Having Agnew Say It For Us No public in the world is sharper, more ntelligent, and has more good clean fun in criticising its news media than the American public.

Vice President Spiro Agnew, then, continued to speak for a large section of the country, saying things it was delighted to have him say, when he delivered his diatribe against the news personnel and news treatment of the television networks the other night.

He himself was sharp and telling in his criticism. He seemed to have an unerring instinct for the weak and tender spots in the ranks of television punditry. He could cite instances in which a newscaster's or commentator's preconceptions had been caught showing. He could remember the instance when all the normally fluent experts on everything were caught by a surprise development and found speechless stumblebums. For all that has been a bit pompous and presumptuous in the conduct of tele-Agnew had the artistic deflating touch. order.

for every giveaway moment Agnew nentioned, his viewers, on that same medium of television, could provide others of their own notice and memory. In short, the Vice President, during the time the audacity of his text had won for him on all three major networks, was presiding over a nation-wide audience which was delighted with what he said, and delighted, in its own comment on what he said, to offer up samples of what it itself had noticed, sometimes bitterly, sometimes humorously, in its own daily critique of the news performances on television.

It was an audience which was glad somebody had publicly spanked the concelted prima donnas of television, thrown a little honest mud on the bland countenances of the professional experts, and it was an audience which hoped that the result would be a combination of shakeup and improvement in network person-

Another giant national audience, equally delighted to have somebody taking on the media giants, and equally capable of volunteering observations, judgments, and opinions of its own, could certainly be assembled for the day when the Vice President takes on the newspapers of the country.

We can be sure the Vice President will get around to doing that, and after that, perhaps, to the college professors and their classrooms, and after that to the clergy, not all of whom are fit for Sunday mornings at the White House, And there will, again, be a national audience available to chuckle when the propaganda of the professors and the hypocrisy of the clergymen is exposed. and to offer, again, the instances in which the members of the audience themselves have noticed the chinks in such professional armor.

Somewhere along the line, in the course of so much pleasurable association with the one man who dares to say and who knows how to say precisely the kind of thing we have been thinking and hoping somebody would say all alongsomewhere along the development of this pleasant association, we are all going to realize, suddenly, that Vice President Spiro T. Agnew is the man we can trust and believe, and the man who ought to be in charge of deciding which commentators, editors, educators and clergymen

we, the people, ought to howl down, and which we should permit to continue functioning. Eventually, it would prove simpler to have one national network, one national newspaper, one national university, and one national pulpit, all with local outlets, so that it would be possible for Our Leader to decide, personally, what would be all right for us in all

Hawks And Doves Both Confused? The conclusion of many of the commentators, after the President's Nov. 3 speech on Vietnam, was that he had finally taken "Johnson's war" and made it into "Nixon's war."

In so far as that piece of possible punditry was based on the way Mr. Nixon had begun to handle the issue, in his domestic oratory and his domestic tactics, it was valid.

In his Nov. 3 speech, President Nixon finally began using the same arguments President Johnson had used before him. justifying the war itself more than he had previously attempted to do since his election, and asking a patriotic consensus behind a program for peace which sounded tough enough to cover the making of a lot more war.

There was even, in the President's de livery that night, a repeated suggestion of the same faint fatherly smile of patient superior wisdom with which Lyndon Johnson used to address us all.

Since the speech, President Nixon has been acting like President Johnson, too, visibly making himself the manager of a series of meetings and pronouncements designed to gather support for his position on the war.

The latest of these contrivances was the Thursday visit to Congress, where, as might be expected, he found over whelming support for "peace."

But what, one has to ask, does this Johnson-style concern for the amass ing of a "consensus" and all this John son-style activity, have as its actual policy objective? What does President Nixon, working so hard for the consensus which was repeatedly denied President Johnson, plan to do with it if he gets it?

The answer has to be, until concrete action of his shows something different, that President Nixon plans to use this support to take further steps toward ending the war, by unilateral means if that becomes the only means open to him.

And if that has to be the answer, a vision's more prominent personalities, further and very ironic comment is in.

> If that is what President Nixon is going to do under cover of whatever sho of consensus support he can manage to get, then both extremes of our national division on the war in Vietnam are betraying themselves and their own sincere interests by the attitude they are

> If that is what the President intends to do with the public support he wins, if, indeed, it is the only thing he can possibly do having gone as far as he has already gone, then the doves are really cutting their own white throats when they treat the President as if he were their opponent, and somebody they must defeat.

> And the poor hawks, for their part, to be totally mistaken, too, for they are in reality coming to the defense of a President whose actual policy in Vietnam they consider unspeakable.

If anything violent comes out of our current confrontations on the war issue, it will be doubly tragic.

There can hardly be anything worse than a battle fought when both sides are wrong in the reasons why they think they have to fight.

There is, of course, a very subtle explanation of why the President himself should have undertaken to rouse the hawks, whom he is about to disappoint, against the doves, with whom he is afraid his own policies might have to be associated. He is building a protective hard cover for a soft policy.

The number of other societies in our galaxy can be determined by means of a schematic equation. Let's put down a simple equation and explore it: N+RxSxTxUxVxWxY. In this equation we indicate that the number N, which is the number of places where communicative, ntelligent life can exist in our universe, can be determined as product of seven numbers. Let's examine these numbers. R-the rate of star formation in our galaxy. In previous columns I indicated that life can be found around stars. only which have long lifetimes. The average lifetime of a star in the class considered suitable for life is on the order of 10,000 million years. Now there are 100,000 million stars in our Milky Way. If we divide the total number of stars by the average star lifetime, we discover hat roughly 10 stars a year should be born. Not all 10 would be auitable for the formation of life.
