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## Wicker's Lament

Tom Wicker of the New York Times sat himself down after the Senate had adopted the Stennis amendment on segregation and wrote one of the most impassioned journalistic condemnations of our time.

By this amendment - in which Northern school segregation would be treated as if it were just as offensive as Southern school segregation - Wicker found that "The Senate of the United States has now cravenly abandoned the policy of racial integration."

If pressures against integration have to be applied equally in North and South, he wrote, "then they are not going to be applied anywhere, because there is neither the manpower, the money, the knowledge nor the will to do the job." That, Wicker continued, is what the Southern Senators wanted and "what their dupes in the Senate have approved."

The leading "dupe" in the Senate would have to be Connecticut's Senator Ribicoff, to whom Senator Stennis gave credit for the victory for his amendment.

Later in his article, Wicker referred to "the hypocrisy of those Northern Sen-

tion under the guise of attacking Northern segregation." At the end of his melancholy piece,

Wicker wrote this:

"Poor old Union! Its great and generous dreams falling one by one to dusty death."

Wicker's intense emotionalism in his own conclusion that the cause of integration is now dead because Senator Ribicoff has dared proclaim the North guilty too and because the Senate had adopted an amendment which would treat segregation the same everywhere, North or South, is probably an emotionalism shared by many other liberals.

But one might question their authority to sell the country short as they do sell it short, both North and South.

Could it not be that, if both Northern and Southern segregations are declared, evil and equal targets, there should be an increased responsibility and zeal for remedial action in the North? Could it not be that the South, once satisfied that it is no longer being discriminated against as if it were the only locale of racial injustice in this country, would get to its necessary tasks with a better will and a more positive imagination?

Is it not possible that this whole nation, if it looks at the racial problem with a unified appraisal and a unified resolve and a unified acceptance of responsibility, can begin to make unified progress toward the solution of the prob-

Where, indeed, is the real hypocrisy more likely to be found? In those Northern liberals who have finally said that the North too is guilty, or in those other Northern liberals who say we must not admit our guilt here in the North because such an admission would lessen the amount of pressure we can keep on the segregationists of the South?

Some of the more eloquent comment in the Senate itself labeled the Ribicoff support of the Stennis amendment as a potential great turning point in the history of our racial problem. How could any such comment, even from the deepest South, refer to any process of heading backward? What else could it refer to

but to a chance that we might now begin to move more directly toward the ultimate goal enshrined in our founding documents and in our national conscience?

.The real result of the Stennis amend ment could be swifter and sounder progress both North and South.

We could find North and South in a good race to see which could meet its obligations first, instead of using each other as alibi for a lack of progress. Wicker might have had a vision of a "Grand old Union! Its great and generous dreams coming to life, North and

## Integration: Back To Basics

A considerable potential for mischief lurks in Senator Ribicoff's curious alliance with Senator Stennis and other Southerners to legislate against de facto school segregation in the North. But it could also prove highly salutary provided it forces an honest new look at the basic question of what desegregation policies are intended to accomplish. The underlying question is nothing less than the ultimate objective of desegregation. Do we seek homogenized integration, with Negroes sprinkled evenly throughout the population by coercion if necessary? Or is the eventual objective the combination of legal equality and cultural pluralism through which Ameri can society has accommodated other ethnic groups?

In education at least, national policy has been seeking one objective in the South and another in the North. This is the real reason Senator Ribicoff's charges of "monumental hypocrisy" ring so disturbingly true. It's not merely a matter of the liberal commentator and politicians who decry private 'academies" in the South but would not dream of sending their own children to public school in Washington or New

York. The hypocrisy is not mere posturing but a matter of policy. In the South, the Federal courts and administrators have not been conten with merely requiring Southern school districts to remove legal obstacles to integration. If actual integration did not in fact result, the presumption has been that the legal obstacles remain in one form or another. As the only acceptable proof that de jure segregation has been ended, the South must end the de facto segregation also common in the North Thus while ostensible national policy has been equality before the law, the actual policy in the South has become integration for the sake of integration.

