U.S. Changes Its Policy Re Latin Nations

WASHINGTON (AP) - Presi dent Nixon has scrapped the ambitious goals of the Alliance for Progress in favor of a policy that will lower substantially the United States profile in Latin Ameri

Issuing his long-swaited Latin American policy statement Fri-day night, Nixon said the future United States role in the inter-American alliance will be that of a partner rather than a leader.

What I hope we can achieve is a more mature partnership in which all voices are heard and none is predominant a partner-ship guided by a weathy awareness that give-and-take is better than take-it-or-leave-it," he

Nixon used as his forum for the address a dinner gathering of the Inter-American Press Association, which wound up its week-long annual meeting here. The speech was beamed live by satellite to 11 Latin American nations

Nixon indicated his new policy would treat all Latin governments -democracies and dicta-torships alike-as equals.

"We must deal realistically with governments in the inter-American system as they are," he said.

The remark was viewed as an dmission that past United States efforts to use its diplomatic and economic influence to encourage representative democracy have not worked. Well over half of all Latin Americans now live under military. dictatorships.

While offering "no grandios promises and no panaceas," Nixon did propose changes in two areas which have been the subject of frequent Latin complaints-U.S. trade and aid poli-

ROME (AP) -The youthful gunman who carried out the world's longest air hijackingfrom California to Rome-was captured in a little country chapel today, nearly five hours after the hijacked jetliner landed in Rome.

Rome, police dentified their captive as Rafael Minichiello, who was charged by federal authorities in New York with air piracy, kidnaping and interferance with commercial aircraft. The hijacker had flown 6,900 miles in a five-stage journey across the United States, the Atlantic Ocean and Western Eu-

He was found this morning in the Sanctuary of Divine Love near the Appian Way, about six miles outside Rome, just as 500 policemen were about to give up their manhunt,

At Rome police headquarters Minichiello was questioned for about 45 minutes by detectives. He emerged looking calm, his hands no longer manacled.

He cursed at a photographer he considered too close to him . Chief of detectives Salvatore Palmeri said later the motivation for the hijacking "was not very clear."

After a meeting with Rome Police Chief Giuseppe Parlato, Minichiello was brought before reporters. He amiled and said, Aw, go home "Why'd you do it?" a new



In That Chicago Courtroom

What, we wonder, would all those oneentence analysts of the problems of our time do about the situation out in that Chicago courtroom, where there is that ontinuing confrontation between a judge who hasn't emerged from the 19th century and a black leader who has nothing out contempt for the relatively enlightened laws and relatively civilized codes of the 20th?

Judge Julius Hoffman, reacting viscerally from the start of the trtal of e eight defendants accused of plotting to cause trouble in Chicago during the last Democratic National appvention, has had no great trouble progressing to the point where he ordered chains and gag for one of the defendants before him.

Bobby G. Seale, the showboat defendant in question, is not interested in a verdict of innocent or guilty from the court in which he finds himself. He merely wants to destroy the court. tI is a lurid possibility that Bobby Scale's idea of a proper court is in the hands of police in New Haven, Conn., who claim to have a tape recording of the proceedings i which Scale himself sat as a judge in a Black Panther trial of one of that group's members who was subsequently found nurdered, apparently in accord with the erdict reached and the sentence proounced by Seale's court.

What goes on out in Chicago, then, is what seems a confrontation beyond good solution. The devices by which the preiding judge tries to protect the dignity and order of his court themselves constitute lurid additions to the lack of order; the firmness employed in behalf of due process turns out to be the precise tuff which wins the type of headlines for Bobby Seale which, in some quarters, will make him a hero and bring him new

How could such a situation have been avoided? How might it have been handled differently? How protect one of the institutions of the democratic process from such an outright effort to defy and destroy it?

The answer would seem to have to be in only one direction. It would seem to have to be that, if the application of force to the Panther merely plays into the Panther's own most cherished plan of battle, a more effective course for thecourt would have been in the opposite rection. Perhaps the court, attempting to be service and untouchable in its own lignity, should have permitted the Panther to rant and shout and scream imself out, no matter how many days it took, no matter how irrelevant his tactics and words were to the specific trial in progress.

Conceivably, under such treatment, the would be black martyr would have succeeded in stripping himself of any heroic aspect, and would have come out of the trial, whatever its eventual verdict on its own particular issue, as a loser n what is to him the much more important forum among the blacks he would like to be able to draw toward his own program for substituting the law of the jungle for that on the books,

Maintaining Standards Of Invective Liberal commentators indicated last week they were still deeply hurt by Mr. Agnew's characterization of some Moratorium Day protesters as "impudent snobs." Like Harry S. Truman, Mr. Agnew is occasionally partial to powerful invective. (Remember when Mr. Truman eferred to congressmen as "squirrel

Well, whenever somebody in Washing-ton indulges in powerful invective, I gen-erally check in with Jack Snide & Partners, Inc., the Washington agency that specializes in supplying words of revile-ment for the use of angry politicians. Because not all politicians are equally creative, the finide group offers highly ectalized counseling in this area.

I found Mr. Snide in his office dangiing his pet cat by the tail. "Member of the press, ch? Come on in you glorified stenographer."

"What?" I said. "Oh don't mind me," said Mr. Snide ropping his cat on its head. "I just like to keep in practice. Nothing personal, I suppose you're here about that Agnew remark about the protesters." I said I was,

"Well, our firm had nothing to do with that. We maintain high quality standards around here and we'd never give a client a weak phrase like 'impudent snobs.' Agnew should have consulted us and we could have come up with something really nasty, but Spiro is still new around ashington and he's going to have to learn the hard way."
