Spiro And Higher Education

That man Agnew has hit the nail on the head again, this time on the subject of higher education.

What we so innocently think of as good for our children, said the Vice President, is not necessarily so.

Instead, we cause our youth frustration by putting them into a prolonged system of higher education which holds them away from the real responsibility other Americans were assuming at their

Our over-emphasis on education, said Spiro, is "consigning a huge group of our young citizens to an academic limbo totally allen to their human instincts." "We have," he said, "stretched postadolescent dependency a full 10 years."

Much of the youth which spends so much time in college learning the liberal arts would be better off, the Vice President thought, out working its own way in the world.

Even while the Vice President was speaking, a report on current enrollment in American colleges and universities was backing up what he said.

By this latest report, there are now no less than 4,156,268 full-time students enrolled in high education, with part-

time students adding another 1,600,000. But it takes no statistics to prove the point to anybody. Everybody knows that everybody goes to college now, and that just as many as used to go to college 20 years ago now go on for one or two

or three extra years of some kind of graduate work The Vice President's point about this is simple enough. Keeping so many young people in college so long without

naking them work for a living bores them so much that they start making trouble of one kind or another And of what they sometimes do with all this surplus time of theirs, the Vice

President asked this: "Is 'doing one's own thing' ennobling,

or selfish; profound or simply vacant?" Like everything else the Vice President says, this has in it enough of what all rest of us have sometimes been thinking to draw our attention and our momentary agreement, up to the point, of course, where we begin to tell our own kids they really don't want to go to college, or indulge in any of that sizey stuff of getting a degree.



Christmas Coffees with Latin American touches express warm hospitality during the holiday season. The tiny cafezinho serving of Pot de Creme Brazil is a rich confection. The large stemmed glass is a warming Coffee Curacao and the Guatemala Nog an unusual coffee nog which has special appeal for those with preferences for a leaner beverage.

Pot de Creme Brazil

2 egg yolks package (3 1/4 oz. size) vanilla pudding and pie filling mix
 cup double strength coffee

'AGE EIGHT

1 cup heavy cream 2 or 3 tablespoons finely chopped Brazil nuts

Combine egg yolks and pudding mix in a saucepan. Stir until smooth. Add coffee and cream and cook, stirring constantly until mixture boils and begins to thicken. Cool twenty to thirty minutes. Beat the slightly cooled pot de creme with a rotary beater one or two minutes. and spoon into demi-tasse or pot de creme with a rotary beater one or two minutes, Brazil nuts. Makes 6 servings of 1/3 cup each.

1 ounce Curacao or other orange flavored liquer 1 ounce bourbon Pour the Curacao then the bourbon into a stemmed wine or Irish Coffee glass.

6 measuring cups coffee

8 eggs

11/2 cups sugar

4 ounces, about, hot coffee 2 tablespoons whipped cream Dash cinnamon, optional

Fill to about 1/2 inch from the top with hot coffee. Top with whipped cream and a dusting of ground cinnamon. One serving. Guatemala Nog

> 2 cups heavy cream 1 pint Kalua, optional

Beat the eggs with the sugar until thick and foamy, and sugar is dissolved, about five minutes. Continue beating while adding the hot coffee. Add cream and stir to blend, or continue to beat if using an electric mixer. Stir in Kalua if desired." Makes about three quarts of punch (if liquor is omitted), 24 four ounce servings. To serve COFFEE NOG, pour chilled punch into a large serving bowl and keep it chilled with a coffee ice ring. To make the ice ring, use a three or four cup ring mold. Pour about 1/4 inch of clear water into mold and place in freezer until firm. Arrange pieces of fruits, or leaves, pine bows and maraschino cherries in a decorative arrangement over the ice. Carefully add enough additional water to half cover the decorative arrangement and freeze this combination to anchor the decoration. Fill the ring mold with thoroughly cooled coffee and freeze until ready to serve COFFEE NOC.

