





### Federico Fellini: 'Man Must Make Films About What He Knows'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Federico Fellini, an amiable bear of a man, was in town to show his latest film. His evaluation of Hollywood: A nice place to visit, but he wouldn't want to work here.

His countryman, Michelangelo Antonioni, did make a film in America, the controversial though still unreleased "Zabriskie Point." That wouldn't work for Fellini.

"A man must make a film about what he knows, and I do not know America," said the famed Italian director. "It is all right for a writer to say 'the table' in a book. But it is different with a director. He cannot say 'the table'; he must show you everything that is on the table. And for that you must know the place."

Fellini came here with his United Artists picture, "Fellini Satyricon," based on Petronius' fragmentary tales of lust and decadence in the Roman Empire. What it's all about, Fellini is not sure. "I'll leave that to the highway critics to say. But it is certainly a stunning achievement, packed with visual shocks and limitless imagination."

The director himself provided an inkling of his purpose: "The film is not about the Roman Empire at all. It is the story of our civilization today—the desperate search for pleasure, the decadence and alienation, the failure to communicate. If the work is done in the shape that Fellini envisions, then it might be better if we all got off."

"Fellini Satyricon" is not your run-of-the-mill Roman Empire. All the gods and goddesses that the Romans were capable of are portrayed on film. The explicit sex caused the film to be condemned by the Catholic church in Italy—very good for business; some producers

### Reds Revoke Svetlana's Citizenship

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government has revoked the citizenship of Svetlana Alliluyeva, daughter of Joseph Stalin, for "acts defaming the title of citizen."

She could not be reached immediately for comment. In New York City, Vera Boxell, a former press spokesman for Mrs. Alliluyeva, said: "I don't think she expected this. She wanted to keep it her Soviet citizenship, I'm pretty certain."

The current issue of the Bulletin of the Supreme Soviet disclosed that her citizenship was lifted by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet, the Soviet parliament, on Dec. 19. Mrs. Alliluyeva has said in the United States that she never intends to return to the Soviet Union and hopes to become a U.S. citizen.

In August 1968 Mrs. Alliluyeva was reported to have burned her Soviet passport and described the Soviet Union as "a land of uninterrupted pain and trauma." The Supreme Soviet's weekly bulletin carried the stinging report on Mrs. Alliluyeva's last in the Jan. 7 issue. It was distributed today.

A Constitutional Retreat. Government Rocketeers' recommendation to repeal the so-called Blaine amendment and replace it with "the least restrictive language of the Federal Constitution on separation of church and state" is clearly a retreat from an important principle.

The citizens of New York State only two years ago demonstrated strong support for that principle by rejecting a previous effort at repeal of Article II, Section 3, of the State Constitution prohibiting the direct or indirect support of religious schools in which denominational doctrine is taught.

The Governor's argument that the First Amendment to the Federal Constitution should suffice to uphold church-state separation ignores the historical fact that this expression of American devotion to religious liberty was written long before education became an important concern of the Federal Government.

Fast-reaching compromises to permit peripheral subsidy of church-related schools have already been upheld by the courts, under the principle that aid to children is permissible as long as it does not pay for the support of institutions.

It is exactly because such permissive interpretations of the First Amendment already offer extensive new fiscal support for children attending parochial schools that the intent of the repeal of the state's prohibition seems unmistakable.

It is to clear the way for massive and eventually perhaps total support of church-related schools. Such a course would not only undermine public education, it could pose a serious threat to the freedom of religious schools and their religion itself. — NEW YORK TIMES.

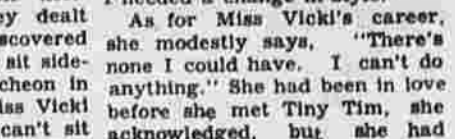

### Dr. Leary Convicted On Pot Charge

LAREDO, Tex. (AP) — Dr. Timothy Leary, convicted on federal marijuana charges Tuesday, has blasted the court proceedings as "another escalation of the war against the young."

