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A Speech For The Times

If we in Connecticut are honest constituents of Senator Ribicoff, we will confess that we were the people he was talking about in his historic speech in the Senate Monday, and that the truth he was thrusting at us was one we do not like to have thrust at us, particularly by one of our own.

It would be a tremendous thing if, i response to this speech by our own Senator, we in Connecticut should prove able to galvanize ourselves into some greater vigor and consistency of social action in the directions which are at once so necessary and so difficult.

But it seems more likely to prove important and epochal for its long-range effects than for any instant miracles.

It might be recognized, some day, as the speech which drew this country together into one honestly motivated approach to, its great social problem, whereas previously it had been sectionally and ideologically divided.

What the Ribicoff speech has done is to give us, from a political figure in a strikingly ideal situation for such a function, the landmark words which tell us exactly where we stand on our racial issue. These words are already out there in the national consciousness. They cannot be blotted out again. None of us will ever really be able to forget them, if we try. Most of us may find that, eventually, we feel compelled by something inside ourselves to try to serve

fer: "The North is guilty of monumental hypocrisy in its treatment of the

black man. "Without question, Northern communities have been as systematic and consistent as Southern communities in denying to the black man and his children the opportunity that exists for the white people.

"The plain fact is that racism rampant throughout the country, knows no geographic boundary and has known none since the great migration of rural blacks following World War II. "The institutional roots of racism which depersonalize our prejudices and make it easier for us to defend them are as deeply embedded in the large metropolitan communities of the North as they are in the small rural communities of the South .

"Our problem is not only the dual systems of education which exist 16 years after the Supreme Court struck them down in 1954.

"The more fundamental problem is the dual society that exists in every metropolitan area - the black society of the central city and the white society of the suburb.

"Massive school segregation does not exist because we have segregated our schools but because we have segre gated our society and our neighborhoods.

"That is the source of the inequality, the tension and the hatred that figure our nation."

You could take the name of the speaker off these sentences, and eliminate the location of their delivery, and you still could not keep them from whipping their way about in your mind.

We may flinch before some of the things these words seem to ask us to try to begin to do.

We may fail to provide much initiative and energy for the kind of action such words should lead toward.

But we can, for a beginning, be proud it is our State and our Senator have given this speech to the nation.

Frictions And Factions

Ten families live on our street. Three are Catholic, three are Jewish, and four are Protestant, One of the Protestan families is Negro. It would be difficult to find 10 households more varied in their tastes and opinions, and yet we all get on exceedingly well. To my knowledge, there has never been even a small misunderstanding among any of my neighpors, and I have begun to wonder why. Such harmony is not the human way. Friction is a common by-product of human contact. Why is it our street is free of the normal measure of neighborly ten-

The answer is not entirely admirable. Neighbors are a little like relatives they're stuck with each other. So there is some impetus to avoid topics of conversation likely to generate electricity. When the neighbors get together, the talk seems deliberately impersonal, centering mostly on home improvements real-estate taxes, the local school, and where - are - you - going - on - your

Some of the subjects assiduously avoided are: The Pope's position on birth control; the attitudes of American Jews toward Israel, and family life among the Negro poor. These are much more interesting topics than ever arise at PTA meetings, but they are difficult topic for a motley group of neighbors to handle safely. There is too much danger that somebody will drop a remark that might

And nobody on our street is eager to jeopardize the friendly, if slightly innocuous, relationships that exist among the neighbors.

The policy is useful and probably wise for people who live on the same street. It is less useful and less wise when it is applied to American society. And yet na tional leaders and commentators fre quently dodge difficult subjects for the same reason neighbors do: They don't want to hurt the feelings of this group of

There is, for instance, too little gen eral discussion in the United States about the need for couples to restric their offspring to the number they can afford to raise decently. Moreover, with an eve on population congestion, there should be greater encouragement of small families no matter what the household income may be.

Of the two concerns, the first is the more important in this country. It is contrary to the family's welfare and the general welfare for poor women to produce baby after baby. Both mother and children frequently become a burden to society, but the worst of it is that mother and children become steeped in squalor and misery.

When we think of the poor today, we think of the Negro poor. Thus the suggestion that the poor be encouraged to limit their families is interpreted by black firebrands as a formula for "genocide." One might infer from this attitude that some radicals see merit in Negroes' out preeding whites

But it is obvious that the happiness and opefulness of the poor, whatever their race, would be served if they brought their families under control. A poor hus band would be less likely to desert his fare rolls, if he felt he could suppor tham. It is easier to support one or two children than seven.

And a word about the so-called welfare mothers and their campaign for "dignity." The welfare system in America de serves to be reformed, but it's doubtful any system of public assistance can of fer dignity, although it could be rid of some unnecessary and humiliating procedures). It's pretty hard to keep a graap on dignity if you require public support

Another tender subject in our society is U.S. policy toward Israel and the attitudes of American Jews toward that country.

I can't imagine an American Jew not feeling sentimental about Israel. The status of that land cannot be divorced from the memory of centuries of incredible persecution, and many Israelis experienced the horrors of Hitler at first hand. Israel is more than a renewed homeland. It is a sanctuary. Any Jew who doesn't have a special feeling for Israel must have water for blood.

