is not reached. The HFT executive secretary, Arthur Brouillet, said the teachers will vote Thursday on whether to accept the latest board offer. Teachers had previously voted to strike that day if no agreement is reached on a new contract by then. Brouillet said a strike headquarters has al-

The contract on which they will vote contains a 5 per cent board, Neil Macy, said the teachers' negotiators turned down an offer that would have given teachers a 6 to 61/2 per cent raise. The offer, he said, therefore reverted to the 5 per cent raise that the board proposed




