

CAPE KENNEDY Electrical power surged int a giant Saturn 5 rocket today as the launch team began the weak-long countdown for Apollo 12, man's second moon-landing

The countdown clock started right on schedule at noon IBST, 167 hours 38 minutes from scheduled liftoff at 11:22 a.m next Friday.

In addition to 98 hours of countdown, four automatic holds totaling more than 69 hours were programmed for rest by the launch team and for dealing with possible problems. As the countdown started, launch director Walter Kapryan reported all launch preparation

were proceeding amoothly. The three astronauts, Charles, Conrad Jr., Richard F. Gordon Jr. and Alan L. Bean, planned several hours today in com-mand ship and lunar lander simulators, rehearsing key steps in the 10-day flight.

Also on their schedule was briefing on lunar topography. Conrad, Gordon and Bean first climb into the command ship trainer to practice proce-dures for the rocket burn that will propel them out of earth or bit and onto the quarter-mil-lion-mile translumar trail.

That ignition occurs over the Pacific Ocean after the astronauts have circled the globe one and a half times to make certain the spaceship's systems are working. Later, Conrad and Bean are

Back On The White Horse? As President Nixon said to those two newly victorious gubernatorial candidates to whom he gave lunch the day after election, it is surprising how well one looks when one is wearing a vic-

The President gave no lunch that day to a third headline victor at Tuesday's polls, but if he happened to see nim on television he must have found the same remark appropriate.

Mayor John Lindsay of New York City looked as fresh as a daisy, as buoyant as a buoy, quite as if he had just come back from a long carefree vacation instead of out of a grueling fight for his political life.

The New York Mayor looked better in victory in other respects than the mere physical, too. In the retrospect of success, the campaign in which he had sometimes seemed to stoop too low or woo too obviously turned out to be a smooth masterpiece of political psychology. There's nothing like success to make strategy look good, nothing like the victory wreath to reestablish a noble consistency of character.

In his victory, the handsome Ivy League moderate-maverick was close to being the shining knight on a white horse, all over again.

Perhaps he can be that. Perhaps the problems of his City can be, some of them, resolved cleanly. Perhaps the torturesome events and trials of our time are going to open a way for him to display his chivalry in other and more important contests.

In any case, regardless of what the obviously rocky and difficult path of the political future offers him, even in trying to deal with the problems of New York City, John Lindsay has already done something very big for American public life. He has proved that the worst does not necessarily happen, or win. He has demonstrated that people can be invited out of negative narrowness into the broader light and freedom of decency. He has proved that a great modern city, with all its potential conflicts, all its almost impossible human and technological problems combined. does not have to become an evil witch's brew of unrelenting hatreds and violences.

For such reasons, we would be inclined to rate Mayor Lindsay's victory even more notable and important, in the nation, than those of the new governors in New Jersey and Virginia.

It too, then, ought to be worth a White House luncheon. And if the President hesitates to host him for having won as an independent over a Democrat and a Republican last Tuesday, can't he pretend that he is merely entertaining him in order to make sure he's thanked him for that wonderful speech he made in Miami, a summer ago, nominating Spiro . Agnew for Vice President?

The Uncharted Storm

The pattern has become familiar-em barrassing to all our very good weather men, but not entirely unwelcome to some of the rest of us who perhaps cheriah an occasional touch of the unpredictable in our lives

The way it usually seems to happen

tention fixed on some storm which is coming up the coast, or which is passing over us to the north. We spend some 24 or 48 hours in anticipation of the precipitation which seems due. It does not appear on schedule, and the storm that was being watched is dismissed.

Then, a day or two later, something comes in off the ocean and hits us with a barrel full of rain or a slope full of

It is either our own old storm, which has gone out and drunk up some ocean and then decided to come back and visit us, or it is some new storm which has had the temerity to go and breed itself somewhere a few hundred miles out in the Atlantic without ever notifying our weathermen of its existence.

When it catches him with his umbrella home, the weatherman says "Hello, stranger, who are you?" and then the layman says "Hello weatherman, where were you?"

Some day there will be a cure for this, so that the weatherman knows just as much about the weather that is coming toward him from the east over water as he now knows about weather com ing to him over land from the west of up along the coast from the south.

But for the moment there seems to be nothing but argument over how this should be achieved. Some weathermen believe there ought to be a series of permanent weather ship stations out in the Atlantic. Others believe that one daily flight over a given region would be sufficient. It may well be that eventually all those satellites we have up there in space would be able to spare time from their own duties to report on the shape, size, and direction of storms being born or rejuvenated out over the Atlantic.

