On Pre-Primary Classes

The pre-primary program was instituted in the Manchester system with a class at Wadsworth School in 1963. Heina said, following a study of the Hartford program and ideas submitted by staff members. There are currently 95 in the six local classrooms.

The basic premise on which the class functions, he said, is to enable each child to progress at his own rate. To that end, a variety of activities is employed, from both the kindergarten and first grades.

Classes must be small (preferably no larger than 15), three must be flexible in the teacher and among the pupils, and the whole atmosphere must be less formal than in other classrooms. Because of the short attention span of these children, Heina said, there has been some informal discussion of shortening their day at the beginning of the school year.

The key to the success of the program, he feels, is the teacher. "She should be a person who is warm, easygoing, and easily frustrated, able to live with small gains."

Heina pointed out that, during the year, another possibility would be to move from the pre-primary class to first grade. He said that, at the end of the pre-primary year, a child will be moved directly to second grade.

Heina gave three reasons why his class has not spread to other schools: (1) lack of space; (2) a very large kindergarten enrollment, which would result in too large a pre-primary class; and the converse, (3) a very small kindergarten, and a resulting very small pre-primary class.

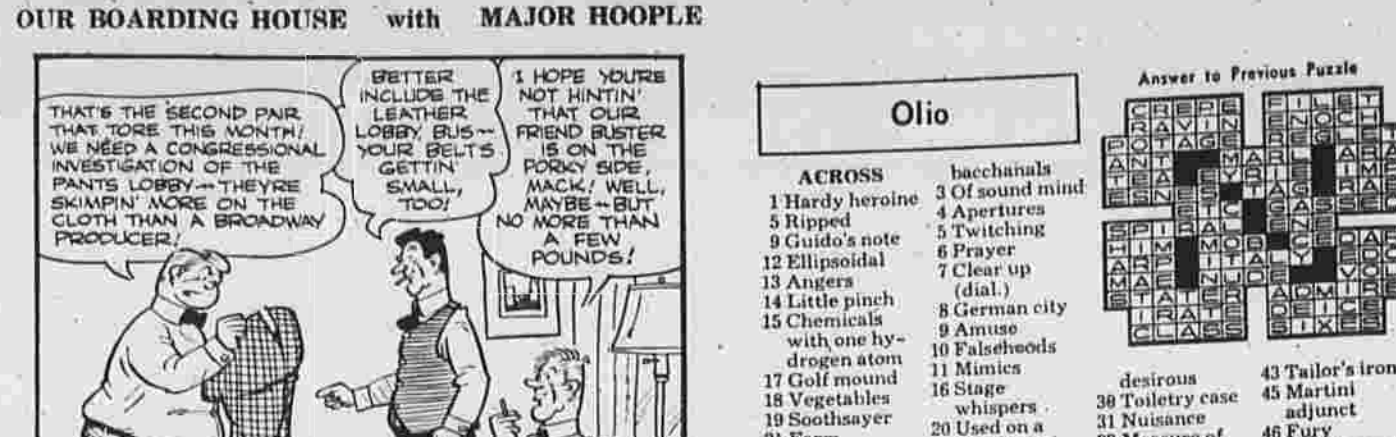

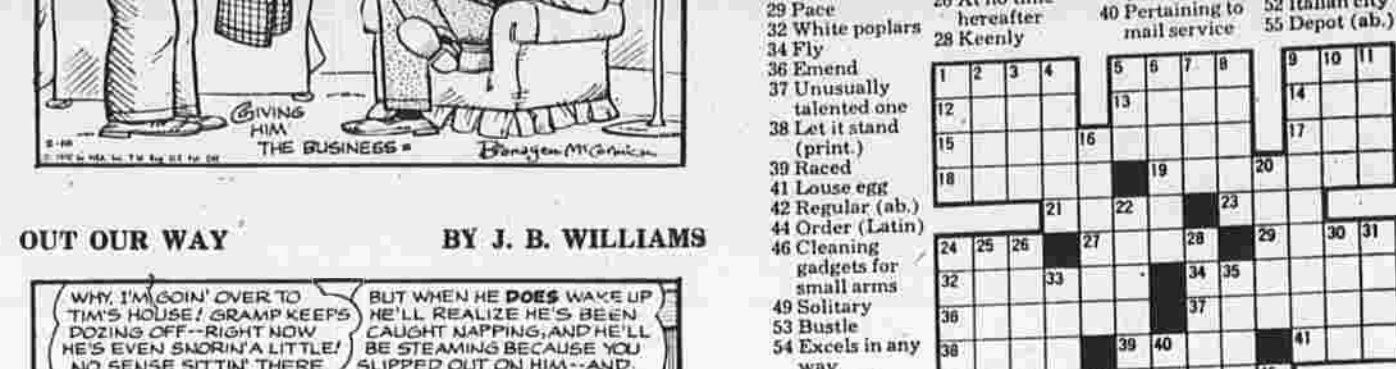

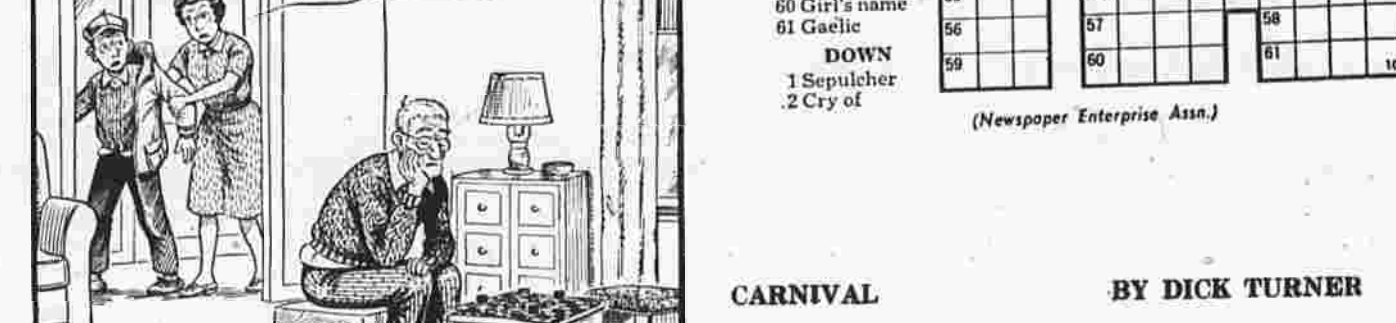
