On Disobedience, No Agreement We think we would have lost all faith in the stability of the universe and its society if the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence had proved able to handle the issue of civil disobedience in harmonious, unanimous agreement.

But our sense of normalcy has been preserved. We have the reassurance. that there do remain some issues which are structurally and inevitably contro-

Dr. Eisenhower's Commission could not agree on whether to give official smile or frown to the actual practice of civil disobedience. All 13 members agreed, easily enough, in their sympathetic analysis of social conditions which could lead individuals to a desire to act to get laws changed. But they split, 7 to 6, when it came to what tactics they would approve for such campaigning against enacted law.

And the majority of seven, for all its inderstanding and sympathy with underdog causes, wound up frowning on ate disobeying of unpopular or unreasonable or even illegal laws as a tactic for making war against them.

The logic and feeling of the majority went toward the conclusion that, if such rivilege were to be approved for some cople against some laws, it could not e denied to others against other laws, and toward the further conclusion that, in such a society, there would soon be no law for anybody. Better, the majority felt, to walt longer for change, and at less total risk and cost.

rument of the minority was owerfully, ruthlessly simple. If it were ot for civil disobedience jumping over he traces and defying the existing order and fighting for justice, said the minority, there would be no guarantee that hange and progress would ever come.

believe that, when it comes to seting a formal position on civil disobedience down on paper, this same division s unavoidable and inevitable.

We point out, however, that we believe ociety itself has a way of resolving this conflict, in its own feelings, and in the actions it tolerates within itself, which doesn't follow rigidly either the majority or the minority views.

e believe the majority which frowns a civil disobedience action is a perment majority. But we believe it does, evertheless, react to the justice quoient in each and every civil disobedirement or action, and we beleve that there are recurrent moments democratic society when, withadmitted surrender of our , the defensive majority and the ninority meet in a tacit muderstanding that the time has come for something to begin to en. But that is what can and does happen, when the cause is right.

When the cause doesn't really have omething, it doesn't make it, and the majority sense of law and order has the easy victory.



Much of the Re publican big business establish-ment of the state had accepted inevitability of the incom the inevitability of the income tax. But a maverick movement of unreconstructed conserva-tives launched a campaign against it, and directed its ap-peal to the pochetbooks of Democratic workingmen, and Rhode Island, normally a Democratic state anyway, turned out the fine Republican Gover-nor Chafee just in time for him to become President Nixon's Secretary of the Navy.

The point was, here in Con-necticut, that the example of what had happened to an advo-cate of the income tax at the polis in Rhode Island was not lost on a Democratic party leadership which found itself bound, in any case, by the successive pledges of two Gover-nors, Ribicoff and Dempsey, not to enact an income tax here.

What has happened in New Jersey is that a Republican candidate for Governor who seemed to oppose an income tax --- the Democratic incum-bent had tried, unsuccessfully to get one enacted-and who won a handsome victory Nov. 4 has now begun to shift into a reluc ant admission that there may have to be an income tax in New Jarsey's future after all.

A good many of the successful Republican candidates who now control the New Jersey legislature made opposition to an income tax part of their campaigns. But some of these are now merely expressing the hope that the new Republican regime can escape the income tax in its first term.

First, like Connecticut, New Jersey is going to raise its sales tax up to a 5 per cent figure. But that, as in Connecticut, will provide merely a temporary bridge between state income and expanding state needs.

Black Panthers:

Rebels on the Ropes?

sociated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Selfxiled Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver is seeking to arrange his return to the United States where his armed revolutionary

party-reeling under police pressure-is hurting for leader-Twenty-four hours after two Panthers were slain in a shootout with Chicago police, sources said Cleaver contacted U.S. dip-lomatic officials in Algiers and

asked for a passport to return to America where he is wanted on a fugitive warrant. Cleaver didn't get the passport, the sources added, but in

inquiries in Algiers, signs were nounting in America that the Panthers are revolutionaries on he ropes. On Monday, a police raid on

Panther headquarters in Los Angeles resulted in a four-hour gun battle that left three policemen and three Panthers wounded. Nineteen Panthers were ar-

Two well known Panther leadrs-Huey P. Newton and Bobby Seale-already were in jail. Stokeley Carmichael quit the party last summer. Other party leaders are dead. Dave Hilliard, anther chief of staff, faces

trial on a charge of threatening the life of President Nixon. If Cleaver returns to California, he faces imprisonment as a parole violator and for jumping bail on charges of assault with intent to kill and assault with a deadly weapon. But the deepening Panther-police crisis pre-sumably has increased pressure

on him to give up his self-proclaimed exile. Black leaders say the police raids have brought an upsurge in pro-Panther sympathy, yet the Panthers are without the widely known leaders needed to take full advantage of the situa-

tion. "No matter what kind of following you've got, if you can't keep a leadership, you can't keep an organization together," said radical lawyer Terence "Kayo" Hallinan of San Francisco. "It just keeps flying

The Chicago and Los Angeles raids were the latest in a series of police actions that the Panthers say have resulted in 28 Paniher deaths a figure the Panthers failed to document and which Justice Department officials say is exaggerated. But the frequency and intensi-ty of the clashes are seen by some as having an impact on America's ghettos more pro-found than anything Panthers

could muster with their Marxist ideology and weapon-wielding "The effect is very telling or groups that don't agree with the Panthers ideologically,"

Lucius Walker, executive director of the Interreligious Founda-tion for Community Organization-IFCO "It's not an ideological quer

tion. It's a question of black survival," Walker said. "Black people of all ideological persua-sions have been made to realize that all blacks are vulnerable." Panther lawyer Charles Garry of San Francisco says the incidents add up to a campaign of "genocide on the Black Panther party."

"Poppycock," replied a Jus-tice Department spokesman to charges made by Garry and others that the Nixon administration is the concert master for an elaborate and planned police crackdown on the Panthera. But there is little question that an intense hostility exist between police and Panthers. One high federal official put it this way:

"It seems every time cops and Panthers mset they shoo each other. Fear plays a part It's been some years since considered myself a cop, but know if I were back on the street, I wouldn't want to have to stop a black man, or especially two of them. The friction is so intense, with Panthers you keep