He said he will appeal his conviction for illegally transporting marijuana.

The former Harvard instructor said he has been arrested more than 14 times in the last five years but found guilty only twice—both times in Laredo.

He was re-tried in U.S. District Court here Monday and Tuesday on charges of illegally transporting less than half an ounce of marijuana into this country via the International Bridge here on Dec. 22, 1965.

Leary, 49, was first convicted in March of 1966. The case came to the court here again after the U.S. Supreme Court overruled that conviction.

Leary said he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of California. He said his wife, Rosemary, will run in his place if the conviction "wipes me out."

The all-Mexican-American jury of four women and eight men took one hour and 21 minutes to convict Leary. A packed courtroom of spectators ranging from housewives to hippie types heard the verdict.

### Better Explanation Asked On Nixon's Welfare Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon needs to bring about better understanding of the work-incentive portions of his welfare plan if Congress is to act favorably, one of his principal House supporters says.

The assessment came from Rep. John W. Byrnes of Wisconsin, senior Republican on the House Ways and Means Committee which began closed-door consideration of the welfare proposals this week.

There are indications the program is having hard going.

In a separate interview, committee chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ind., said he could not at this point describe the proposal as "either in good shape or bad shape."

"It has a lot of bugs in it," Mills said. "It isn't the first time we have received an administration proposal with bugs in it."

A key feature of the proposal would replace the present system of aid to dependent children with a broader plan of a government-guaranteed minimum income for families.

Unemployed adults who benefit would be required to register for work training or job referrals. There would be a variety of incentives for them to accept jobs, including an exemption of a substantial part of their earnings from any reduction in welfare payments, day care centers for children and improved job locating and referral services.

### Voluntary Busing Considered by HRC

A new approach of educating children from Hartford in classrooms with Manchester children was discussed last night by the Human Relations Commission at its meeting in the Municipal Building.

Frank Rizzo, commissioner of education, member, referred to the plan as "volunteer regionalism" and "satellite education." Under his proposal new schools would be built in Manchester and other suburban towns to educate Hartford children whose parents want them in this type of school. The school would have a certain percentage of children from each community. Construction and operating cost would be shared by the towns involved in the project. The new approach, Rizzo said, would not replace Project Concern but coincide with it.

"I think this will help correct the emphasis," he said.

"Voters will continue to oppose building new schools if they feel busing Hartford children to Manchester is being forced on them," Rizzo said. "Two things would be accomplished by the 'volunteer busing' he said. It would relieve some of the crowding in Manchester schools and provide suburban education for Hartford children.

Several commission members showed an interest in further exploring the possibilities of this type of education. Dr. David L. Warren, commission chairman, asked Rizzo to write his proposed plan, have it mimeographed for workbooks to be used by the commission at its next meeting, Feb. 15.

Also at the meeting, Eric Simonson, chairman of the Youth Commission, and Robert J. Deegan, an adult adviser of the group, outlined the commission's organization and plans. The 20-member Youth Commission is studying air and water pollution, narcotics addiction, recreation facilities, and other topics to make recommendations to the town's Board of Directors. The age range of the Youth Commission is from junior high school to college level. Members have to be town residents and under 21 years old. Leaders include: Human Relations Commission member, made two suggestions which were accepted for speakers at future meetings. No Consensus Develops

Widened Cottage St. Key To Downtown Renewal Ideas

Several new alternatives for Downtown Renewal, all keyed to a widened and extended Cottage St., to run from a ramp off Rt. 6 to E. Center St., by way of Madison St., were unveiled last night in the Municipal Building.

Presented by Edward Rybczyk, of the White Plains N.Y. consulting firm of Raymond, May, Paruch and Flinn, they were viewed and discussed by the Board of Directors, by members of the Manchester Redevelopment Agency (MRA), by the Chamber of Commerce, and town agencies, and by department heads.

