

In their position, we would have felt, we are sure, that the one worst thing that could happen with the Moratorium would be for the demonstration to go berserk and deny and overwhelm all authority and make a shambles of some of our national institutions.

Because we would have considered an outbreak of mob violence that could not be controlled the worst of all the things that could happen, we might have given reluctant approval to the various strategies designed to see to it that the mob never could get out of control. We might have bought the idea of closing the streets near the White House and lining the White House sidewalks with empty buses, bumper to bumper, and importing troops, by night, into government buildings to make sure no mob could take them and burn their papers, not be any lack of armed police force.

should that prove necessary. We think we might have gone along with all these decisions, and we think a good many other people, too, if they should undertake to imagine themselves in those Washington offices we have mentioned, would agree that strong and fearful preparation could be judged necessary in all the uncertainty which irrounded the prospective size, nature, mood, and leadership of the Moratorium

Having said and confessed all this, our next commentary has to be that, although the worst thing that could have appened did not happen, perhaps thanks in some degree to stern and fearful government preparations against it, the second worst thing did happen.

The second worst thing that could happen, and that did happen, was that the government of the United States of America should reveal itself to be afraid of its own people. If this fear was not really necessary
