



The Los Angeles Times SOLEDAD, Calif. -Killing is obviously not going to solve the growing racial conflict in Caliornia's 13 state prisons. Once the cycle starts, however, it can be hard to stop. Racial hatred has directly or indirectly taken four lives here this month. The deaths focused attention on how racial antagonisms festered with the sprouting of black and brown power behind bars in the last three or four years.

Officials at Soledad Correc tional Training Facility are cautiously optimistic that the bloodshed here is over for the time being. But they cannot be sure. They recall that the cycle continued for 114 months at San Quentin Prison last year. A series of Stabbings began at San Quentin when white inmates killed a black inmate April 22, 1969. The murder was committed over a \$100 debt. Three days later, four blackinmates took revenge by stabbing the victim at random. Then two blacks were stabbed to death by whites. It ended

June 11, when Blacks stabbed seven whites, one of them fatal-By this time, the prison population was terrified," said Associate Warden James Park. 

No matter what we do, each side in the Near East insists on regarding us as much too friendly to the other.

The truth is that neither side really wants us to be "even-handed." The way the two sides feel about each other makes it impossible for them to consider anything acceptable from us which concedes any of the normal privileges of world life to the other.

The solution, if there is ever to be one, cannot be that easy. It cannot call for the survival of only one of these forces. It must provide for the survival

No outside nation can be true friend to either of these forces if it does not maintain, as its policy objective, such a survival for both Israel and the Arab states, in equal rights and equal dignity.

Not in trying to master one another but only in agreeing that neither can be master is there any real security for

The only way the United States has a chance of ever receiving the true thankfulness of anybody in the Near East is to keep alive the diplomacy of potential negotiation and compromise, no matter how thankless such diplomacy seems from day to day.

A recent survey showed that 98 per cent of the men who volunteered for sterilization over the past three years say they are completely satisfied with it So are their wives.

Some 20,000 Britons chose va ectomy last year. People in volved in the program estimat that this year's figure will reach 40,000. Doubts about the safety of the contraceptive pill have increased interest in the 20-minute operation.

The Simon Population Trust which has pioneered surveys on the effects of the operation, had been getting 100 letters a day asking about vasectomy. Then n December a British government committee warned that contraceptive pills which high estrogen contents may be linked with thrombosis or blood clotting. After that the trust got more than 200 letters a day. The trust supplies material to explain the operation in these

"The sheer drudgery of bringing up young children, when one is middle-aged, can make life a hell on earth at times. There are seven of them and my wife says 20 years of having a child or children under school age is really too much. I think it is my