To brew the perfect cup of coffee, use one Approved Coffee Measure of ground coffee to each 6-oz. of water. For extra strength coffee use 4-oz. of water to each approved coffee measure. Serve coffee when it is at the peak of flavor, immedi-ately after brewing. Ensalada De Noche Buena 3 pineapple slices, cut in thirds 1 head western iceberg lettuce. shredded 2 - 3 cooked beets, sliced 2 oranges, peeled and sliced 2 bananas, sliced 2 red skinned apples, cored and sliced **Roasted** peanuts

Pomegranate seeds Spread the shredded lettuce on a large serving plate or platter. Arrange the fruits and beets in symmetrical rows, with colors contrasting. Sprinkle with roasted

peanuts and pomegranate seeds. Offer French dressing or mayonnaise as dressing. Serves 6 to 8. Spanish Ouelets

For each basic omelet: 3 eggs 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon cold water 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Beat eggs with salt and water until well mixed. Meanwhile, heat a 9 inch heavy skillet, or omelet pan, until a small amount of cold water sizzles and rolls off in drops when sprinkled over pan. Add the butter and heat until it sizzles, but do not allow to brown. Pour egg mixture in all at once and allow to cook over mehot allow to brown. Pour egg mixture in all at once and allow to cook over me-dium heat. As omelet sets, run spatula around edge to loosen. Tilt pan to let uncooked portion run underneath. Continue this until omelet is almost dry on top and golden brown underneath. Fold in thirds to edge of pan and tilt out onto plate. Top with two or three spoonfuls of Spanish topping. Spanish Topping: In two tablespoons of butter, sauté a medium size onion, chopped and a chopped green pepper. Add a can of stewed tomatoes and simmer mixture about five minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. Makes enough for 6 to 8 omelets.

Brewed fresh and served steaming hot from cups or mugs, coffee creates a friendly feeling for a visit, meeting, or a lingering goodbye when guests leave. It seems natural then for this flavorful beverage to be a part of holiday entertaining.

Some of the finest coffee in the world is grown in Guatemala, so it comes as no surprise that a coffee nog be inspired by this vibrant country of Central America. GUATEMALA NOG is lighter, leaner and a welcome change from the rich traditional egg nog. It is especially good if the party is an evening one rather than a later afternoon or pre-dinner reception. Sweetmeats of Christmas; thin sliced fruit cakes, holiday cookies, mixed nuts and some of the traditional candies will go well with this lighter punch. It is a good way to make yours the *different* party this year.

COFFEE CURACO is a warming, welcoming beverage that can be prepared in a matter of minutes if you have the makings on hand. The recipe calls for bourbon with the orange flavor liquer, but you can use the same measure of rum or Scotch if you or your guests prefer. This is a great treat for friends who drop by casually for it seems special and planned, but is really done quickly and with very little fuss ... a grand and quick way to show holiday hospitality.

A delicious dessert that has a festive air and is surprisingly easy to prepare is POT DE CREME BRAZIL. Rich in flavor and texture, a small serving in a pot de creme or an attractive demitasse cup is sufficient. It is really good anytime of the year and should have a place in your "fancy desserts" file.

Latin American themes should also include one from our nearby neighbor, Mexico. In that country the days of Christmas are called Las Posadas and the central theme is the Nativity Scene. Gifts are brought daily until the manger is surrounded by animals, shepherds and the three kings of the Orient. On Christmas Eve you might celebrate with a modified version of la posada after the family attends midnight services. Serve freshly brewed coffee as the family returns home. And have a light supper that includes ENSALADA DE NOCHE BUENA, (salad of the good night) a tradition on Christmas Eve in Mexico. Accompany it with Spanish omelet and corn bread or soft tortillas with butter rather than the more highly spiced foods that are typical of Mexico. Re-plenish the coffee while each member presents a "gift" to the nativity scene and Christmas remembrances are exchanged within the family.
