Saigon Refutes 'Massacre' Tale

could face court martial under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Investigators so far questioned about 75 persons, including Vietnamese who might have first-hand knowledge about the case, Jordan said.

He denied the Army is covering up the case, saying it is not in a legal position to give details or talk about aspects of the case because it could prejudice the rights of the men who may go to

Whether a crime was committed and who did it will be the two big issues if there is a trial," Jordan said. Jordan agreed the Army

might be in a better position from a public relations stand-point if it could come out in the open. The statement Friday came after Sen. Charles E. Goodell,





Full License-Up To The Whip

y itself, Vice President Agnew's latest attack on the "media" is itogether legitimate.

There are not, and should not be, any sacred cows in American journalism. of the voice or that of print.

Criticism of any broadcast ever made any news story ever handled, any editorial opinion ever advanced, is the undying privilege of any individual in a free society, including anybody who happens to be Vice President of the country.

We on this page have frequently, over the years, thought we found an occasional show of pomposity, or of poor logic, or of twisted emphasis, in some of the doings of the New York Times, which is probably the world's greatest newspaper, just as we have, on many occasions, regretted and criticized some of the news handling and opinion-rendering weaknesses of the television networks.

There is absolutely no reason, then, for objecting when the Vice President enters public discussion of the way great proadgasting networks or the world's greatest newspaper conduct themselves in relation to the tremendous public re- It would be especially fortunate and sponsibility they themselves seek and

And in case the Vice President is looking for the latest and most immediate sample of the kind of unworthy failing of which even the world's greatest newspaper can be guilty, he has only to look at one entirely superfluous, tell - tale paragraph-sentence which appeared in the New York Times Page 1 story of the Alabama speech.

"The Vice President," said the Times news story, "delivered his address before the Alabama Chamber of Commerce in the State Capitol where former Gov. George C. Wallace often attacked The Times and The Post as symbols of 'Eastern establishment' thinking."

There, in that paragraph, is one of the greatest of all public sins-one which the Times has courageously fought over and over, but nevertheless now committed itself in its handling of Mr. Agnewthe crime of "guilt by association."

Is every speaker who ever appears on a platform once occupied by George Wallace condemned to be guilty? Or every speaker who happens to criticize something Wallace once criticized to be classified as a bigoted racist?

As for what the Vice President himself said, on that platform once occupied by Agnew, it presented less of a case against the media than did this single sentence we have excerpted from the Times story the next morning. The Vice President wasn't hitting very hard, and he wasn't even hitting very accurately. and his speechwriters obviously hadn't even read the newspaper with which they were trying to find fault.

Nonetheless, even a half-baked and inaccurate attack was within his rights, if he wished to risk it. One of the freedoms this is all about is the freedom to be mistaken, too, even if you are an editor, even if you are a Vice President. So far as we are concerned, Vice President Agnew can continue his crusade as long as he pleases, and the sharper and more accurate his attacks may be, the more they will be enjoyed, and the healthier it will be to have them made, evaluated, and answered. If he is sharp and right, it will be a welcome goad, for the media to keep a closer and more self-analytical watch on themselves. If he is dull and repetitious and inaccurate, that will be his own poor fortune. Do the media, then, have legitimate

quarrel with Vice President Agnew, and if so, where does it lie?

The guarrel is not with verbal attacks,

and it is not even with Mr. Agnew in

The quarrel is with the proposition that a whole administration is beginning to play a dirty brand of pool in the effort to guarantee a more favorable public reception for its own deeds and policies. What was wrong with the Agnew speech against the networks was that it was preceded by those telephone calls from the highest government official in the regulatory field to the heads of the three networks asking for the transcripts of the network commentaries. This was already intimidation.

What has since been wrong with the broadening attack from administration figures has been the warning from the President's top assistant in matters of the press that the newspapers of the country had better watch themselves if they don't want to invite government into their' affairs.

The media, and the public, have to have unending quarrel with any administration which gets itself into such a state of mind and attitude as to seem to consider itself possessed of some divine rightness, or even of any specially privileged exemption from careless and unworthy criticism. If such criticism is careless and unworthy, it will fall and fail of itself, as any administration really sure of its own ground would instinctively know and believe. When the present administration seems to be looking for a whip as well as retort, selfdefense, and justified analytical offense, then, and then only, does the game get regrettably serious.

