But questioning our right to feel about the teachers as we do does not seem to change our feeling. We watch the disntegration of the home, the loosening grip of the church, the lack of juvenile respect for traditional values, and the bravado willingness to break the law one does not happen to like, and we deplore and regret and orate and pro-

But when we really feel hurt and wounded is when we see a great body of teachers, as in Hartford last Thursday, carry a threat of an illegal strike up to the last bargaining bastion, and then retreat only after proclaiming the victory won by their threat not enough and mounting, in advance, new threat

of the same tactics next year.

Should we admire how rough and tough teachers can become, once they have been persuaded to place their welfare in the hands of union professionals? Should we cheer their determination that there are no lengths to which they will not go in search of their own just

Should we concede, after all, that, in a true democracy, there is no difference between teachers and day laborers, between profession and a trade, between public and private payroll?

These questions of ours would all be answered in an angry affirmative by any union organizer.

Perhaps this is the way it is going to be, with no pause, by the great majority of teachers, to see if this is really the way they want to head, really the way they want to live.

But if the social historians of the future ever come to look for the moment in which the American society really began to come apart at the center, let them not neglect the possible significance of the moment in which organized teachers began breaking the law to close the schools against the children they taught.

Extending The Computer

The continually expanding role of the omputer in our society is one of the miracles of human scientific accomlishment; it is also, at the same time, in illustration of how the extension of any system which must forever remain partial and which can never quite become all-inclusive is an extension opento risks of larger and larger error. The bigger the computer bite, in other

words, the more chance it will bite off more than it can really chew. Take, for instance, the weather. The most brilliant successes of the current forecasting season, and its most welcome failures, have both come from

having the weatherman's computers pick up a small low pressure area over Texas and then predict its eventual arrival in Connecticut as a northeaster. The farther the computer reaches, the bigger the error it risks. When the lows and the winds and the

temperatures draw on resources still outside the programming of the computers, and persist in creating a weather pattern of their own, they tend to discredit the computers. This is unjust. The trouble is that the only real justice to 'the computers is to program them out to infinity with all factors. This is something we will try to do eventually; in the meantime, however, the outward spread of the computer will produce, from time to time, and from field to field, bigger and bigger errors such as weathermen never risked when they knew much less.

If there is anything we like to know as much about as we like to know about the weather, it is the economy. There, too, the use of the computer is being broadened and expanded, with ever-increasing rapidity.

If my neighbor sits on that couch while watching the TV game on Sunday, his team wins. If so much as gets up to go to the bathroom, there's a fumble. If he can't make a first down in a week. Perhaps it would be unkind to accuse this neighbor of being slightly concell ed, but there are those among us who would say that his observations lack scientific validity. I mean he's nuts.

He has plenty of company, Most people are reluctant to talk about this psychic phenomenon, but I have received enough hints to know that roughly twothirds of the population is afflicted. One afternoon in the late fall I encountered another neighbor, this one disconsolate and beset with unspeakable burdens. With diligent and sympathetic questioning I learned that he was shouldering the blame for his team's untimely

defeat. His stalwarts had had a threepoint lead in their game on Channel 7 when he took 30 minutes off to drive his children to a friend's house. Sure enough, by the time he got back to help. they were three touchdowns behind. They made up two of those, but the damage had been done.

It should be pointed out here that some of the afflicted are convinced that their attention to an event is not necessarily a guarantee that things will go as they should. That is, you occasionally run into one of these people who thinks he can have negative influence. I know a guy who claims credit for getting the New York Mets out of the doldrums last sum-

mer by not reading about them for the last 42 days of the season. Although the average American is likely to confine his conceit to sports events, where success is readily measurable, it appears obvious that some of us have gone beyond that. When Bowes died in 1946, the enterprise seemed ended. But in 1948 the organization was reassmbled for a try at television. Mack, a former clarinetist and vaudeville emcee who had been on Bowes' staff since the mid-1930s, was elected to head the show.

"When we started, we were doing the show from the furniture section of Wanamakers Department Store.

"My partner, Lloyd Marx, and I didn't know what to charge for the show. At the beginning he was getting \$25 per show and I was getting \$35."

What changes has he noticed in the contestants over the years?

"They're much more sophisticated nowadays," he replied. "We don't get the one-man bands that we used to.

"That's only natural, because today's kids can see everything from the Bolshoi ballet to the New York Philharmonic. The quality of the performances is no different. When Frank Sinatra was the rage, the singers all sounded like Sinatra. When the Beatles came along, the acts had the Beatle sound."

How long can the Amateur Hour continue? Possibly forever. At a budget of less than \$20,000—compared to \$150,000 for an average prime-time varlety hour-and an audience of six to seven million, it remains an excellent buy.