Rybczyk is former executive director of the MRA and is a former Manchester town planner. In December, he had presented sketches of a proposal for redeveloping only that portion of Downtown Main St. north of Birch St. The proposal received less than an enthusiastic response than he was asked to bring in alternatives for other sections and for the length of Main St.

After viewing those alternatives last night, acting MRA chairman Harner Taylor was assisted by Mayor Nathan Agostinelli to come in with his agency's recommendations (or no recommendation) at a future meeting of the Board of Directors, on or before Feb. 10 or Feb. 11. Taylor had said that the MRA, although it had viewed the alternatives plans before last night, had no recommendation ready.

Chamber of Commerce president Philip Harrison, on the other hand, said that his executive board had a recommendation to make to the city, he said, had viewed the alternative proposals Monday morning in the Chamber offices, and was recommending a plan for the entire length of Main St. from Charter Oak St. to E. Center St.

This proposal, Rybczyk explained last night, would cost an estimated \$9 million, with the town providing \$2 million and the federal government \$7 million. Rybczyk said that, since the federal funds covered the cost, he estimated total only \$3.7 million, which he felt was a reasonable figure to plan the project in two stages. He recommended talks with federal officials, to explain the proposal and to feel them out on potential future funds.

"There is no assurance they would approve federal funds for the second phase," he said. "Certainly, they will make no commitment until more federal funds are available. They aren't available now."

Federal officials have told the MRA that the \$3.7 million reserved for Manchester has July 31 deadline for the submission and acceptance of suitable plans. The \$9 million proposal is for improved housing, utilities and traffic circulation, plus a widened and extended Cottage St. all contained between the east side of Main St. and the west side of Spruce St. from Charter Oak St. to E. Center St. The plan does not provide for changes to or replacement of any of the buildings facing Main St.

Rybczyk said it would provide 160 units of new housing and 460 additional, off-street parking stalls. Cottage St. would be made into an 80-foot-wide, four-lane street, and the intersection at the Center (Main and E. Center Sts.) would be straightened to some extent. The area, he said, covers 70 acres. If implemented, the proposal would require relocation of 200 to 250 households and 25 to 30 businesses. David Comins, chairman of the Parking Authority, said that he does not approve of this plan. "It does nothing for Downtown merchants, except to provide a new street and to speed traffic."

Wind Causes Navy Ship To Slice Bridge

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — "Frigid winds gusting to 50 miles an hour tore a Navy ship from its anchorage and pushed it through a bridge section of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel early today. No injuries were reported about the ship or on the bridge."

A 5th Naval District cargo ship at Norfolk said the cargo ship Yancy sliced through the bridge struts completely severing the two-lane road bed and leaving a 150-foot gap in the structure. The bridge-tunnel is 21 miles long.

The Yancy carried a crew of 25 officers and 225 enlisted men. One of the Navy's 12 attack cargo ships, the Yancy is 415 feet long and displaces 14,000 tons. It was not the first time a ship has put the bridge out of commission. In past years the bridge has been struck by two barges and an LST. One of the earlier accidents dislocated a complete section of the roadway. The bridge-tunnel is 21 miles long.

The Yancy had been anchored in the Chesapeake Bay when the wind tore the ship from its anchorage and pushed it through a bridge section of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel early today. No injuries were reported about the ship or on the bridge.

Fed, FDIC Okay Hike In Interest Rate

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a letter to the Federal Reserve Board, the Federal Reserve announced today that it has approved a 1/4 percent increase in the discount rate to 10 1/4 percent.

The announcement was made after a week of almost daily meetings between the Fed, the FDIC and the Federal Home Loan Bank Board. The FDIC and the Federal Home Loan Bank Board are expected to announce higher rates for savings and loan associations as well.

The Fed and FDIC boosted the maximum rates on bank savings deposits from 4 to 4 1/4 percent, the first change since Nov. 24, 1964.