And any American non-Jew who has the wit and decency to empathize should have no trouble understanding this special feeling of 3 per cent of his countrymen.

But that is not the same as saying that the security of Israel is vital to American interests. It is demonstrably not vital. If there were no Israel, would the peril to the United States be greater than at present? In what way does Israel's existence bear upon the security of America? Would the Arab world become a Communist fortress if Israel ceased to be?

From the look of things, the Arab world seems unlikely to become a fortress of anything. And it might be argued that the Middle East confrontation poses more of a threat to U.S. security han a Middle East without an Israel I suspect that the Israelis themselve would be the first to say that Israel i an Israeli responsibility, not an Ameri an one. And certainly the Israelis have hown they can take care of themselves.

(It would be pleasant if some other countries friendly to the United States were so resourceful.) So the only intelligent policy for the U.S. Government is to continue to do

what it's doing: Maintain the best relations possible with both sides and, in the event of a crisis, take whatever acto protect American interests. To confuse this aim because of polit

cal pressure at home would be a disservice to all Americans. The subjects I've touched on this week

are ticklish because they rub against the emotions. But that's the kind of subject always most in need of discussion, be cause although misunderstandings might arise, there is no other way to eventual iv reduce the electricity.



For my book on Abraham Lincoln I chose 103 different photographs of the Civil War president. Therefore, one might assume that Lincoln enjoyed having his picture taken. Nothing could be farther from the fact. Lincoln disliked facing a camera. He went to the photogra-

pher's studio only because, after his nomination, pictures had to be sent across the country to show the electorate that the Re publican presidential nomine was-not "half alligator and hal horse" as his opponents charged.

In 1880 newspapers could not print pictures, for the process had not been invented yet. So thousands of photographs had t be distributed. Both Alexander Hesler in Chicago and Mathew B. Brady in New York photo graphed Lincoln in a number of But after his election Lincoln

began to grow a beard, and new pictures were necessary. The story goes that Lincoln grew a beard at the suggestion of 12-year-old Grace Bedell. It is a charming story, but one won ders if it is true, Lincoln had an uncanny instinct for what is now called public relations. He want ed to present himself as a new kind of president, particular since he was the first Republi

can party president. All 15 presidents before him had been clean-shaven. Lincoln grew a beard. And to enhance his 6-foot-4-inch height, he put on a stovepipe hat which made him look like a giant.

The day after he arrived Washington on Feb. 24, 1861, he went to Brady's Photographi Parlor on the corner of Pennsyl vania Avenue and Seventh Street. He seated himself before the camera, said nothing, and appeared indifferent to what was going on around him.

Every time Lincoln faced photographer his expression froze into a mask; all light, all life vanished from his face. His son Robert could not understand why his father lapsed into a camera; why he always seemed so sad, so gloomy.

Among the 103 photographs 1 chose there is not a single one depicting Lincoln with a smile Yet, when he told a story he

laughed, and he smiled often. His secretary John G. Nicolay noted: "Graphic art was powerless before a face that moved through a thousand delicate gradations of line and contour, light and shade, sparkle of eye and curve of the lip, in the long gamut of expression from grave to gay, and back again from the ollicking jollity of laughter to that serious, faraway look that with prophetic intuitions beheld the awful panorama of war, and heard the cry of oppression and uffering. There are many pictures of Lincoln; there is no por trait of him."

So why did he look so melan tographer? was it self-concholy as soon as he faced a phosciousness? Was it because he knew that people considered him ugly?

People called him everything from "original gorilla" to "bowlegged, knock-kneed, pigeonoed, slab-sided shapeless skeleton." A stationer in New York would not hang up Lincoln's photograph because "he would have such an ugly-looking fellow's picture in the store."

When he posed before a cam era he looked dejected. One observer noted that "melanchol dripped from him." yet when he talked or told a story his face grew animated, and "the dull, listless features dropped like a mask. The melancholy shadow disappeared in a twinkling." Horace White of the Chicago Tribune wrote of Lincoln: "The eye began to sparkle, the whole





AP Newsfeatures Five of its most beautiful and treasured natural resources appear on a new set of stamps issued by Isrhel to honor the great work of the Natural Reserves Authority. Each stamp depicts a different resource printed by photogravure in sheets of 15 stamps, plus five tabs, reports the Israel Philatelic Agency in America. One stamp shows the Dum palm tree, which has a peculiar form. The trunk of the Dum splits and branches, rather than having a single trunk rising up-

Another site on a stamp is the "Tahana" Waterfall in the Nahal Ivon Reserve. The unique attraction of this water reserve is that it has, four gushing waterfalls.

The Nahal Baraq Canyon is displayed on a third Israeli stamp. The canyon is located in the Negev along the valley known as the Arava. Many tourists consider this a "must" on their visit.

The fourth stamp features the Masreq Forest on the western slopes of the Judean mountain ridge. The Masreq is one of the last survivors of the great pine woods which once covered vast areas within Israel. A beautiful subterranean cav