Then there are some of us who think ife would be pretty dull if we always knew exactly what was going to happen next.

The President On Vietnam

President Nixon must be understood as a man searching earnestly for peace, but his speech last night added very little to that effort. It was a disappointment t

For those who disagree with him, i was the same old refrain, and they will be angry. For those that agree with him, it will be clear that he did no win the support he seeks-the suppor that is necessary to his approach-and hence the speech was a failure.

The problem remains the same. The President maintains that he has a plan, out believes he cannot announce timetable that he calls the plan. He said the pace of withdrawals depends on either the Paris negotiations, or the ability of the South Vietnamese to replace American combat troops, possibly both. le therefore can promise nothing.

As was noted here yesterday, the President intends to stay in Vietnam as long as he can, or until there is some motion at the peace table. No one should expect that the Paris negotiations will produce audden movement. The North Vietnamese have been fightng off and on ever since the end of World War II. They were promised one free election-in 1954-and were suchred out of it. It is a leason not easily forgotten. Nor should the United States place much hope in Vietnamization. I can work only to a point. Some American troops can be pulled out and replaced. There have long been too many american troops in Vietnam if regarded from the standpoint that the Vietnamese are not making a total effort. But eventually, the U.S. will pull its troops down to the irreducible level, and then the ransparancy of the Nixon plan will be plain for all to see. We will, in short, he no closer to peace than we are now. The difference will only be measured n more American deaths, more woun d, not to mention an economy that will e further twisted out of recognizable shape. We can stand the money, we should not stand the blood.

While President Nixon, to the extent te can, made a heartfelt speech last night; it did not respond to the realities, as we hoped it might. He has given an open invitation to many to try to break him, just as President Johnson was discredited by the war. Not only was the speech over-sold, but it failed to come to grips with a number of honest questions. The first of these is simply: how long will we be in Vietnam? The second of these is how one could logically assume that a nation that stood up to a half a million fighting Americans could not stand up to half that number? Neither the history nor the figures (which went unstated last night) add up.

It is one thing to ask a nation to fight to the finish in support of a great cause The President noted he was not promising a war to end all wars. It is another to ask implacable loyalty to a rather modest cause with so little provable chance of success. This is a great dan-ger the President is running, not that this will become Nbron's war-it is already that-but that for too many Amertoans he will become the enemy when the enemy should be the leaders of North Vietnam.

-Yet at the same time, we reject the idea that people should feel sorry for President Nixon. He ran for the presidency of the United States in the full mowledge of the difficulties and responsibilities. He may well be doing what he thinks is right, but that doesn't make it right nor does it provide any reason for the United States to assent. This war must be ended faster than the President has pledged; he has now dug himself deeper into the quagmire. - MIDDLE-

CAPE KENNEDY, Fis. (AP) - The launch team for man's second moon-landing mission rested today while the astronauts who will fly Apollo 12 practiced in a spaceship trainer The week-long countdown started at noon Friday, aiming for liftoff of the Saturn 5 booster rocket at 11:22 a.m. EST next

Friday. The first 14 hours went without a hitch and a planned 31hour hold began at 2 a.m. today to give launch crews a lengthy rest period and avoid about \$10,000 in weekend overtime

The count is to resume at 9 a.m. Sunday. Three more automatic holds are scheduled for additional launch team rest and n case time is needed to correct problems that might arise. The three astronauts—Navy Cmdrs. Charles Conrad Jr., Richard F. Gordon Jr. and Alan L. 

AIGON (AP) - Gen. Creig ton W. Abrams, commander the 495,000 American troops in Vietnam; said today that South Vietnam's armed forces have "prepared themselves for the rapidly approaching and eventual takeover of the defense o their country." He set no timetable for a U.S.

Pullout, however. "Our Vietnamese counter parts have demonstrated their willingness to endure enormous hardships in order to attain their freedom from Communist oppression," Abrams said in a message released to his com-mand in commemoration of Ve-terans Day next Tuesday.

"Your achievements have made this possible and have demonstrated to the people of the world our nation's determination to defend the institutions

of freedom." He attributed the progress of the South Vietnamese to a pro-gram of "intensive training and nodernisation."

Abram's message was made public as North Vietnamese troops along the Cambodian border attacked four U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division bases north of Salgon, inflicting light casualties.

The enemy pounded the bases, one of them a brigade headquarters, with more than 200 rounds of rockets, mortare and grenades. North Vist-namese troops followed up one of the altacks with an infantry

One American and one fouth Vietnamese civilian irregular were killed, and 24 Americans and seven South Vietnamese irregulars were wounded. Four North Vietnamess soldiers were
