





By JUNE B. TOMPKINS As truly as a student is ready for advanced education after elementary preparation, so the Manchester Civic Orchestra was ready for the lessons of musical refinement from its new director, Prof. Vytautas Marijosius of Hartt College of Music, University of Hartford.

Marijosius, a native of Lithuania, was, at the time, an associate professor of conducting and theory, at the University of Hartford, and conductor and nusical director of the Hartford String Orchestra. (He is presently professor of conductng and theory and chairman of he applied music department

An impressive man with his leonine head of wavy white hair and a camel's hair sweater, he would woo the orchestra into creating whatever musical nuance he desired in his inimitable Lithuanian-English, Members of the orchestra have described him best in their own vords: "A natural teacher," "every rehearsal was a lesson," "he refined us."

With a repertoire of classical and modern composers acquired in three years' time, the orchestra now began to learn style, musical discipline, and perfection. Students were encouraged to join. Prof. Marijosius' idea to form

What all this illustrates is a process in which the forbidden and the illegalwhich is the unauthorized invasion of the privacy of American citizens - is nevertheless committed. The FBI does its illegal bugging and takes its illegal tapes; the judges who refuse to admit them as evidence nevertheless make them public; the people who believe in the Bill of Rights stop practicing their belief and form verdicts on the basis of illegal evidence; a sort of consensus willingness to suspend the normal protections of the law and the society for members of the Mafia who discuss their crimes with one another also becomes, automatically, a suspension of normal protection for anyoody innocent who might be tangled in some word or circumstance mentioned

Ideally speaking, of course, the FBI should not take an illegal tape, the judge should not make it public, the press should not publish it, the editor should not comment on it, and the citizen should not read it. We must not, in our pursuit of law and order, surrender to the creed that the end will always justify the means, not even when the creatures we can get on tape are as low and sub-Jersey Mafia.

Some Okinawans Want Us To Stay roles and habits of imperialism often have help and invitation from the people

they are dealing with. The latest news from Okinawa, for instance, is news of a strike being conducted by native Okinawans against the United States military bases which have been employing them.

The reason for their strike? They are striking against an announced United States schedule of cut back in overseas military spending which is to be translated into a cut back in the number of Okinawa workmen on American mili-

They want the United States to keep on

spending the same amount of military money in Okinawa, so they can have from us the same number of jobs and

At the same time, however, the people of Okinawa are supposed to be people who are passionately hungry for the disappearance of American conquerors from their islands, so they can be reunit-

ed with Japan. And it was an agreement with Japan for the eventual return of Okinawa which was the big gift President Nixon made to Prime Minister Sato on his pre-election visit to Washington.

In the spirit of that agreement, Washington might be forgiven if it assumed that some cutback in the American military presence on Okinawa would be wel-

But in the light of the strike now going on, with the object of compelling the United States to maintain its military whether our presence in Okinawa is realcare more about principle than principal, and whether other imperialisms we ourselves have so freely criticized in the past have not also found subject countries urging them to go and begging them to remain almost in the same

The best cure is not to go in the first place. Before and during World War II inch of anybody's territory. We would have been better off, and it would conceivably have been a better world, if, after our victory, we had held to our

Such studies, said Hertz, led the government to ban estrogen in chicken food early in the dec ade although "it then approved the pill for daily oral consumption even though each pill con-tains one hundred thousand times more estrogen than an entire hormone-treated broller.' He said a recent report from he National Cancer Institute showed "one of the currently marketed contraceptive mixtures regularly produces cancer of the cervix in mice when fed in the daily diet." "It is also to be noted that all chemicals known to produce tu-

mors in man such as aniline dyes, arsenic, coal tar and thorium also produce tumors in experimental animals and frequently in the same site," Hertz "It would therefore seem reasonable to consider that women

in turn may share with animals a carcinogenic response to estrogen-containing medications,' he added. Estrogen, virtually abandoned in Britain after a recent report linked it directly to fatal blood clotting, is used in about half the birth control pills prescribed for the estimated 8.5 million


