the fact that it was one isolated piece of handwriting, what happened on the battlefield of Vietnam that weekend. There was no jumpy surge, there was no coordination of North Vietnamese attack with events in Washington.

But there were the specialists of the American media providing anti-communism orators with powerful ammunition in support of their point of view. And even now, as the press itself begins to realize how it hoaxed even itself, it needs no fear of such as Agnew, Burch, Klein, or Mitchell. This particular perfection on the part of the media was on their side of the argument.

A Lament For The Trolley

Not right out of the blue — our Eastern skies are really blue only on days when a cold from wind scrubs them clean — but out of the usual mark of our exhausted-it atmosphere the chairman of New York's Metropolitan Transportation Authority launched himself in a sudden regret for the passing of the trolley the other day.

Why did Dr. William J. Roman mourn the passing of the trolley? His remark is not only for itself, but for the research it continued use might be encouraged.

Had the trolleys themselves remained in service, they might not only have operated with an economy greater than that of the motor bus or the private car. They would also have operated entirely without pollution of the air. Conceivably, too, if they had been maintained, they would have increased in popularity, as a safe, dependable, pleasant, relaxed means of short distance traveling.

Interested as Dr. Roman put it, "the nation bashed in automobile suburbia during the post World War II period" and abandoned just about everything else on the assumption that nobody would ever want anything more convenient than his own car.

One Flaw Saw From Agnew

One of the worst stunts of which the "media" has been guilty recently will not be attacked by Vice President Agnew, or Federal Communications Commissioner Burch, or by Attorney General Mitchell or his wife, or by the President's press representatives.

Yet it presented to the American people, one of the worst distortions of fact, and one of the most glaring instances of propaganda, that could be imagined.

These were, as we have since learned, news items that, in fact, we didn't know, when we were getting on the automobile, that we were heading into a giant traffic jam which would always grow faster than we could solve it. We didn't know, when we went for the automobile as the answer to everything, that we were stepping into a life and death problem with air pollution and that the automobile would become the largest single factor contributing to it.

Now we are frantically busy with research into possibilities by which we may go back to some electrically powered vehicle, without polluting the atmosphere through the use of internal combustion engines.

TRICIA NIXON had no sooner placed one petite foot on British soil than British newspapers proclaimed her "America's little princess." Her mother boasts proudly of Tricia's volunteer work. And her father once said of Tricia: "I remember the day Patricia was born. I was not there. That's the story of her life. It seemed I was always saying goodbye..."

But if Tricia has any clues about her personality, she's not giving them away.

"If you haven't seen my name in the newspapers, you know I'm having a good time," she says.

Editors and writers, nevertheless, have through Tricia's politeness and their own perseverance—extracted a host of tiny details about the 23-year-old blonde.

She wears size four dresses. Her favorite color is pink and her best beau is Edward Cox, a law student, whose White House visits have been one of the best kept secrets so far during the Nixon administration.

Since her father's inauguration Tricia has been reluctant to give news interviews. She has held only one news conference and that was in England.

A White House biographical sketch states that Tricia was born in Whittier, Calif., February 21, 1946. She attended public and private schools, including Sidwell Friends School in Washington, Marlboro School for Girls in Los Angeles and Miss Chapin School in New York City, where she graduated.

Unlike her sister Julie, who went off to Northampton, Mass., to Smith College, Tricia chose to attend Finch College in New York City so that

she could live at home and walk the 18 blocks from the Nixon's Fifth Avenue apartment.

At Finch, classmates regarded Tricia as a sweet, unassuming girl, who did not wish to receive special treatment because of her father's position. She was elected class president in her junior year and was tapped for the school's highest honorary, Innomus Meliora.

Every Christmas she invited her class home for a party.

One teacher recalled that after a heated discussion on Vietnam, Tricia quietly went to her after class and asked, "If I bring you some of my father's speeches, will you read them?"

She considered going to law school but decided "I've been in school for so long, I'd like to get out and have a different kind of life, a non-student life."

What she got was more of the same kind of life she'd had all along—campaigning, traveling, meeting famous people and moving in the limelight.

She thought about taking a job on Capitol Hill, where she once worked for Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., but decided to do volunteer work and travel instead.

"It's only 4 or 5 years," she said. "And you ought to take advantage of it."

Old Favorites Alive and Well on Local Stations

NEW YORK (AP) — They have disappeared from the networks but many of the dear departed are living on local television stations.

The fate of series discarded by the networks is syndication and old favorites pop up in reruns all over the nation at all sorts of times—"Ben Casey" and "Batman" of recent memory as well as some that go back to TV's salad days, like "My Little Margie."

Some shows bounced by the networks continue making new

programs. One is "Truth or Consequences," with host Bob Barker still persuading contestants to do all sorts of silly things for prizes.

Some old programs have been revived for syndication. This started with "What's My Line?" a couple of seasons back and it sold so well to independent stations that its producers gave some others a new life.

Now there is "Beat the Clock," another of those stunt shows that went on for years with the late Bud Collyer as host, and "To Tell the Truth," another of Collyer's shows.

Jack Narz is now the "Beat the Clock" host. A celebrity has

been added, but the basic show is still there. Seen Thursday night on a local station, the studio contestants were still winning washers and dryers for trapping balloons in a box or toasting china cups through a hole in a wall.

