An Incident, Or A New Policy? For a year now President Nixon has cossessed a great majority support for his policy in Vietnam. It has been an unusual and curious majority, for it embraces both doves and hawks, as well as other gradations in feeling about

This great majority composed of strange bedfellows has committed itself to letting President Nixon have his full chance to handle the situation in Viet-

At the same time, its component parts have kept alive, within themselves, their hope that what the President finally winds up doing will be from their book.

The doves hope that the President is going to prove to have the courage and vision to keep on doing what he can unilaterally to end the war.

The hawks themselves have relatively little appetite left for this particular war, but they would probably welcome some development which said to them that they were the ones who had been right all along, and the ones whose policy still ought to be adopted, after strategies for peace have failed.

In such a situation, with different supporters hoping for different policies from him, and with the President himself gifted at language which can be interpreted one way one minute, another the next, the only sane measurement of what the President really means has been to watch what he does, rather than pay total attention to what he says.

The main athing the President has been doing about Vietnam has been to undertake a gradual withdrawal of American troops, which is the opposite of escalation, and which has pleased the doves, although they pretend they want him to do it a lot faster.

Now, however, there has been another kind of action in Vietnam, and this is one which revives and pleases the hawks. For the first time since President Johnson suspended the bombing of North Vietnam, our planes attacked an installation in North Vietnam. They were engaging in a "defensive" operation and punishing an enemy missile base which had committed an "aggression" by firing at one of our planes over its territory.

This is, for this one incident at least, a return to the old theory that whenever North Vietnam defends its own territory against us, it is engaging in-aggression which must be punished and re-

taliated for. It is the kind of action not likely to have been undertaken without the specific approval of the White House.

And it seems likely to be classified along with other items of over-response which have featured our behavior in the

We first unleashed our air power against North Vietnam in August of 1964, in response to an alleged attack upon two of our destroyers which did not take

And the enemy action which, the following February, triggered the regular bombing of North Vietnam for the next three years was, believe it or not, a small foray by enemy guerrillas into the edges of the airfield at Pleiku.

If it proves an isolated incident, attention can swing back to the troop withdrawals. If it recurs, our policy has been changed again.

#### Neither Life Nor Death

It becomes quite obvious, as indeed it might have been expected to be, that the equation between the late Philip Blaiberg and modern medical science was not what was normally assumed. It might have been assumed that modern science was doing him a kindness

and a favor, by prolonging his life. The evidence suggests, to the contrary, that he was doing medical science a favor. He was doing medical science a favor by being willing to expose himself to the kind of experience the experiment involved. And some people might evaluate his experience as one which indicated that there can be some things worse than death - life prolonged under heart transplant conditions for

According to the South African dentist's widow, Blaiberg lived 594 days with a new heart, spending 248 of these in a hospital fighting for his life, and spending 95 of his days at home in bed. He once posed for photographers holding a glass of beer in his hand, but his real intake was from 32 to 100 pills a

His widow tells the story of the day he went to the beach, for the photographers. "From nine in the morning to half past five in the afternoon, my husband spent eight and one half hours of torment, during which he was only able to get up, shave, shower, dry himself and dress. In the afternoon he was driven to the beach, but the photographers' did not know about the very long preparation which preceded this short trip." Blaiberg's daughter has had this to

say about his case: "I believe in anything, and I emphasize anything, that prolongs human life, and I also emphasize the word life. But as far as the transplant goes, the medical people and scientists concerned must do further research, because being his daughter, I know that there are personality side effects, both emotional and physical. They must first perfect the operation before going on to do more
