument asks the voters to believe that various physical imperfections on the municipal scene, like potholes in a street or leaks in a roof, did never exist or were never developing under the town's previous Democratic administrations, but have suddenly flowered out of conditions for which only Republicans could be responsible. This is a kind of theory not even the Democrats would pretend to honor, outside campaign

From the Republican side of this cumpaign there comes, against the responsible decision of the party organization itself, the appearance of an independent candidacy for the office of Town Clerk which has used the petition method of getting itself located on the Republican lever as if it were representing the will It is, however, necessary to provide and the hope of the Republican party

Those supporting this independent candidacy of Mr. William Murray would have us all believe that it is the handsome. Galahadian crusade of some free and noble spirit who is out to upset the wicked dragons of routine politics in

Whatever its motivations may be, it is a candidacy which threatens, as its result, benefit to no one except Mr. Murray and otherwise nothing but mischief.

What the Murray candidacy attacks, and what it could destroy if it should happen to be successful, is a hopeful trend in Manchester toward taking two important public service posts out of the political wars and putting them on an unofficial merit basis. The mechanics by which this tacit movement has been taking place have seen the Democrats, for their part, giving their nomination for judge of probate to Judge John Wallett, the Republican incumbent, and the Republicans, for their part, refraining from

making any nomination against Town Clerk Ed Tomkiel, a Democrat.

The Republicans left that nomination vacant in 1962, and in 1964, and in 1966 and their Town Committee meeting voted to leave it vacant again this year. That decision Mr. Murray is now trying to upset, with his own presence on

Secondly, we have no idea where the slogan linking apartments and industry came from. It is often argued that reasonable taxes, a labor pool, good transportation, water, sewers, good schools and a pleasant, alive community contribute to attracting industrial prospects. But seldom, if ever, is it argued that apartments are

the magic solution. Kowuleski goes on to discuss the necessity for providing housing for Middletown people, and certainly they should come first. But this is today a mobile society. People elect to live here and work elsewhere, or they may work here and live in other communities. The old patterns have changed, whether we like

people with a place to live. With high lown payments and high interest rates. it is difficult for a young couple to buy house today. They are almost forced nto apartment living ,and there is a very substantial demand. So that pleas "to make certain that income bearing apartments are taxed on a fair basis" are all very well, but they do not begin o solve the problem—and besides there is no evidence at all that apartments under-assersed. It is all very well to rail at "cancerous growth," which is the Kowaleski approach; it is more productive to insist on well planned apartments, well built, and located so that traffic problems are minimiz-

dustrial expansion. Pratt and Whitney Middletown is up to 4000 employes, other factories will be going up soon. There will be a continuing demand for all types of housing. While new industry does help create this demand, housing is erected to serve people that work here, rather than to attract industry.
