Drug Addicts Queried In **Bragg Deaths**

FT. BRAGG, N.C. (AP) - Officials investigating the fatal stabbing of an Army doctor's pregnant wife and their two young children said today they were checking on patients he had treated for drug abuse.

The doctor, Capt. Jeffrey MacDonald, 26, of Patchogue, N.Y., who also was stabbed in their apartment on the post Tuesday, said the family was attacked by a hippie-type band of three men and a girl. The girl, he said, muttered: "Acid is groovey; kill the

Police reported finding a paring knife and an ice pick which they said might have been used to kill Collette MacDonald, 26, a native of Brooklyn, N.Y., and her daughters Kristen Jean, 2, and Kimberly, 6. In New York, the Daily News quoted MacDonald's grandmother, Wilma M. Perry of Patchogue, as saying Mrs. MacDonald was expecting her third child this summer. MacDonald, a Green Beret paratrooper, said he was beaten unconscious, but revived later

and called the military police. They found him in a bedroom, stabbed in the stomach and Col. Robert J. Kriwanek, post provost marshal, said the word "pig" was scrawled in blood on the headboard of the Mac Donald's bed.

An Army spokesman con-firmed that MacDonald had treated narcotics users. Col. Kriwanek quoted Mac-Donald as saying he had fallen asleep on a living room couch while reading, awakened about 3:30 a.m. and saw the four intruders, who knocked him un-

men broke down the door of the MDM office recently, interrupting a meeting and arresting several members. This brings to 23 the number of military arrests connected with MDM activity, Duncan said. A Navy spokesman says 22 sallors had been arrested in re-

cent weeks at the office for investigation of charges including unauthorized absence. MDM spokesmen said those arrested were on authorized passes and in civilian clothes. Many charges were later dropped, they said. Marine Corps spokesmen have blamed MDM partly for a

Although firm statistics are onot available, the city drug addiction treatment and rehabili tation center reports it has an addicted 1-year-old boy. The city's school program has been conducted previously in the junior and senior high schools.

At the first grade school session, program speakers said they were surprised at how much the children there already knew about drugs. Two ex-addicts, an ex-convict and the city's coroner talked on addiction and what happens to drug addicts. Harold "Nightlife" Young who said he carried a habit for 18 years, told 200 pupils not to be conned by pushers whose sales pitch is that drugs are "The people who sell these

Suburban Prince Georges County in Maryland is now experiencing its own influx of blacks, while neighboring Montgomery County is attracting whites who formerly lived in Prince Georges.

So what we have in Washington and other major cities is a continuing trend to all-black schools, not because of any segregation policies, but because there are no white children in the neighborhoods to attend those schools. All of which brings us to a question

that Mr. Ribicoff decided not to discuss. Is it necessary for Negro children to attend school with whites in order to receive a good education? And if the answer is yes, which it almost always is among liberals, then doesn't that answer amount to a gross insult to the

With good teachers and good equipment, there's no reason why a Negro child can't learn as well among other Negro children as in a racially mixed group. If we deny this, what are we to make of the emerging African nations and their efforts at educating their people? Are we to tell them that their cause is hopeless unless they import millions of white children to attend school with their youngsters? All-Negro schools in the United States may well be socially unsatisfactory, but do they have to be educationally un-

satisfactory? If so, let the white liberals say it and say why. At the heart of the segregation problem, in both North and South, is the disinclination of most whites to intermix in any way with most blacks. That's not a beautiful assessment but it is a true one. And until different attitudes develop between the races, the juggling of school children-North or South-will be only a desperate attempt to hide one symptom of a complicated and agonizing problem. - THE NATIONAL OB-