On single maturity time deposits of less than 100,000, the two agencies authorized banks to pay 5 1/2 percent interest on one-year securities and 5 1/4 percent on two-year securities. A 5 1/4 percent rate had previously been in effect.

A new ceiling of 7 1/2 percent was set on time deposits of 100,000 or more. The rate for such deposits left for three months in 1964 was increased to 7 1/2 percent, while those left a year or more will be eligible for the highest rate.

The FDIC said its discussion with the Fed and the FHLBB had resulted in an agreement that the changes do not signal an easing of credit restraint. The interest rate for savings and loan associations is now 4 1/4 percent, and the FDIC said it is reviewing the accounts and 5 1/4 percent on certificates of deposit for a specific length of time.

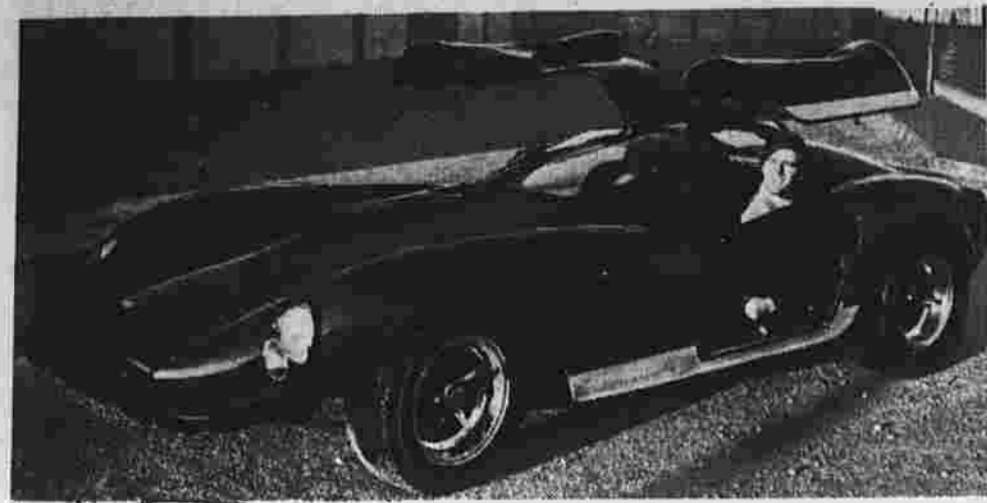

Police Central Computer Space Age Crimefighter

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — A computer in a Phoenix clock room is helping police all over the country fight crime more efficiently.

The computer is the nerve center for the Law Enforcement Teletype System (LETS) and the clock room is located in the Arizona Highway Patrol's communications center.

Messages for the LETS system are punched onto paper tape at the central outlet-entry point in each state.

The system handles about 10,000 messages a day of a police nature. Reports of crimes, descriptions of stolen vehicles, reports on weather and road conditions and a host of other information is sent by the computer from the people who have it to the people who need it.

"A report of a bank robbery in Missouri can be sent to any state, or any 10 states or to all states," Monschein explained. "It can include a description of the subjects, their mode of travel, their direction of travel—anything that would help law enforcement to apprehend them."

Another attorney for the 20-year-old pregnant blonde first asked dismissal of counts involving the killings last Aug. 10 of Mr. and Mrs. Leno LaBianca, married owners on grounds of insufficient evidence.

Then the attorney, Gary Frielehan, asked dismissal of all counts, saying the grand jury that returned the murder-conspiracy indictment was not representative of the community as a whole, and that it was influenced by what he called an "intimidation" of publicity.

Superior Court Judge Malcolm M. Lucas ordered that Mrs. Kaasaban remain in custody, with trial date to be set Feb. 1.

Another defendant has said that all of those charged were members of a band of nomadic hippie types, and that some killed Mrs. Tate and four visitors to her home Aug. 9, and then killed the La Blancas the next night to show they hadn't lost their nerve.