The \$10,000 Minimum

Any day any Ansonia citizen who wants to can go into court to test the validity of aldermanic representat based on ward lines drawn in 1889. And if the one-man, one-vote yardstick is applied, the City will be ordered to rem-

The citizen voting in the numerically tiniest ward in the city is represented by three alder-. Obviously, whether he knows it or not, the citizen living in the largest ward is shortchanged. He gets less individual political clout in the voting booth than fellow living in the smallest ward courts would undoubtedly order the City of Ansonia, as they ordered the City of New Haven in a similar case, either to redistrict or to elect alderment-large

Since this could come up at any time, at the caprice of any citizen, and since the voting districts are fixed by Charter, t would be well for the municipality f begin soon to decide how it will handle problem. With a mayor and alderman board of one party, it should be fairly simple, for in its beginnings, a there could be little bipartisan bickering about redistricting to make each ward nearly equal to every other. There is a great deal to be said for aldermanic representation listricts. If a citizen wants legitimate uction, he is more likely to get it by going to an alderman who has to get from his own ward, than from an at-large fellow whose constituency i citywide. As practical politics, that's not a bad thing.

If we want to keep district representa ion, we can't wait until the next election is in the offing and some citiser lecides to seek a court order. It would e much better to take the matter up calmly now, than to get caught befor a court with unbalanced districts and have district representation thrown out by a court ordering elections at large .-

Equipment Becomes In the late 1980s several scientists concluded that because of the large number of potential habitats, some extraterrestrial life might have advanced to the stage where they might be beaming signals it the earth. However, until a few years ago, the highly sensitive equipment necessary scout for such signals was unavailable. Then suddenly there came the Maser, the parametric amplifier, and the construction of large radio telescopes The marriage of these new de relopments meant that the scientist could now begin to listen for signals from other advanced societies in space they exist.

In April, 1959, Dr. Frank D. Drake undertook Project Ozma, turning this 85-foot radio telescope at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory to two atars which seemed to fit the criteria for supporting life. These two, Tau Ceti and Epsilon Eirdani, are only 11 light years from the earth, and alhough invisible to the naked eye and a little fainter than the sun, appeared to be the most likely candidates. For 150 hours he fecorded signals from these two stars but recorded nothing indicating the presence of intelligent life.



Calley Jr., accusing him of the premeditated murder of at loast 109 men, women, and chil-dren in Vietnam in March 1968. Calley, first American soldier charged in the controversial, al-leged massacre of Vietnamese rillagers, will face a possible penalty of death or life imprisanment if convicted, the Army

Decision to proceed with the trial was made by the command at Fort Benning, Ga., where Calley is now stationed, and an-nounced jointly in Washington

and Georgia. Only a short time earlier the Army had announced the as-signment of Lt. Gen. William R. Peers to find out whether the brigade involved in the alleged mase killings had tried to cover up the incident in its original low level investigation of the op-

The Army charged Calley with 6 specifications of premedi-tated murder of "Oriental human beings" during a U.S. military operation at the village of My Lai in Quang Ngai Province about March 16, 1968







Earth Eclipse of Sun **Awes Returning Crew**

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Racing through the fi-nal hours of their voyage of discovery, Apollo 12's moon men marveled at a spectacular earthly eclipse of the sun today, and fired their jet thrusters a brief burst to zero in on their splashdown target in the South Pacific.

Charles "Pete" Conrad Jr., Richard F. Gordon Jr. and Alan L. Bean were in good spirits as their Yankee Clipper streaked faster and faster toward their home planet on a course that would slam them into the atmosphere 76' miles high at a speed of 24,600 miles per hour. Atmospheric friction and par-

chutes were to slow them to 22 m.p.h. in the final minutes before splashdown, set for 3:58 p.m. EST about 400 miles southsast of American Samoa.

As Yankee Clipper ap proached the earth it was on a slightly shallow path that would cause it to land long. A five-second firing of the jets at 19:44 p.m. steepened the angle to aim the spaceship at a point close to the aircraft carrier Hornet. "Looks like a good burn," Mission Control told Yankee

The astronauts were awed by a sight that can be seen only by men flying far from their home planet-an eclipse of the sun by he earth. "What a spectacular view,

Gordon commented from an alitude of 29,000 miles. "It's unslievable."

"Fantastic sight," Bean said. "The sun is illuminating the whole atmosphere all the way

The discovery was announced

to newsmen Wednesday but publication of the story was delayed until Saturday to coincide with publication in the British magazine "Nature," of a paper outlining the technique.

The gene was separated from a bacteria called Escherichia coll, widely found in the intestine of man and other animals. The researchers used an en syme to dissolve away material they did not want.

The scientists told newsmen that a bacteria may contain as many as 1,000 genes, which have specific individual fune-tions, while a human body may

contain a million genes. Genes are gathered into groups called chromosomes which carry the entire code of heredity. Beckwith, a molecular geneti-

cist, said the means for manipu-lating genes in humans do not exist at present, but that it was conceivable such techniques

Army Files Murder Charge Against Officer in Viet Deaths

The decision on the court martial was made by Maj. Gen. Orwin C. Talbott, who as commanding general at Fort Benning was the convening authori-ty in the case.
