

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Resolutionitis

The resolution on Vietnam policy just indorsed by the House at Washington by a lop-sided vote of 335 to 55 is a new ample of the kind of legislative idiocy people thought Congress might avoid, during its season of penance for the Tonkin Gulf Resolution.

But it is not likely to do as much amage.

There was, before its adoption, enough lebate to show that not even those voting for it were agreed on what they were voting for

And, although President Nixon himself welcomed the prospect that the esolution would be passed, saying that it was a resolution "along the lines of the proposal I made in a speech on lov. 3," he himself would have to detide, before he tried to make any specific use of this action of Congress, just what it was which was a "proposal" from him in that Nov. 3 performance

In actuality, and even by analysis which took a long time studying the text, the Nov. 3 speech was a blanket sort of affair, which had something of . almost everything in it, even a threat ting the war. Beyond one byious intent, that of buying time for whatever the President was intending , and trying to curb public impaor immediate results, it was difficult to tell anything the speech did really mean, or any direction in which it really did point.

When the President's supporters in Congress quickly drafted a resolution designed to support the President's efforts for a "just peace" in Vietnam they themselves did not have to specify what a just peace might be, or just how it was to be obtained.

All they had to do was ask whether anybody was against a "just peace."

miracle was that 55 members t the House chose to run the risk of being accused of being against a "just They chose to run that risk ther than run the other risk, of giving their personal approval to a seemingly harmless blanket resolution which might be used, later on, for some purpose far beyond any present understand-

Of course, everybody is for "peace." And we believe that a majority of the American people believe that President Nixon, in what he is actually doing in lietnam, which doesn't necessarily always echo exactly what he is saying, is following a policy of actual deescalation which has a chance of shaping the situation toward at least a de facto peace, if not a negotiated one.

It would be our recommendation to the peace crusaders, then, that they give some attention to the fact that President Nixon is de-escalating, not escalating, the war in Vietnam.

And we think that the President and his political supporters would do just as well to let the facts speak for themelves, and not to spend very much time or energy trying to achieve, either in Congress or in the country, any rigid msensus in support of vague onnibus peeches or resolutions

The news story quotes Mrs. William Kay, president of the Scarsdale Council of Parent-Teacher Associations, which is supporting the proposal, as follows:

"You'd think the plan called for busing in 4,000 Negro children instead of 50. This has become a very emotional

The Scarsdale Board of Education has argued that the plan "will add an invaluable human dimension to our youngsters' schooling that no amount of black culture story-telling can supply."

Nevertheless, at six public hearings on the issue, those opposed have always outnumbered those in favor. And, although the school board has refused to hold a referendum on the issue, pointing out that the law makes no provision for making any referendum binding on a school board, the residents of one section of the town held a referendum of their own, with the result 284 to 41 against the plan

The Scaradale school board votes on the matter next Monday night.

He noted that Army official told his subcommittee, just 10 days before the alleged massacre, that arrest figures for marijuana had increased 2,553 per cent in Vietnam between 1965 and 1967. .


Harriman Says **Nixon's Speech Re-Ignited War** NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)-Former diplomat W. Avereli Harriman Tuesday night blamed President Nixon's Nov. 3 speech on Vietnam for the new offen-

sive reportedly being planned by North Vietnam. North Vietnam viewed President's address as a threat, Harriman told an audience at Yale, and, he added, "it's always unwise to threaten the eneny-especially a small people." Harriman, who headed the U.S negotiating team in Paris last year, said it was "untrue" that the late North Vietnamese leader Ho Chi Minh had rejected a eace overture from the Nixon dministration, as Nixon had charged in his Nov. 3 address. He read from Ho's letter excerpts saying that North Vietnam was seeking a "reasonable basis of settlement." Ho also called for "good will on both sides," according to Harriman. Although sharply critical of Nixon's Vietnam policy, Harriman said he was optimistic-because he assumed that the

President "will realize he's on a disastrous course before it's too late." He said Nixon's Nov. 3 adiress to the people of the Uni-States was motivated by "what is good for the political position of the President" rather than "how we can arrive at a settlement in Vietnam." Harriman, a former governor of New York, is visiting Yale

on a fellowship.

'Panther' Jailed In Public Threat **On Nixon's Life**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) David Hilliard, Black Panther party chief of staff accused in a federal indictment of telling an antiwar rully: "We will kill Richard Nixon," has been arrested.

Hilliard, 27, was unable to \$30,000 bond set post the Wednesday by U.S. Dist. Court Judge Stanley Weigle and was taken to the Alameda County

Secret Service agents arrest ed Hilliard as he was driving in downtown San Francisco about an hour after the federal grand jury returned the indictment. It charged Hilliard with willfully and knowingly making threats in public to take the life of or harm the President of the United States. Conviction carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a fine of \$1,000.

The charge grew out of a rally at Golden Gate Park on Nov. 1 attended by a crowd estimated by police at 85,000. It was televised live locally.

The indictment said Hilliard "referred to President Richard Nixon as 'the man that's responsible for all the attacks on the Black Panther party nationally and stated, 'We will kill Richard Nixon.'