Mrs. Kaasaban's attorney conceded there was sufficient evidence to hold his client for trial in the Tate case, but argued that although she accompanied the others to the La Blancas home she was not involved in the slayings.

Frielehan said grand jury testimony indicated that Mrs. Kaasaban's only direct connection was that she disposed of a wallet belonging to one of the La Blancas, apparently on direction from a co-defendant, clan leader Charles Manson.

He said Mrs. Kaasaban had no choice but to go along to the La Blancas home unless she wanted her throat cut.

Frielehan said that there is no evidence that Mrs. Kaasaban "did anything to harm anyone or went inside anyone's house" when the slayings occurred.

The judge, however, ruled there was sufficient evidence to hold her for trial, noting that "she may have left (the Tate case) but she remained other defendants." The judge added that testimony indicated Mrs. Kaasaban disposed of bloody clothing, knives and a gun by throwing them into a canyon.

Frielehan said he had been told by the prosecution his client was the only one for whom the death penalty would be sought, but one of the prosecutors said no decision has been made yet on this point.

He Builds His 'Dream Cars' In Italian Racing Capital

MODENA, Italy (AP) — Tom Meade's dream car sits gleaming in an autumn dreeze, a package of power, precision and luxury.

You bend low and slip behind the wheel, lying back in the cushiony purple velvet seat as the car took 7,000 man hours over 11 months to build.

But here there is a danger of getting too relaxed and falling asleep? "Meet with this car," replies Meade, a blond 30-year-old Californian who has built 18 cars Radio? Electric windows? Air over eight years in this Italian condition?

Then we get down to color. Different types of body materials, upholstery. Normally, I suggest the engine."

The tall, rugged handsome Meade, who is still single, dresses well, eats at the best restaurants and makes the night-club circuit.

Nine years ago, as a freelance jewelry designer in San Francisco, he enjoyed a similar high life. But he wasn't happy. He wanted to build his dream car, and couldn't afford to do it in America. He worked his way to Europe as a dishwasher on a Norwegian freighter, then, after hitchhiking around a while, landed in Modena.

Under a rotting canvas in the back of the factory he found "the car of my dreams"—just the body of a Maserati 350 S. He bought it for \$400.

"I was so excited. I was ready to pay \$2,000," Meade hunched up 13 full-time employees for \$400 from a Corvette like to turn out about one custom-made car a month.

Low on money, Meade found a fair-sized business who would let him build Ferraris, Maseratis and Lamborghinis—all cars made in Modena—and in remounting antique Italian models.

"People have always liked automobiles," said Meade, who uses his Innocent Minimotor for short hops in this Italian

city near 170,000. "But now autos are sweeping the world, especially the custom luxury cars."

Meade said he gets hundreds of inquiries from all over the world about cars people want built for them, but can't fill all having no money. Meade declared. "I couldn't afford to make a mistake."

Customers he does accept correspond with him for weeks, even months, until their cars take final shape.

"The most important thing," says Meade, "is how much do you want to spend? Next, what do you want to use the car for? For the street? Or in practicality seem to styling? What extras do you want? Tape deck? Radio? Electric windows? Air over eight years in this Italian condition?"

Others will mark the 25th anniversary of the Second Austrian Republic, the 50th anniversary of Leopold Franz von Salm-Reifferscheidt-Roos, the 100th anniversary of Ludwig van Beethoven's birth, famous operetta, hiking and mountaineering, to mention a few.

The last stamp on its 1969 list had a postage stamp day. Featured on the adhesive is a postal sign from the one-time postal station of Unken in the province of Salzburg. It shows three men, the chief of whom is supported by two Salzburg lions.

Cardigan Bay, the first New Zealand standard-bred light harness horse in racing history to win \$1 million in stakes money, appears on a new 10-cent stamp issue by New Zealand. The horse was purchased in 1964 by U.S. interests with the condition that he be returned to New Zealand when his racing career is over, perhaps within the next few months.