Now there is something to be said for this double standard, given the performance of the white South since the 1954 Supreme Court Desegregation decision. outherners met the decision with the doctrine of "massive resistance," the first in the series of declarations of civil disobedience that have caused so much trouble in recent years. Despite occasional geniune efforts at integration, the South mostly has offered one guise or another to maintain the old strictly segregated ways. Harsher treatment of the South is a predictable result of such defiance. And while it is punitive, as a matter of raw justice the South may have it coming.

The problem with punitive policies, though, is not that they are always unjustified but that they are nearly always self-defeating. In the long run any real solution to this nation's racial prob lems depends on keeping nearly everyone within the political and social system. Driving large numbers of people into the arms of the George Wallaces is not exactly the way to ease racial tensions.

Even more important, punitive policies exact a toli not only from those who suffer them but from those who wield them. We are seeing this in the confusion that followed the Ribicoff speech, and in the danger that the North's guilt will overwhelm its best judgment on what he proposes.

When Senator Stennis proposes to legislate against de facto Northern segregation. Senator Ribicoff says hurrah. Let's us-you and me and Senator Stennis - make integration for the sake of integration the policy of the whole nation and not just part.

Let the nation, in other words, opt for homogenized integration and forget about cultural pluralism. We do not find this preference a self-evident one. Nor do we sense that any such choice has been made by American Negroes who would have reason to find it condescending and who talk more and more about their own neighborhood schools. Surely it is a choice that ought to be made only after careful and forthright con sideration, not from pangs of guilt. Even more certainly, it is not a choice for Congress to make unless it is serious, as Senator Stennis and his friends assuredly are not.

It would be far wiser, we think, simply to concede that Senator Stennis has a point, and to apply the standard of equality before the law in the South as well as the North. This need not mean the end of all attempts to attack persistent, school segregation, merely the end of the presumption that in the South de facto segregation is necessarily a cloak for de jure segregation. Instead of requiring an affirmative racial balance the Governor would attack only overt obstacles to integration like discriminatory-laws and demonstrable coercion.

This approach would of course make it more difficult for the Government to win its lawsuits, but the effect on the real underlying problem is quite another question. Particularly since the remaining racial problems are so much a matter of personal attitudes, we doub that the nation can make meaningful progress with them unless it keeps its objectives clear and its ideals unblurred. It cannot do that if it resorts to double standards.

So national policy ought to seek the same objectives and apply the same ideals throughout the nation. And pending some national decisions far more imental than the handwringing that has followed the Ribicoff speech, the relevant ideal is not that the law should enforce racial balance but that the law should be color blind. - WALL STREET JOURNAL.

The story basically concerned itself with the fac that physicians at two clinic in the country received over \$ million for their services. Ther was no assessment, of cours

We also noted that, in the story, one physician, a sok practitioner in New York, was purported to have received \$1,-400,000 for his services; and thought you would like to know that the Senate Finance Com mittee has shamefacedly ad mitted that this was a bloope Actually, it was an unidentified hospital in New York City which received that amount o

money, not a physician. With all of this, it is inter esting to point out that a few days prior to the release of the Senate Finance Committee report, the Department of Health Education and Welfare also re leased some figures which indicated that, of the total pul lic health dollar, professions charges amounted to 14%. This might indicate that the Senat Finance Committee is preoccu pled with zeroing in on a sma number of physicians whose total charges in Medicaid and Medicare are not as significant in the total public health con as the Senate Committee would like our citizenry to believe.

We can understand the em barrassment of the Senate at having to face up to deficiencies in their hurried legislative write ing, but are not sympathetic to their seeking out whipping pos as cover-ups, particularly be cause it perpetrates the hoar that alterations in certain areas of costs will resolve the enou mous health care cost problem The same HEW figures to which we referred above indicate that the aged, who comprise onetenth of the population, con sume one-quarter of the personal health care dollar. ain's undiplomatic former foreign secretary. Brown added that he spoke the truth wherever he went and not everyone liked it.

Brown was invited to speak because he made a survey tour of the Middle East last month, a tour during which he (1) had hot words with an Israeli general and Britain's ambassador to Israel at a dinner party given by Foreign Minister Abba Eban; (2) greeted Israeli Premier Golda Meir, who is 16 years his senior, with the words, "Hello, sister;" and (3) upbraided an Israeli airport inspector h


