



eral authorities have evidence that two Swiss bankers-fully aware that they were accomplices in a fraud-supplied hundreds of false documents from a string of shadow companies which became the backbone of a multimillion-dollar swindle of the U.S. government. With the aid of the bankers the evidence shows, a group of Americans was able to channel more than \$4 million into secret Swiss bank accounts before the fraud was exposed and stopped. The Americans, who pleaded guilty of their parts in the fraud were scheduled for sentencing

They are Francis N. Rosenbaum, a prominent Washington attorney; Andrew L. Stone, a wealthy St. Louis businessman Evelyn Price of St. Louis, Stone's executive secretary Robert B. Bregman, president of Bregman Electronics, Inc., of New York; the Chromcraft Corp., of St. Louis and Alsco Inc., of Akron, Ohio. The two Swiss bankers were named as co-conspirators but not defendants in the case. The fraud has received much publicity but the evidence detailing the role of the Swiss

ernment files. The case, officials said, is just one example of the hundreds of frauds and tax evasions believed carried out each year with the knowledge and aid of discreet foreign bankers. Simplified, the case worked this way: Stone and Rosenbaum were officers of a company which was the prime contractor on millions of dollars in Navy defense business. They set up two dummy com panies in the United States and fraudulently represented them as subcontractors on the Navy work. The Swiss bankers supplied those subcontractors with raudulent bills from other dum my European firms for materials which were never ordered or shipped. The dummy subconractors then "sold" the non-existent material to the prime contractor who charged the Navy for it.



WASHINGTON (AP) President Nixon sent Congress today a special message on environmental programs, emphasizing waste treatment facilities to fight water pollution and stricter standards and enforcement against both water and air allution.

Violation of air or water qua ity standards could be enforced under Nixon's plans, by fines of up to \$10,000 per day. Nixon proposed giving the fed-

eral government authority to control pollution over all navi gable waters, not just interstate as it now the case. He also proposed establishing

national air quality standards and to extend that authorit also to intrastate situations. The President's messag

spelled out his previously an nounced request for \$4 billion in ederal grants to aid construct ion of municipal waste trea ment plants, but he shortene the period of allocation from his original aim of five years to four years—a rate of \$1 billion : vear.

Nixon's plan included esta lishment of an environmental f nancing authority to help state and municipalities find the \$6 billion in matching funds which they would need to take advantage of the construction grants The authority would fund its own operations by issuing securities of its own.

The federal Treasury would make payments to the authority covering the difference between what it takes in from the communities and what it must pay out in interest on its own bonds. Nixon's program also proposes a requirement that indus tries using municipal waste disposal systems pay user fees and that effluent standards be imposed to curb industrial and municipal water pollution.

Bankers Knowingly Helped Swindle U.S. Government

estimating the number of dol lars fraudulently channeled into foreign bank accounts each year "defies imagination," but certainly runs into the hundreds of millions.

Government officials here say

They say they find it almost impossible to break up such schemes unless someone on the inside cooperates.

The Navy fraud case was broken by Asst. U.S. Atty. Seymour Glanzer, chief of th Frauds Prosecutions Unit of the U.S. Attorney's office here. He was able, through court action, to force Swiss banks to open their books and files. A 30-count indictment was re-

turned in August, 1968, against the six defendants involved in the case. Stone and Rosenbaum pleaded guilty last October to nine counts each and the other defendants to one count each. Each count carried a maximum penalty of five years in prison and \$10,960 in fines.

Tortured Champions Of Yesterday There were two gatherings over the weekend, that of four Southern governors at Mobile, that of five Arab state leaders at Cairo which shared certain characteristics.

Both were attempted retrenchments against inevitabilities.

Both were hopelessly oriented because both sought a return to an impossible

But neither was quite as villainous, or quite as deliberately evil, as its selfrighteous foes would like to think.

The five Arab states met in Cairo within sound of the bombs being dropped by Israel, the inevitability they would like to repeal.

The Southern Governors at Mobile were under the spreading shadow of that artificial school integration they would like to escape.

The five Arab states at Cairo could conceive of no policy which could make its way forward, and the Governors at Mobile could launch no program for their own states which aimed positively toward the future and the inability in both conferences was linked to the fact that there are situations in human affairs in which the emotions overpowe

any capacity to be rational. There will continue to be an Israel.

There will be integration.

That does not mean that those who cannot bring themselves emotionally into an acceptance of such inevitabilities are automatically evil men. They are products of their time and their culture and represent a few inevitabilities of their own. It may be that they have to lose; there is no guarantee they themselves can ever be the ones to understand why they must lose. They have been caught by history, by a matter of a few decades one way or another, so that they look anachronistic and pitiable and hopeless defending the kind of world into which they themselves were born.

Some day there will be Arab leaders who will know how to accept the existence of Israel, and some day there will be Southern Governors who find their

own ways of advancing integration. But first there are the unhappy, desperate, tortured champions of yesterdays that can never come again. It is easy to condemn them, but it is not just to assume they have had easy choices.

And he has succeeded, meanwhile, in orrowing \$48,000 on stock his wife owns in an enterprise operated by her family.