Host Garry Moore and some veteran panelists including Peggy Cass and Bill Cullen give "To Tell the Truth" a quality of gaiety. If you liked the old game, you will probably find the new one amusing. A program Thursday had as contestants a lady private eye and a man who has spent five years studying big toes.

Neither panel show seemed

substantial enough to hold an evening audience, but were perhaps a bit brighter than many of the daytime shows currently filling network hours.

ABC has confirmed rumors that it will completely revamp "The Survivors" when the ser-

ies move to a new time period in January. George Hamilton will be the only star to remain with the series. Lana Turner and Kevin McCarthy will depart—how they are removed from the story has not yet been determined. For Ralph Bellamy's departure, it already has been suggested in the show that the character he plays does not have long to live.

How To Pay the Rent

HOLLYWOOD — Patrick McGoohan, a blue-eyed man with a dark presence in TV's "Secret Agent" as well as the star, frequent director and producer of the late, much-lamented "The Prisoner" series, is making a movie. It's called "The Moonshine War," and he's doing it for money.

"From now on," McGoohan said, "I'm going to do things of my own as much as I can. I want to be associated in films in ways other than just acting but you have to do something from time to time to pay the rent. One has to make a living in order to do the things one wants to do."

McGoohan, a man of apparently boundless enthusiasm and energy, has that disarming British straightforwardness. He was talking in his trailer on a sound stage where he would later be playing a crooked revenue officer in this Filmways-MGM Production. His costars are Richard Widmark and Alan Alda, with Richard Quine directing.

Like Albert Finney, McGoohan has been a curious kind of nasty hero, handsome but not idol-like, waspish but not effeminate, cool but oddly engaging. He shone in "Ice Station Zebra" and may well have saved it from commercial disaster. He became a TV star with a minimum of push. Without any hyping, audiences discovered him themselves.

He's a man of many projects. Already under way is a 26-segment TV history of the British empire, produced by his own company. Upcoming is a film of them's "Brand" and two

musicals, one with a Virginia City setting and another about a small circus in Victoria's England.

"I can only work in two gears: Stop and go," he said. "Every second I must be totally occupied and it probably helps what's left of this performance. That's why repertory theater is so great: Coward one night, Shakespeare the next."

"The filming of 'Brand' is a long-cherished project. 'Isen wrote it in Italy when he was totally disillusioned with the Norwegian theater. He searched into his soul to find a new way of expression for himself."

"It's really his autobiography. The form is so visual that he had had a camera that how he would have expressed himself."

"The theme is a question of all or nothing and was never more applicable than now. Millions of people do not know in what direction they're going. Not so Patrick McGookhan, who was born in Astoria, Long Island, in 1928 but was promptly taken home to Ireland by his parents, who had made enough money in America to go back and improve the country."

"It's a good time to do all such things," reasons McGookhan, who was set to star in the now-cancelled "Tal-Fan" for Filmways. "The business doesn't know where it's going. Does it?"

"This pornography stuff is for the birds. There'll be a return to stories that have real adventure or we're all finished. 'The Prisoner' Well, that was an experimental kind of thing for television. Originally, I wanted to do only seven episodes but CBS wouldn't buy it. I stopped at 17. I had had enough."

"I was astonished that it got a sort of faithful audience—better than I had expected. We never thought of it in terms of an audience of 25 or 30 million."

As a TV Showman, Sullivan Is Alone

By BOB THOMAS

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The Rolling Stones couldn't come to him, so Ed Sullivan came across the continent to tape a sequence with the British rock group for his Sunday night variety show.

This may give testimony on why Sullivan remains the redoubtable, unquestioned daddy of them all in the television variety field.

After 21 years, he is still going after the top acts—and getting them.

Sullivan's imperfections as an emcee have long been decried, and he has flourished while his detractors faded. None could deny his powers as a showman, as he demonstrated with his Rolling Stones coup.

At a rehearsal in CBS's Tele-

vision City, Sullivan gave no indication that he admired or understood the Stones' thing. But in his dressing room afterward he demonstrated his knowledge of the Britishers' draw.

"These boys are hot, especially with the younger crowd," he explained. "They're on a concert tour, so I decided to come here and tape them. They cost a lot of money, but they're worth it."

"An attraction like the Rolling Stones will bring us viewers that don't ordinarily tune the show in. The repercussions drift over the next few weeks; those who tuned in may decide that the show is pretty good, and they'll come back. Another act who gave us the same kind of reaction was Elvis Presley, back in the days when he was first starting out."

Television historians will recall that Presley was a cause celebre on the Sullivan show. In those days he was undulating his body in a manner not considered polite, and Sullivan ordered the cameras focused on the upper Presley only.

Likewise he carefully viewed the movements of the Rolling Stones, advised them to avoid any suggestiveness, and even censored a couple of words in the lyrics.

"I think that's one of the reasons that the show has been accepted: Parents know they can watch it with their children and not be embarrassed," Sullivan reasoned. "I won't allow anything that is suggestive, and I'll cut an act rather than run the risk."

The Ed Sullivan Show has been getting some tough competition this season from Bill Cosby on NBC—"I wish we could get him on our show," said Sul-
